The Population Returns, and Church Livings, have been carefully collated, with the Lists, or Census' ;—with corrections in the Livings up to 1822, being the last ; and giving in Chapelries, the Patrons and Incumbents of the Mother Church.

In being obliged to mention Residences in Towns and populous Villages, &c. to avoid omission of some important ones, a difficulty arises in drawing a line of distinction, and more particularly near London. The kind indulgence of the candid Reader is therefore solicited, where he may observe superiors or titles of distinction omitted, or inferiors inserted—with this observation, that the Compilers must have frequently relied on information from others ; and cannot, in this particular, have entertained any improper motive themselves.

Orthography in proper names being indefinite, an appeal to the liberality of the Reader is almost unnecessary, where, from the nature of the compilation, error is unavoidable.

TOPOGRAPHICAL DICTIONARY,

OF THE

COUNTY OF SURREY.

A.

ABINGER, a parish in the hundred of Wootton, 5 miles S.W. from Dorking, on the road from thence to Guildford, and 28 S.W. from London ; containing, in 1801, 105 houses, and 632 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 629, and in 1821, 742. The living is a rectory, value 12*l.* 8*s.* 1½*d.* in the patronage of Sir F. Evelyn, Bart. ; and had formerly a castle. Incumbent, Rev. H. J. Ridley.

ABINGER-HALL, in the parish of Abinger, 4½ miles from Dorking, on the right of the road from thence to Guildford (near Wootton-house and Netley-place), and 28 W.S.W. from London ; an extensive ancient mansion, much improved by the addition of very extensive wings, now presenting a modern appearance, with an elevated walk or terrace in front, the whole improved length of the mansion ; a lawn, gently declining from it to the road, against which it is defended by a high breast wall ; gardens, hot-house, plantations, &c. The seat of *J. Scarlet, Esq. M. P. King's Counsel.*

ABINGTON-HOUSE, in the parish of Cobham, near the church, 7¾ miles S.W. from Kingston ; the residence of *Charles Shepherd, Esq.*

ACRE-HILL-FARM, a farm in the detached part of the parish of Malden (on the west side of the parish of Epsom, by which it is separated), 2 miles W. from Epsom.

ADDINGTON, a parish in the hundred of Wallington, 3 miles E.S.E. from Croydon, and 13 S. from London; containing in 1801, 36 houses, and 178 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 152; in 1821, 354. The living is a vicarage, value 4*l.* 16*s.* 5½*d.* in the patronage of the Archbishop of Canterbury. Incumbent, Rev. J. C. Bissett. On a hill in this parish there formerly was a castle: the hill still retains the name of Castle-hill, and a farm in which it is situated that of Castle-hill Farm; and ruins are often discovered in ploughing. Near to Castle-hill there are a number of pits, supposed to have been occasioned by the sinking of the earth; and probably this has been formerly a place of much greater extent.

ADDINGTON-HILL, in the parish of Addington, 2 miles S.E. from Croydon, and 12 S. from London; a handsome house, the residence of *Mr. George Waters*.

ADDINGTON-LODGE, an extensive farm in the parish of Addington, 4½ miles S.E. from Croydon.

ADDINGTON-PARK, in the parish of Addington, 2½ miles E.S.E. from Croydon, and 12½ S. from London-bridge: an extensive and superb mansion of Portland stone; with a park, which is paled, very extensive, and well ornamented with trees. The mansion is situated near the centre of the park, on a gentle declivity towards the south. This is a most desirable seat of *His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury*, which he enjoys alternately with his palace at Lambeth.

ADDISCOMB-HOUSE, in the parish, and nearly 1 mile E. from the town, of Croydon; a beautiful and very extensive mansion, the property of the Honourable the East India Company, used now as a College for the Education of Cadets.

ADDISCOMB-LODGE, situate in the parish, and 1½ mile eastwardly from the town, of Croydon; a handsome villa residence of *Alexander Adair, Esq.*

ADDLESTONE, detached houses in the parish of Chertsey Beomond, 1 mile S.S.E. from that town.

ALBURY, a parish in the hundred of Blackheath, 4½ miles E.S.E. from Guildford, 7 miles W.S.W. from Dorking, and 24 S.W. from London; through which runs a stream of fine water, well stored with fish, principally trout and pike; containing in 1811, 97 houses, and 589 inhabitants, and in 1821, 765 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 7*l.* 12*s.* 8½*d.*; patron, H. Drummond, Esq. The church, which had once a convent, stands in a low situation, by the side of the small river in Albury-park, concealed by ivy clinging to its sides, and fine trees standing around it, so that it is not seen without a near approach: when at once is presented a view of a small but venerable structure of antiquity, in a lonely spot of sacred deposit for ages past.

This village is situated in a valley much ornamented by the extensive parks and fine timber of Albury-park and Netley-place, and other elegant seats; and is bounded by a gentle eminence on the south, and by Netley-heath and the Guildford Race-ground, called Merrow-down, which are larger hills, on the north; forming a pleasing

contrast with the foliage of this well-sheltered situation, and by the whole this is rendered a most beautiful village. Besides the seats in the neighbourhood, mentioned under their respective names, are handsome residences of *Sir James Douglas, Bart.*, *Lieut.-Colonel the Hon. Robert Clive*, and the *Rev. Hugh M'Nield*.

ALBURY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Merstham, 3 miles N.E. from Reigate.

ALBURY-PARK, in the parish of Albury, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles E.S.E. from Guildford, 7 W.S.W. from Dorking, and 24 S.W. from London. A beautiful mansion, most delightfully situated in an extensive park, in which are handsome gardens, the parish church, a beautiful stream of water, and stately trees; the whole being a most delightful grotto scene, bounded on the south by a gentle, and on the north by larger, hills, forming an agreeable contrast. The seat of *Henry Drummond, Esq.*

ALDERSTEAD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chipstead, 4 miles N.E. from Reigate.

ALFORD, or **ALFOLD**, a parish in the hundred of Blackheath, on the borders of Sussex, 8 miles E. from Haslemere, $10\frac{1}{2}$ S.W. from Guildford, and 40 S.S.W. from London; containing in 1801, 59 houses, and 306 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 364; in 1821, 470. At this place several Frenchmen took refuge from the massacre of St. Bartholomew's, and set up a glass-manufactory, as appears from an inscription found in the Church-yard. The church is a rectory, value 6*l.* 11*s.* 3*d.*; patron, *Rev. L. W. Elliot*; incumbent, *Rev. John Peachey*.

ANSTIE-FARM, a farm near Leith-hill, in the parish of Dorking, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from that town.

APPS, in the parish of Moulsey (West); $14\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.W. from London; a handsome villa residence of *Dr. Ogler*.

