

Rectory of Morden – Account of William Wynteworthe farmer at the same place from the eve of Michaelmas in the 15th year of the reign of King Richard II after the Conquest until Michaelmas Day then next following, the 16th year of the above King Richard, for 1 entire year [1391-1392]

For farm of the said Rectory leased to the aforesaid William this year

£11.*

Sum of receipts £11.**Pension paid**

Paid to the Vicar of Morden in value of 1 quarter wheat and 1 quarter beans for a certain pension owed to the same per year, nothing this year because by the farmer of the said Rectory by agreement [*ex cov^e*]. And paid to the same Vicar for a certain pension to him lately granted by the lord Prior and convent per year by the hand of the bailiff, this year 20s.

Sum 20s.

Cash Deliveries

Delivered to brother John Lakyngheth bailiff of Westminster for the residue of the farm of the said Rectory by 1 tally £10.

Sum £10.

Sum of payments and deliveries £11, equal to the sum of his receipts.*Quietus*

And so he departed quit.

* The farmer of the Rectory is now responsible for paying the corn pension to the vicar; Westminster Abbey pay him a new cash pension of £1 a year (Is this mentioned in Bishop of Winchester's Register?)