APPS-COURT, in the parish, and $1\frac{3}{4}$ mile E.N.E. from the village, of Walton-on-Thames; pleasantly situated near the river, $14\frac{3}{4}$ miles S.W. from London; a handsome modern mansion, with beautiful extensive park or pleasure-grounds. The residence of — *Hamboro, Esq.*

APSLEY'S-TOWN, in the parish of Lingfield; an ancient farm, the property and residence of *Mr. Robert Bostock*.

ARBON-COTTAGE, in the parish, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile S. from the town, of Chertsey; near Botley-park; a small neat cottage residence of *Wm. Amiel, Esq.*

ARNOLDS, an extensive farm, near Bear-green, in the parish of Capel, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Dorking.

ASH, a parish in the hundred of Woking, 8 miles W. from Guildford, and 34 from London; adjoining to Hants, near which the Basingstoke Canal passes; containing in 1821, 291 houses, and 583 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 15*l.* 18*s.* 11*d.*; in the patronage of Winchester College, with Frimley Chapel annexed. Incumbent, *Rev. Harry Lee*. On Ash Green is a handsome house of — *Amslow, Esq.*

ASHHURST-FARM, a farm in the parish of Mickleham, $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles N.N.E. from Dorking.

ASHHURST-LODGE, in the parish of Headley, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles N.E. from Dorking, and 20 S.W. from London; a handsome house, with pleasure-grounds and plantations; the residence of *Andrew Strahan, Esq.*

ASHLEY-PARK, in the parish of Walton-on-Thames, 6 miles W. S.W. from Kingston, and 18 S.W. from London-bridge; an elegant modern mansion, pleasantly situated near the river Thames, with a park ornamented with trees, adjoining to Oatlands Park; the seat of the widow of the late *Sir Henry Fletcher, Bart.*

ASHSTEAD, or **ASHTEAD**, a parish in the hundred of Copthorne and Effingham, on the road from Epsom and London to Dorking, 2 miles S.W. from Epsom, and 17 S.W. from London; containing in 1811, 159 houses, and 882 inhabitants; and in 1821, 579 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 13*l.* 15*s.* 5*d.* in the patronage of the Bishop of Winchester. Incumbent, Rev. William Caiter. Here King Charles II. was entertained; and the table is still preserved on which he dined.

Near this place are some elegant seats, mentioned under their respective names, and the residence of — *Hambly, Esq.*, *Miss Smith*, — *Grimstead, Esq.*, and — *Wilkins, Esq.*

ASHSTEAD-COT, in the parish of Ashstead, 2 miles S.W. from Epsom; a neat villa residence of *F. D. Haynes, Esq.*

ASHSTEAD-LODGE, in the parish of Ashstead, 2 miles S.W. from Epsom; a neat mansion and grounds, the seat of *Charles Walsham, Esq.*

ASHSTEAD-PARK, in the parish of Ashstead, 2 miles S.W. from Epsom, and 17 S.W. from London, on the road to Dorking; an elegant mansion, with park, plantations, &c. the seat of Lieut.-Colonel *Thomas Phipps Howard.*

BACHELOR-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ockham, 5 miles N.E. from Guildford.

BADSHOT-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Farnham, 2 miles N.E. from the town.

BADSHOT-LEA, in the parish of Farnham; a common, with scattered houses, $1\frac{3}{4}$ miles N.E. from Farnham.

BADSHOT-PLACE, in the parish of Farnham, 40 miles W.S.W. from London; an ancient mansion, the residence of — *Williams, Esq.*

BAGDEN, a farm in the parish of Great Bookham, 3 miles S.W. from Leatherhead.

BAGSHOT, a tything in the parish of Windlesham, hundred of Woking, $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.W. from Staines, and $27\frac{1}{2}$ W.S.W. from London; in 1801, containing 182 houses, and 1136 inhabitants. This is a pleasant village, containing some handsome houses and good inns. It was formerly called Holy Hall; and here our Kings had anciently a house and park, which were laid open after the civil wars. The church was rebuilt in 1767, having been destroyed by lightning. Bagshot-heath was a barren waste of many miles in extent, but by the modern

enclosures, only a small part of it remains; a great part of it being now cultivated grounds, on which are a number of handsome seats: some other parts of it, which are enclosed, are not yet cleared from the heath. Population in 1821, returned as included in Windlesham.

BAGSHOT-PARK, a spacious ancient handsome mansion, with an extensive park and gardens, on the west side of the road from London, through Bagshot to Portsmouth, 9 miles S.W. from Staines, and $27\frac{1}{2}$ W. S.W. from London, adjoining to Bagshot. The seat of *His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester*.

BAKEHAM-HOUSE, in the parish of, and 2 miles S.W. from, Egham, 5 from Windsor, and 20 W. S.W. from London; a handsome mansion and pleasure grounds, the seat of *Thomas Barton, Esq.*

BALHAM and **BALHAM-HILL**, in the hamlet of Upper-Tooting, in the parish of Streatham, extending to the former from Clapham-common; a continuation between those places of handsome modern erections, daily increasing, now about a mile in extent. See **UPPER-TOOTING** and **STREATHAM**.

BALLARD'S-FARM, in the parish of Addington, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.E. from Croydon, and $12\frac{1}{2}$ S. from London; the residence of — *Oafton, Esq.*

BALLARD'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Warlingham, 4 miles S. S. E from Croydon.

BANK-FARM (formerly Point-Pleasant), an elegant mansion, with beautiful grounds, delightfully situated on

the banks of the Thames, opposite Hampton-Court; in the parish, and 1 mile N. from the town, of Kingston, and 12 W. S.W from London-bridge. The seat of General *Sir John Delves Broughton, Bart.*

BANSTEAD, a parish in the hundred of Cophorne, 3 miles E. S. E. from Epsom, and 15 S. S. W. from London; containing, in 1801, 140 houses, and 717 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 882; in 1821, 940. Banstead Downs are pleasantly situated, commanding a prospect of 30 miles round, and views of the Royal Palaces of Windsor and Hampton-court, London and Westminster; and have a four-mile race course, much frequented in summer. The turf here is of beautiful verdure, intermixed with fragrant herbs, and the mutton fed upon the Downs is particularly sweet. The living is a vicarage, value 13*l.* 8*s.* 7*d.* in the patronage of the executors of *J. Francis, Esq.* deceased. Incumbent, *Rev. J. E. Francis*. In this neighbourhood are many elegant seats, most of them mentioned by their respective names. In the village are the residences of several persons of distinction; here are those of *Lady Alfrey, Lady Dawson, Miss Aubertin*, — *Wenthouse, Esq. Captain Apsley*, and the *Rev.* — *Buckle*.

BANSTEAD-PLACE, a handsome mansion and grounds, in the parish of Banstead, 4 miles S.E. from Epsom, and $15\frac{1}{2}$ S. S. W. from London; the seat of — *Spencer, Esq.* lord of the manor of Banstead.

BARN-ELMS, a hamlet adjoining to Barnes, formerly consisting of two houses, one famous as having been Queen Elizabeth's dairy, and the residence of Jacob Tonson the bookseller, where the most celebrated wits

of the time held the Kit-Cat Club; the other, formerly the manor-house, was granted by Queen Elizabeth to Sir Francis Walsingham; after which it became the residence of Mr. Heydegger, master of the revels to George the Second. Here is now an extensive mansion and grounds, handsomely ornamented with trees, adjoining to the River Thames, the seat and property of *Henry Hugh Hoare, Esq.* banker; and a very extensive farm, with a handsome house, in the occupation of *Mr. George Clapham.*

BARNES, a parish in the hundred of Brixton, $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. S. W. from London, on the banks of the Thames. Population, 1811, 994; and in 1821, 1240. The church is an ancient structure; on the outside of the south wall is a stone table, enclosed by pales, with rose trees growing on each side, to the memory of Edward Rose, citizen of London, who died in 1653, and left 20*l.* to the poor of the parish for the purchase of an acre of land, on condition that the pales should be kept up, and the rose trees preserved. The living is a rectory, value 9*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's. Incumbent, *Rev J. Jeffreys.* Here is a terrace of nearly half a mile in length, and a row of houses for its whole extent, not uniform, chiefly consisting of neat houses, and some elegant ones, having the River Thames flowing immediately under their windows; and on the *Green* are also some genteel residences, which together include the following; viz. on the Terrace, *Mrs. Sprigg*; a mansion belonging to *Matthew Ball, Esq.* lately occupied by the *Duchess of Gordon*, and at present the residence of *Count Munster*; and on the Green, *Mrs. Carpenter*; *Bryan Broughton, Esq.* late residence of Sir Henry Halford: and in other parts of the village

Lady Douglas, the *Rev. J. Jeffreys*, *Major Pipon*, *Robert Haywood, Esq.*, *John Hillersden, Esq.*, and *Mrs. Fountain*, the property of John Brandon, Esq.

BARNES-FARM, a farm in the parish of Cranley, 11 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.

BARNET-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leatherhead, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Epsom.

BARNS-BLANFORD, a farm in the parish of Horne, 8 miles S. E. from Reigate.

BARON-HOUSE, in the parish of, and near to Mitcham, $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. W. from London-bridge: a very large house, now occupied as a respectable academy for gentlemen, by *Mr. Dempster.*

BARROW-HEDGES, in the parish of Carshalton, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. S. W. from Croydon, and 12 S. S. W. from London; a handsome mansion, the seat of *J. W. Quintin, Esq.*, possessing the beauties of situation for which that village for a summer residence is peculiar.

BARTLET'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Reigate.

BATTERSEA, a parish in the hundred of Brixton, 4 miles S. W. from London, on the banks of the Thames, over which it has a substantial wooden bridge, for carriages, to Chelsea; containing, by the census of 1811, 735 houses, and 4409 inhabitants; and by the census of 1821, 4992 inhabitants, including the hamlet of Penge. The living is a vicarage, value 13*l.* 15*s.* 2*d.*; patron,

Earl Spencer; incumbent, Rev. Joseph Allen. The church is a neat edifice, with a lofty spire; it was rebuilt a few years ago. In it there is a handsome monument, by Roubiliac, to the memory of Lord Bolingbroke, who formerly had a mansion here; also a monument to the memory of Sir Edward Winter, who lived in the neighbourhood; of whom it is related, that he was a Captain in the service of the India Company, in the reign of Charles the Second, and being attacked by a tiger, he placed himself on the side of a pond, caught the tiger in his arms, and having fallen back with him into the water, got upon him and kept him down till he was drowned. At a large distillery, which still bears the name of York-house (which see), was a seat of the Archbishops of York, from 1480 to its alienation. On the site of the family mansion of Henry St. John Viscount Bolingbroke is a striking object, in a horizontal air or windmill, 140 feet high, in the shape of a cone, of which the average diameter is about 50 feet; it has six pairs of stones, and is used for grinding malt for the distilleries, and was originally intended for grinding linseed, on the plan of one at Margate. The main shaft of the mill is the centre of the circle, formed by sails, consisting of 96 double planks, nine inches broad, with as many shutters, 80 feet high, with apertures placed perpendicularly, through which the wind passes, and turns the mill with a rapidity, which is increased or diminished by opening or closing the shutters with a rope, in the manner of Venetian blinds. On these premises there were bullock houses, for 650 bullocks to be fed; but they are now taken down, and the site is converted into a nursery. In this parish, which includes a great part of the common called Clapham-common, part of the south, all the west, and nearly all the north sides of it, Lavender-sweep, Battersea-rise, a part of the

common called Wandsworth-common, and the New Town of Battersea, on the road from Vauxhall to Wandsworth, there are a great number of elegant seats. The village of Battersea itself (with the exception of a few seats near it, highly respectable) exhibits rather an appearance of insignificance, and is chiefly occupied by small tradesmen, and the cultivators of its very extensive garden and vegetable grounds, for the supply of the London market. But from the extent of the parish, the antiquity and respectability of some of its former residents, and the acquisition it has now attained by the modern seats, and more particularly in those parts of the parish which, from their contiguity to the genteel districts of Vauxhall, Clapham, and Wandsworth, being nearer those villages than the village of Battersea, might be accounted part of them by those not acquainted with its extent and boundaries, Battersea had formerly its proportion of respectability; and is now one of the genteel neighbourhoods near the metropolis, respectably inhabited, beautifully ornamented by the handsome mansions and the pleasure grounds around them, and has, particularly on the higher or south-westerly side of the parish, the advantage of elevation and charming prospects over the Thames, to London, Highgate, and Hampstead, &c. It had formerly a great extent of common, but the principal parts now remaining are those above enumerated, containing some of the most elegant houses; and Penge common, situated at a distance, in the easterly part of the hundred of Brixton, adjoining to Croydon parish, and the borders of Kent, near Sydenham, on which also are some handsome houses: amongst other genteel residences in this parish, there are the following; namely, fronting *Clapham-common*, on its north side, commencing at the boundary between this

parish and Clapham, near Clapham church (having passed the mansion of — *Brogden, Esq.* M. P. and the house of *Mr. Brown*, and a smaller one, which are in Clapham), and proceeding westwardly to *Battersea Rise*, inclusive, a handsome house of — *Hatchet, Esq.*; a small house, *Mrs. Hudson*; a larger, *James Rule, Esq.*; another, *Mrs. Rebecca Wilkinson*; an extensive modern mansion, *John Farrer, Esq.*; two handsome houses in the same area, *Ebenezer Maitland, Esq.*, and *Robert Winter, Esq.*; three smaller houses, *Mr. George Lee*, *Mr. Robert Thornton*, and *Mr. George Baylis*; a small elegant white house, with handsome grounds, *William Crowder, Esq.*; a handsome modern mansion, and grounds, of *Roger Lee, Esq.*; a smaller house, *William Bowdens, Esq.*; a handsome house, *John Hammond, Esq.*; another, modern, with handsome grounds, *John Shewell, Esq.*; one more extensive, *Thomas Newton, Esq.*; an elegant mansion, and handsome grounds, *Thomas Poynder, Esq.*; a handsome mansion, with wings, and extensive pleasure grounds, *Mrs. Graham*; two other handsome houses, distinguishable by being like each other, and sometimes called the Sisters, with handsome grounds to each, and an opening between them, the property of — *Chivers, Esq.*; the more westerly being the present residence of *William Rothwell, Esq.*, the other of himself; a very extensive elegant mansion of *George Scholey, Esq.* alderman of London, and a like one of *John Rapp, Esq.* On Lavender-sweep, a handsome house and grounds of *Robert Saunders, Esq.*; likewise two adjoining to each other, *James Broadhurst, Esq.* and *John Eccles, Esq.*; also of *Sam. Chatfield, Esq.*; *F. A. Clarke, Esq.*; *W. Mellish, Esq.*; an extensive and beautiful mansion and grounds, *John Ravenhill, jun. Esq.*; a smaller neat villa, — *Whiting, Esq.* On Battersea-

rise, on the south side of the road from Wandsworth to Clapham, a smaller handsome house and grounds, *Thomas Ashney, Esq.*; a magnificent mansion, with beautiful and very extensive grounds of *Joseph Wilson, Esq.*, the mansion being near to the north-west corner of the common, and to an angle of the roads on the north and west sides of the common (fronting eastwardly); a handsome mansion and grounds, *William Willis, Esq.*; a like mansion and grounds, *Josiah Robinson, Esq.*; a handsome mansion, with beautiful and very extensive grounds, *Sir R. Inglis, Bart.*; a handsome mansion, with pleasure grounds, &c. *William Haigh, Esq.*; passing an angle in the road along the west side of the common, a smaller neat house and grounds, *Richard Thornton, Esq.*; similar, *Thomas Wood, Esq.*; a more extensive mansion, with grounds, *John Blakeway, Esq.*; similar, *James Shears, Esq.*; a smaller elegant house, with extensive grounds, *George Hyde Wollaston, Esq.* (Broomfield-house, under its proper name); a neat house, in the cottage or Chinese style, *Edward Hodges, Esq.*; a very handsome extensive mansion (plain), *John Ravenhill, Esq.*; a smaller handsome mansion, with columns in front, *John Shewell, Esq.*; two extensive mansions (adjoining), *John Dodson, Esq.* and *Herman Sellen, Esq.*; a handsome mansion, *Mrs. Ware*; a magnificent mansion (plain), *Edward Vaux, Esq.*; an extensive and beautiful mansion (with wings), *Mrs. Wright*, widow of the late Benjamin Wright, Esq. From *Battersea-rise* to *Nightingale-lane*, fronting westwardly to Wandsworth-common (Bolingbroke-grove, under its own name), a beautiful mansion and grounds, — *Challie, Esq.*; a beautiful mansion and extensive grounds, late the residence of Sir James Mansfield, the present residence of *Joseph Wilson, Esq.* (temporarily);

a smaller handsome mansion, with beautiful grounds, *Mrs. Champion*; a handsome mansion and grounds, *William Dent, Esq.* From the village of Battersea towards Wandsworth, by the side of the River Thames, — *Dyer, Esq., Rev. Joseph Allen*, vicar; (and see Lawn-cottage :) *Mrs. Perry*, a handsome large mansion, rather ancient, with pleasure grounds fronting the Thames; a handsome mansion, fronting the Thames, *David Kerr, Esq.; J. King, Esq.* (see Sherwood Lodge;) *Henry Tritton, Esq. Isaac Nicholls, Esq. James Surrey, Esq.*, (and see York-House;) at the Air-mill, *Joseph Watson, Esq.* From Battersea-bridge towards Battersea Village, at an angle of the road, — *Constable, Esq.* Further on the left, — *Hyde, Esq., C. Greenwood, Esq., Rev. Geo. Hughes.* From the Village towards the Retreat (which see), and Clapham, on the right, *Colonel Rooke*; adjoining to the Retreat, *Mrs. Rippon*. Opposite to the Retreat, *T. Stirling, Esq.* Coroner, and — *Nebdale, Esq.* On the Bankside, towards Vauxhall, are many extensive manufactories and tradesmen's houses, At the New Town of Battersea, many respectable modern residences, too numerous for insertion. On the road from Vauxhall to Wandsworth, *John Ashlin, Esq., Samuel Hill, Esq., John Lee, Esq., J. B. Smith, Esq., Charles Adams, Esq., Stephen Rolliston, Esq.*, and *Charles Wicks, Esq.*

BATTLEBRIDGE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Gattin, $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles N. E. from Reigate.

BAYNARD'S-LODGE, in the parish of Cranley, 10 miles S. E. from Guildford, on the road from Guildford to Brighton, through Cranley; a handsome house (rebuilt on the site of an ancient extensive manor), with handsome grounds, a villa residence of — *Smallpiece, Esq.*

BEAUMONT-COTTAGE, a handsome modern erection, with coach-house, &c. situate on the south side, almost adjoining to the town of Chertsey (near Cowley-house); 22 miles S. W. from London; the residence of *John Hamilton Colt, Esq.*

BEDDINGTON, a parish in the hundred of Wallington, 2 miles W. from Croydon, and 10 S. from London; containing by the census of 1801, 62 houses, and 353 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 1250; and in 1821, 1327, in which is included the population of the hamlet of Wallington.—The church is a gothic structure, built of stone, with north and south aisles; and formerly belonged to Merton-Abbey. The living is a rectory, value 13*l.* 16*s.* 3*d.* Patron, W. Pellat, Esq.; incumbent, Rev. J. B. Ferrers. Here are two charity-schools. Beddington is a delightful rural village, in a low situation, ornamented by the fine trees of Beddington-park, &c.; and contains many genteel residences, including those of *Sir Christopher Robinson; J. W. Meeke, Esq.; John Tritton, Esq.*, banker; *John Bristow, Esq.; William Bristow, Esq.*; the late *Admiral Piggott*; the rectory-house, Rev. J. B. Ferrers, rector, and several others mentioned under their respective titles, and under that of WALLINGTON, a hamlet in the parish of Beddington (which see).

BEDDINGTON-HOUSE, in the parish of Beddington, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. from Croydon; a handsome mansion, lately the seat of *Sir Henry Bridges*; the property of *Mrs. Gee*.

BEDDINGTON-PARK, in the parish of Beddington, 2 miles W. from Croydon, and 10 S. from London; an

extensive, ancient, but elegant mansion, with a park; the seat of *Mrs. Gee* (widow of the late *Wm. Gee, Esq.*), owner of many of the residences in Beddington. This was the seat of *Sir Nicholas Carew*, of the ancient family of the Carews, and his predecessors. The park—famous for the walnut and other trees, with which it is ornamented; and through which runs a pellucid stream, rising in this neighbourhood, and, being joined by several springs within a short distance, forming the river *Wandle*—is very extensive, paled, and stocked with deer.

BEDDLESTEAD-FARM, a very extensive farm, on the borders of Kent, lying in the several parishes of Chelsham, Titsey, and Tatsfield; the property of the *Hon. L. Gower*, at present untenanted. The house is in the parish of Chelsham.

BEDFORD-HILL-HOUSE, in the parish of Streatham, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.S.W. from London-bridge; a beautiful mansion, the property of *Richardson Borrodaile, Esq.*, and the present residence of *John Burnet, Esq.*

BEDFORD-HOUSE, in the village of Streatham, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. from Croydon, and $5\frac{1}{2}$ S. from London; a superb mansion, the residence of *Edward Cowland, Esq.*

BEECHES-FARM, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, at the south-easterly extremity of the county, adjoining to Kent.

BEECH-HILL, in the parish of Woking, 4 miles N. from Guildford; a neat villa residence of *Mr. Jervis*.

BELDAMY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Dorking, $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile S. E. from that town.

BELL-VUE-LODGE, a handsome modern villa, most delightfully situated on an eminence called *Park-hill*, half-a-mile S. from Reigate, on the road to Brighton (on the right); commanding very pleasant and extensive views; the property of *John Carter, Esq.* and the present residence of — *Deacon, Esq.*

BENSOM-HOUSE, in the parish of Croydon, $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile N. from Croydon, and $9\frac{1}{4}$ S. S. E. from London; a handsome house, the property of *C. P. Cecil, Esq.* and lately the residence of *Jacob Wood, Esq.*

BERMONDSEY, a parish in the hundred of Brixton, reckoned a part of the metropolis, being one of the out-parishes adjoining to the Borough of Southwark; containing by the census of 1801, 3137 houses, and 17,169 inhabitants; being 7986 males, and 9183 females; of whom 3959 were returned as employed in trade and manufacture. Population in 1811, 19,530; in 1821, 25,235. Its name is supposed to have been derived from its situation in or near the Royal manor of *Bermond's-Eye*. The present parish church was erected in the year 1680, at the charge of the parish: it is plain, but convenient; built of brick, covered with stucco, and the door-cases and arched windows are covered with stone. This parish contains more of the ancient low buildings of centuries back than any other of the suburbs of London, notwithstanding it is immensely rich. Tanning is a branch of trade peculiar to this district. The remains of the ancient abbey here are confined to little more than the relics of a gatehouse: it appears to have been originally founded

at a short period from the conquest, and is mentioned in the Domesday Survey, as being at that time an elegant and lately erected structure. At its first foundation, and for several centuries afterwards, it was only a cell to a foreign monastery, the priory of La Charité sur la Loire; but in 1389 it appears to have been enfranchised, and converted into an abbey. Its annual revenue at the surrender in 1536 appears to have been 548*l.* 2*s.* 5½*d.* Catherine, Queen of Henry V. and Elizabeth, Queen of Edward IV. both died here. The living is a rectory, value 15*l.* 8*s.* 11*d.* Patron, Mrs. Hambly; incumbent, Rev. A. Kersteman.

BERRING-PLACE, in the parish of Ewhurst, adjoining to the parish of Shere, near Hurtwood-common, 7½ miles S. E. from Guildford; a handsome ancient house, the residence of *Thomas Wood, Esq.*

BETCHWORTH, a parish in the hundred of Reigate, 3½ miles E. from Dorking, and 21 S. S. W. from London; containing in 1801, 193 houses, and 930 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 1007; in 1821, 909. This village is beautifully situated in the most fertile part of Holmesdale, to the south of Box-hill, on the River Mole. By romantic hills to the north, and the extensive park and woods belonging to Betchworth-castle and Chart-park, to the south, and of other seats in and near this place on the east, a most pleasing variety of scenery is formed, and the situation rendered most delightful. In the neighbourhood there are an abundance of seats of most respectable families, of which the principal ones in the parish are mentioned under their respective names. Near the church (not so named,) is an extensive ancient mansion, the property of *Mr. Goulburn*, the present re-

sidence of — *Croft, Esq.*, and formerly the residence of *Lady Bathurst*. At *Brockham-green*, in this parish, are many neat cottage-residences: for a description of the others, the reader is referred to them under their respective names. The living is a vicarage, value 7*l.* 8*s.* 11*d.*; patrons, Dean and Canons of Windsor; incumbent, Rev. T. F. Doveton.

Betchworth East and Betchworth West, are hamlets in this parish, and their population included therein.

BETCHWORTH-CASTLE, an extensive ancient mansion, situated on the left bank of the River Mole, on the south side of Box-hill, in a pleasant and fertile vale, part of Holmesdale, adjoining to the pleasant village of Betchworth; 21½ miles S. S. W. from London-bridge, and 1½ mile E. N. E. from Dorking, in which parish it is situate, and with which town it communicates by a very extensive and beautiful park, of fertile hills and slopes, with stately chestnut and other trees in rows, of extraordinary magnitude and extent, contributing greatly to the beauty of the village of Betchworth. This formerly belonged to the great Earl of Warren, and is now the seat of *Henry Peters, Esq.*, banker.

BETCHWORTH-HOUSE, a very extensive and elegant mansion, situate in the delightful village of Betchworth, in Holmesdale, on the south side of Box-hill, and on the north side of the River Mole; 3½ miles E. from Dorking, and 21 miles S. S. W. from London-bridge; in a very extensive park, the land of which is some of the most fertile in the county, through which the river flows; possessing all that variety of beautiful scenery, which, by this seat, the seats and grounds of Wonham-house and Betchworth-castle, and the hills, valley, and river, is given to the village.

The seat of *Henry Goulburn, Esq.* M. P. Secretary for Ireland.

BIGGIN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Croydon, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. from the town, and $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from London.

BILHURST-FARM, &c. in the parish of Lingfield. See COLLEGE-FARM.

BINSCOMB, scattered houses in the parish of Compton, 3 miles S. S. W. from Guildford.

BIRCH-FARM, a farm in the parish of Frensham, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. W. from Haslemere.

BIRCH-WOOD-HOUSE, in the parish of Godstone, at the northern extremity of the parish; a neat villa residence of *Mr. Martin*, lessee for a long term from *Sir William Clayton*.

BIRD'S-HILL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Stoke-Dabernon, $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles N. N. W. from Letherhead.

BIRD'S-LODGE, in the parish of Croydon, adjoining Coombe-lane, $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile S. E. from Croydon, and $10\frac{3}{4}$ S. from London; a handsome mansion, the residence of *Mrs. Davis*.

BISLEY, a parish in the hundred of Godley and Chertsey, 3 miles S. S. E. from Woking, and 33 S. W. from London; containing in 1801, 37 houses, and 196 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 204; in 1821, 273. It stands near the River Wey; and near the church is a spring called St. John the Baptist's-well, the water of which is re-

ported to be colder than any other in summer, and much warmer in winter. *Mr. Aubrey* relates, that on trying it with galls it turned a purple colour. The living is a rectory, value 7*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.*; in the patronage of the Trustees of *John Thornton, Esq.*; incumbent, the *Rev. J. King*.

BISLEY-GREEN, detached houses in the parish of Bisley, 3 miles S. E. from Bagshot.

BLACKBOROUGH-FARM, a farm in the parish of Reigate.

BLACKBURY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, 12 miles S. E. from Reigate, on the borders of Kent.

BLACK-GROVE, a farm in the parish of Tandridge, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Bletchingley.

BLACKHEATH, a hundred, which takes its name from the heath of the same name, lying N. E. of Guildford, on the southerly side of the county, bordering on Sussex; being bounded eastwardly by the hundred of Wooton; westwardly by the hundred of Godalming; northwardly by the hundred of Woking, and southerly by Sussex.—[For the parishes in this hundred, see the general description of the county, preceding the alphabetical.]

BLACK-HOUSE, a farm in the parish of Horley, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Reigate.

BLETCHINGLEY, a borough town and parish in the hundred of Tandridge, 5 miles E. from Reigate, 2 W.

from Godstone, and 20 S.S.E. from London; containing, in 1801, 136 houses, and 1344 inhabitants, of whom 90 were returned as being employed in trade. Population in 1811, 1116; in 1821, 1187.—This borough has sent members to Parliament ever since the 23d of Edward I. It is pleasantly situated on a hill by the side of Holmesdale. The church is a venerable gothic building, and near it is a charity-school for 20 boys, and an almshouse for 10 poor men and women. The right of voting is in burgage tenure; the bailiff, who is the principal magistrate, being the returning officer. It has no market. The living is a rectory, value 19*l.* 19*s.* 4*d.*; patron for this *Turn*, and incumbent, Rev. Jervis Kenrick. The elective franchise is under the influence of W. Russell, Esq. of Bernard-castle, Durham. Here are fairs on 22d June and 22d November for cattle; the latter more peculiarly for hogs.

BLETCHINGLEY-PLACE, formerly an extensive mansion and residence of the proprietor of the borough and manor of Bletchingley, now a farm, the property of *Sir William Clayton*, with many other farms in the parish of Bletchingley; some of the principal ones mentioned under their respective names in this work.

BLOCKFIELD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, rather extensive; at the south-eastern extremity of the county, adjoining to Sussex.

BLUE-HOUSE-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Limpsfield, 9½ miles E. from Reigate, on the borders of Kent.

BLUNT-HOUSE, in the parish and near the southerly

side of the town of Croydon, 10½ miles S.S.E. from London-bridge; a spacious mansion, with extensive grounds; the seat of *John Kymer, Esq.*

BOCKET-FARM, a farm in the parish of Letherhead, 4½ miles S.S.W. from Epsom.

BOLINBROKE-GROVE, an elegant mansion, with handsome pleasure grounds, in the parish of Battersea, on the east side of Wandsworth-common; 5 miles S.W. from London-bridge; the seat of *William Wilks, Esq.*

BOLT-HOUSE-FARM, in the parish of Limpsfield, 9½ miles E. from Reigate, on the borders of Kent.

BOMBER'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Crowhurst, 11 miles E. from Reigate, on the borders of Kent.

BONES-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horne, 8 miles S. E. from Reigate.

BOOKHAM-GREAT, a parish in the hundred of Coptorn, 6 miles S.W. from Epsom, 4 N.N.W. from Dorking, and 21 S.W. from London; containing in 1801, 104 houses, and 587 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 606; in 1821, 732.—The church is an ancient building, erected by the Convent of Chertsey in 1340; and the living is a vicarage, value 9*l.* 17*s.* 3*d.* Patron, Mr. Heberden; incumbent, Rev. G. Andrewes.

BOOKHAM-GROVE, in the parish of Great Bookham, 2½ miles S.W. from Letherhead, and 21 S.W. from London; an elegant mansion, with handsome pleasure-grounds; the property of William Dawney, Esq.; for-

merly the residence of the Honourable Catherine Downey, and the dowager Lady Downe, and now that of *Thomas Champion, Esq.*

BOOKHAM-LITTLE, a parish in the hundred of Copthorne, $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile S.W. from Bookham-great, $6\frac{3}{4}$ miles S.W. from Epsom, and 22 S.W. from London; containing in 1801, 20 houses, and 119 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 137; in 1821, 153.—The living is a rectory, value 6*l.* 15*s.* 7*d.* Patron, Mrs. Pollen; incumbent, Rev. Henry Mears. In this parish, near the church, are a handsome house and grounds, lately the residence of *Miss Polhill*, now unoccupied.

BOTLEY, detached houses, in the parish, and distant $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile S.W. from the town, of Chertsey Beomond.

BOTLEY-HILL-HOUSE, in the parish of Titsey, with a farm in the occupation of *Mr. Hersey*; the property of the Honourable Leveson Gower. On Botley-Hill are the remains of a Roman camp.

BOTLEY-HOLE. See CHEVINGTON.

BOTLEY'S-COTTAGE, in the parish, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile S. of the town, of Chertsey, and $23\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.W. from London, near Botley's-park; a neat villa residence, lately of Mrs. Merry, and now of *Miss Hollings*.

BOTLEY'S-PARK, in the parish, and $1\frac{3}{4}$ mile S.W. of the town, of Chertsey, and $23\frac{3}{4}$ S.W. from London; an elegant and extensive modern mansion, and also a very extensive park, with gardens, plantations, &c. in a situation a little elevated, having prospects over the immediate

neighbourhood, which is flat, particularly to the north, over the Thames; the seat of *Mr. Joseph Mawbey*, lately purchased by *David Hall, Esq.*

BOUGHTON-HALL, in the parish of Send, $4\frac{3}{4}$ miles N.N.E. from Guildford; a handsome modern mansion, the residence of *Robert Boughton, Esq.*

BOWER'S-LAND, a farm in the parish of Crowhurst, 11 miles E.S.E. from Reigate, on the borders of Kent.

BOWLER'S-GREEN, scattered houses in the parish of Thursley, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.W. from Godalming.

BOWLING-GREEN-HOUSE, pleasantly situated on Putney-heath, near to the elegant villages of Roehampton and Wimbledon, $7\frac{3}{4}$ miles S.W. from London-bridge; the property and lately the residence of — Franks, Esq. and now occupied by *Miss Moseley*, for a ladies' seminary.

BOX-HILL-COTTAGE, a neat villa residence of *Mrs. Clarke*, situate at the foot of Box-hill, in the parish of Mickleham, $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile N. from Dorking, and $21\frac{1}{2}$ S.S.W. from London.

BOX-HILL-FARM, a very extensive farm at the foot of Box-Hill, in the parish, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile N. E. from the town, of Dorking.

BOYLE-FARM, in the parish of Thames-Ditton, on the banks of the Thames, 2 miles S.S.W. from Kingston, and 14 miles W.S.W. from London-bridge; a handsome mansion, the seat of the Right Honorable *Lord Fitz-*

gerald, also another mansion, the property of Lord Fitzgerald, and the present residence of *Sir Charles Sullivan, Bart.*

BRADLEY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Woking, 5 mile N.W. from Guildford.

BRAGS-LAND, an extensive farm in the parish, and $1\frac{1}{4}$ mile S. from the town of Reigate.

BRAMLEY, a hamlet to the parish of Shalford, hundred of Blackheath, 3 miles from Guildford, on the road from Guildford to Brighton, and 23 S.W. from London; containing, by the census of 1821, 111 houses, and 707 inhabitants. This is a pleasant hamlet, adjoining to Wonershpark, and contains several neat residences, amongst which are those of *Mr. Lambert*; *Mr. Matthews*; *Mr. Rudge*.

BREWHOUSE-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Oxted, 8 miles E. from Reigate, near the borders of Kent.

BRICK-HOUSE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Charlwood, 5 miles S. from Reigate.

BRIDGCOMB-FARM, a farm in the parish of Buckland, 4 miles E. N. E. from Dorking.

BRIDGE-FARM, a farm in a detached part of the parish of Albury, between the parishes of Cranley and Aldfold, $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. E. from Guildford.

BRIDGEHAM-FARM, a farm in the parish of Burston, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Reigate.

BRIGHTON-PLACE, a farm in the parish of Horley, 5 miles S. S. E. from Reigate.

BRISKET-FARM, a farm in the parish of Wistley, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Weybridge.

BRISTER-FARM, a farm in the hamlet of Frimley and parish of Ash, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Bagshot.

BRIXTON, the name of a hundred, being the north-eastern point of the county; divided from Middlesex by the Thames, north; and adjoining to Kent, east; and to the hundreds of Kingston, west; and Wallington, south.— [For the parishes contained in this hundred, see the general description of the county, preceding the alphabetical.]

BRIXTON, a hamlet to the parish of Lambeth, containing Brixton-causeway, North-brixton, and Brixton-hill; the last a pleasing eminence, 4 miles S. from London-bridge, on the road to Croydon; on and near which are a great number of elegant modern villa residences, too numerous for insertion, amongst which are those of — *Hayter, Esq.*; — *Field, Esq.*; — *Bayley, Esq.* At Brixton-causeway, *Mrs. Lambert*, lady of the manor, and here, and at North-Brixton, are many handsome modern residences, too numerous to be introduced here; and in this neighbourhood are many villas mentioned under their several names.

BROAD-BRIDGE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Burston, $8\frac{1}{4}$ miles S. E. from Reigate.

BROAD-STONE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horley, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Reigate.

BROCKHAM-GREEN, in the parish of Betchworth, 2 miles E. from Dorking, on the River Mole; a number of neat detached villa residences, amid beautiful scenery. See **BETCHWORTH**.

BROCKHAM-HURST, an extensive farm in the parish of Betchworth, 3 miles S. E. from Dorking.

BROCKHAM-WARREN, a handsome modern villa, with extensive plantations, &c. on an eminence on the south-east side of Box-hill, commanding extensive and delightful prospects over the surrounding country, and the picturesque scenery with which the neighbourhood abounds; being in the parish of Betchworth, $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles E. N. E. from Dorking; the summer residence of — *Mackley Brown, Esq.*

BROCKLAND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Cranley, 10 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.

BROMLEY'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Buckland, 2 miles W. from Reigate.

BROOK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Reigate.

BROOK-GREEN, what its name implies, in the parish of Witley, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Godalming, near which are a number of scattered houses.

BROOK-LANDS, a farm in the parish of Leigh, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Reigate.

BROOK-PLACE, in the parish of Cobham, 4 miles N. W.

from Letherhead, and 20 S. W. from London-bridge; on the left of the road from London to Guildford, a handsome mansion, with pleasure grounds and plantations, the property of Major-General James Moore, brother of the late General Sir John Moore, and the present residence of *J. S. Reeves, Esq.*

BROOKS-FARM, a farm in the parish, and half-a-mile N. from the town, of Reigate.

BROOKS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chertsey Beomond, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. W. from that town.

BROOME-HOUSE, situated in the delightful village of Betchworth, 3 miles E. N. E. from Dorking, and $20\frac{1}{2}$ S. S. W. from London-bridge; on the south-east side of Box-hill, an elegant mansion, with very ornamental gardens and pleasure grounds, in which the house is embowered, and through which flows a transparent stream of water, forming a lake, by the side of a sequestered valley (on the eastwardly side of the grounds), called *Tranquil Dale*, by which name sometimes has passed this beautiful seat of *William Kenrick, Esq.* a Judge on the Welch circuit.

BROOM-FARM, an extensive farm in the hamlet of Chelsham, $7\frac{1}{4}$ miles S. E. from Croydon, near Broom-Lodge.

BROOMFIELD-HOUSE, an elegant mansion, in the parish of Battersea, 4 miles S. W. from London-bridge, desirably situated between the west side of Clapham-common and Wandsworth-common, surrounded by extensive beautiful pleasure grounds, with shrubberies, &c.

being (though so near town) a delightful rural situation, the seat of *John Deacon, Esq.*

BROOM-LODGE, in the hamlet of Chelsham and parish of Warlingham, $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Croydon, and $17\frac{1}{2}$ S. S. E. from London; a good modern dwelling-house adjoining to Broom-Farm, which with that farm are the property of *Sir William Leighton*, at present in the care of servants.

BROWN'S-FARM, a farm on the south side of Farnham and Frensham-Commous, in the parish of Frensham, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. W. from Farnham.

BROWN'S-HILL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Bletchingley, 6 miles E. S. E. from Reigate.

BUCKLAND, a parish in the hundred of Reigate, $3\frac{3}{4}$ miles E. N. E. from Dorking, $2\frac{1}{4}$ W. N. W. from Reigate, and 21 S. S. W. from London; containing, in 1801, 47 houses, and 269 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 287; in 1821, 292. The living is a rectory, value 11*l.* 12*s.* 11*d.* in the patronage of All Souls College, Oxford; incumbent, the Rev. Charles E. Keene. This village is situate in Holmesdale, and is sheltered from the north by Box-Hill, and the chain of hills extending from thence eastwardly towards Kent, and is a pretty village adjoining westwardly to Betchworth, and beautified by the scenery adjoining that and Dorking. Near the church here is an extensive ancient mansiou, surrounded by most beautiful pleasure grounds (on a side of which are stables erected in a circular form, very lofty), the seat of *George Beaumont, Esq.* the principal proprietor of the parish; and at a short distance northwardly is the rectory-house,

a handsome modern erection, the *Rev. Charles E. Keene*, rector.

BUCKLAND-FARM. See TATSFIELD-PARK-FARM.

BULAY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Croydon (near Norwood), $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. N. E. from that town.

BULLOCK'S-LANE-HOUSE, with a farm, in the parish of Stoke-Dabernon, 2 miles N. W. from Leatherhead.

BUNTS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 4 miles S. W. from Reigate.

BURFORD-LODGE, an elegant modern small mansion, with extensive pleasure grounds, in a low situation, in the parish of Mickleham, at the foot of Box-Hill, by the side of the River Mole and the road from London to Dorking, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. from Dorking, and $21\frac{1}{4}$ S. S. W. from London; being rendered, by the scenery here mentioned, a beautiful seat of *Mrs. Barclay*, widow of the late — Barclay, Esq. a Magistrate for the county.

BURGH-HOUSE, in the parish of Banstead, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Epsom, and $16\frac{1}{2}$ S. S. W. from London; an elegant mansion, the seat of *Lady Elizabeth Perceval*.

BURHILL-HOUSE, a handsome house, pleasantly situated fronting to the River Mole, in the parish of Walton-on-Thames, near the pleasant village of Weybridge, 6 miles S. W. from Kingston, and 18 S. W. from London-bridge, the seat of *Mrs. Tynte*.

BURNETT-FARM, a farm in the parish of Shalford, 4 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.

BURNYFOLD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Dunsfold, on the borders of Sussex, 6½ miles S. S. E. from Godalming.

BURNT-STUBS, in the hamlet of Chessington, in the parish of Ewell, 4½ miles W. N. W. from Epsom, and 16¾ S. W. from London-bridge, the residence of — *Armytage, Esq.*

BURSTOW, a parish in the hundred of Reigate, 7 miles S. E. from Reigate, and 28 S. E. from London, on the borders of Sussex; containing, in 1801, 103 houses, and 606 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 601; in 1821, 715. It is a rectory, value 15*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.*, in the patronage of the King; incumbent, Rev. A. E. Howman. On a large common in the neighbourhood formerly stood a chapel of ease.

BURSTOW-COURT-LODGE, an extensive farm in the parish of Burstow, 7 miles S. S. E. from Reigate, in the occupation of Mr. John Diger, the property of Mr. Bainbridge, of Croydon.

BURSTOW-LODGE, in the parish of Burstow, 5¾ miles E. S. E. from Reigate; a handsome house, the residence of *Melancthon Sanders, Esq.* owner and occupier of this and other farms adjoining.

BURSTOW-PARK, in the parish of Burstow, on the borders of Sussex, 5 miles E. S. E. from Reigate, and 26 miles S. from London; a handsome mansion, and a

considerable extent of land, the property and residence of *Henry Kelsey, Esq.*

BURTLEY-FARMS, UPPER and LOWER, in the parish of Witley, 9¼ and 10 miles S. W. from Godalming.

BURWELL-COURT, in the hamlet of Hook, in the parish of Kingston, 4¾ miles S. from that town, and 16¾ S. W. from London-bridge, late the residence of John Kaymer, Esq. now of ———

BURWOOD-COTTAGE, in the parish of Walton-on-Thames, a neat villa residence of *John Smith, Esq.* 17½ miles S. W. from London-bridge.

BURWOOD-HOUSE, a handsome mansion, with extensive pleasure grounds and plantations, pleasantly situated fronting the River Mole, in the eastern part of the parish of Walton-on-Thames, towards Cobham, on the road from London to Guildford and Portsmouth, 7 miles S. W. from Kingston, and 19 S. W. from London-bridge; the seat of Vice-Admiral *Sir Thomas Williams.*

BURWOOD-LODGE, a handsome house in the parish of Walton-on-Thames, near the pleasant village of Weybridge, 6 miles S. W. from Kingston, and 18 S. W. from London-bridge, the residence of *Mrs. Shaw.*

BURWOOD-PARK, a magnificent mansion, with an extensive park, on the west side of the River Mole, in the parish of Walton-on-Thames, 2 miles S. E. from the pleasant village of Weybridge, between Oatlands and Claremont, 6 miles S. W. from Kingston, and 18 S. W. from London Bridge, the seat of *Sir John Frederick, Bart.*

BURY-HILL-PARK, in the parish of Dorking, $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles W. S.W. from that town, and 24 S. S.W. from London; a handsome modern mansion, with extensive plantations and pleasure grounds, and a beautiful lawn, with a gentle descent to the edge of a fine sheet of water, the seat of *Robert Barclay, Esq.*

BUSBRIDGE-HALL, in the parish of Godalming, $1\frac{1}{4}$ mile south from that town, and 35 S. S.W. from London; an elegant and extensive modern mansion, pleasantly situated in a valley in an extensive park, which is beautifully laid out and ornamented with fine trees, shrubberies, a grotto, lake, cascade, gardens, &c. &c. being a most delightful retired situation, the seat of *H. H. Townsend, Esq.*

BUSH-HOUSE, a farm in the parish of Horley, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Reigate.

BUSY-ONE'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chiddingfold, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Godalming.

BUTCHERS-POND-FARM, a farm in the hamlet of Ripley and parish of Send, 5 miles N. N. E. from Guildford.

BYES-FARM, a farm in the parish of Nutfield, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Reigate.

BYFLEET, a parish in the hundred of Godley and Chertsey, near the Wey, 2 miles W. N.W. from Cobham, and 22 S.W. from London; containing, in 1801, 67 houses, and 362 inhabitants. Population in 1811, 392; in 1821, 427. There was formerly a royal palace in this place, and at Dorney-House King Henry the Eighth

was nursed. The living is a rectory, value 9*l.* 11*s.* 8*d.*, patron, the King; incumbent, Rev. George Sewell. Besides West-Lodge, there are here the residences of *Mr. Bowyer*, and *Miss Shapnell*.

BYFLEET-PARK, in the parish of Byfleet, probably formerly annexed to the royal palace, is now a very extensive farm, with a good house, the residence of *Mr. Langton*.

BYSHE-COURT, in the parish of Horne, 6 miles S.W. from Godstone; an extensive farm, with an excellent house, the present residence of *Mr. William Rhodes*, the property of ——— of London.

CÆSAR'S-CAMP, the site of a Roman encampment, on Hungry-hill, at the northern extremity of the parish of Farnham, adjoining to Hampshire.

CAMBERWELL, a parish in the hundred of Brixton, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. E. from London-bridge; containing, by the census of 1811, 1939 houses, and 11,309 inhabitants, including the hamlets of Dulwich and Peckham; and by the census of 1821, 17,876 inhabitants. The living is a vicarage, value 20*l.*, patron *J. Windham, Esq.*; incumbent, the Rev. Edward Smith. The church is an ancient building of stone. In the middle of Camberwell is the Green, surrounded with good houses and shops; and here is held a fair on the 18th of August, numerous attended by the Londoners. This place has been considerably improved of late years by numerous modern buildings in the neighbourhood, for the residence of
