GADBROOK-FARM, an extensive farm, in the delightful village of Betchworth, 4½ miles E.S.E. from Dorking.

GADWICK-FARM, a handsome ancient mansion and a farm, near the River Mole, in the parish of Charlwood, 5½ miles S. from Reigate, on the left of the road from thence to Brighton, nearly opposite to Kimberham-park, the property and residence of John Sharp, Esq.

GANDER'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Reigate, half-a-mile S.W. from the town.

GARBOROUGH - HOUSE, a spacious and elegant mansion, with extensive gardens and pleasure grounds, walled and beautifully ornamented with trees and water, a quarter of a mile W. of the town of Ewell, and 15\(\frac{3}{4}\) S. from London, through which passes the road from London through Epsom, to Dorking and Guildford; the seat of Lady Barrott.

In these grounds arises the spring by which they are watered, being equally singular for its strength and crystaline appearance; which, besides adding ornamentally to these premises, is here immediately applied to useful purposes, in turning the machinery of several mills, and forms a river, which flows through Epsom-court meadows, and discharges itself into the Thames at Kingston, turning the machinery of other mills in its course.

GARRET, in the parish of Banstead, on the left of the road from London, through Sutton and Reigate, to

Brighton, half-a-mile S. S.W. from the village, and 15 S. from London; a handsome mansion, the seat of ——

Archibald, Esq.

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GARRET-FARM, a farm in the southerly part of the parish of Ockley, bordering on Sussex, 9 miles S. from Dorking.

GARSTON, in the parish of Wonersh, 6 miles S.S.E. from Guildford.

GARSTON HALL, in the parish of Coulsdon, between the roads from London, through Godstone and Reigate, to Brighton, 5½ miles S. from Croydon, and 15½ S. from London; a handsome house, the residence of John Hitchins, Esq.

GARSTON-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chobham, 6 miles S.W. from Chertsey-Beomond.

GASTON-FARM, a farm in the parish of Esher, adjoining to West-end-common, 5 miles S.W. from Guildford.

GASTON-HOUSE, in the parish of Bletchingley, 20 miles S. from London; a handsome house, the property of Sir William Clayton, and the present residence of the Rev. H. Poynder, rector of Horne.

GATE-HOUSE, an extensive farm, in the parish of Godstone, 5 miles S. from the village, on the east side of the road to Brighton.

GATTON, a borough in the hundred of Reigate, 21 miles

N.E. from Reigate, and 18 miles S. from London; containing, by the census of 1821, 23 houses, and 135 inhabitants. Although now so small a village, it was once a very considerable town, and is supposed to have been a Roman station: it has sent members to parliament ever since the reign of Henry the Sixth; they are returned by the constable, who is annually chosen at the lord of the manor's court by seven electors. The church is a small low building. Gatton is situated on an eminence, on the range of hills on the north side of Holmesdale, through which, in a valley, at Merstham, passes the London and Brighton roads, on the easterly side of Gatton, towards which, and southerly towards Reigate, the sloping hill is almost covered with woods and park, presenting a conspicuous display of most beautiful scenery, in the elegant seats of Gatton-park and Upper-Gatton, &c. (which see.) The living is a rectory, value 91. 2s. 8d. in the patronage of Sir Mark Wood, Bart.: incumbent, Rev. William Paget.

GATTON-LODGE, in the parish of Gatton, a handsome residence of Sir George Wood.

GATTON-PARK, or LOWER-GATTON, in the parish of Gatton, an elegant and spacious modern mansion, delightfully situated; in a very extensive park, in which are fine woods and rows of stately trees, highly ornamental, and of great extent; on the south-east side of a commanding eminence, on the right of the road from London, through Croydon, and on the left of that through Sutton to Reigate and Brighton, 18 miles S. from London; having on the south Holmesdale, and on the north a part of the chain of hills extending parallel to that valley, from Dorking to the borders of Kent;

and at the foot of the eminence a lake of about 40 acres, stocked with various water fowl, and two well-planted islands; the seat of Sir Mark Wood, Bart.

GERMANY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ewhurst, 7 miles S.W. from Dorking.

GIG'S-HILL, in the parish of Thames-Ditton, 2½ miles S. S.W. from Kingston, and 12½ W. S.W. from London; a handsome villa residence of John Sudlow, Esq.

GILDABLES, a farm in the parish of Limpsfield, the property of the Trustees of the College at Croydon, 9 miles E.S.E. from Croydon.

GIPSEY-HOUSE, an elegant small house, in the hamlet of Norwood and parish of Lambeth, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from London-bridge; the seat of — Waring, Esq.

GIVONS-GROVE, a handsome mansion, situated in the parish of Letherhead, 1 mile S. from the village, and 19½ S.S.W. from London, between Letherhead and Dorking; possessing all the varieties of beautiful scenery in hills and dales, parks and woods, and the River Mole; the seat of *Henry Bolton*, *Esq.* lord of the manor of Letherhead.

GODALMING, the name of a hundred at the southwestern point of the county, on the borders of Sussex, by which it is bounded on the south; by the hundred of Godalming, on the east; and by those of Farnham west, and Woking south. [For the parishes contained in this hundred, see the general description of the county, preceding the alphabetical.]

GODALMING, a market town and parish in the hundred of Godalming, 4 miles S.S.W. from Guildford, and 34 S.S.W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 474 houses, and 3405 inhabitants, of whom 582 families were returned as being employed in various trades, &c. Population in 1811, 3548; and in 1821, 4.098. It is delightfully situated in a valley, by the side of the River Wey; where that river, which is navigable to London, divides itself into several small streams; the waters abound with good fish, particularly pike. The church is a neat building, with a high and handsome spire; besides which, here are a quakers' meeting-house, two chapels for dissenters, a good charity-school, and on the common a hospital, endowed for 10 old men. The parish is divided into nine tithings: the town is governed by a warden and eight assistants, with a bailiff. It has several manufactories for weaving stockings, and one for the patent fleecy hosiery, and some coarse woollens are manufactured here; but these trades are all, latterly, declined. On the river are a grist-mill, two paper-mills, and three corn mills. The market is on Saturday: fairs 13th February, and 10th July. The living is a vicarage, value 23l. 17s. 11d. in the patronage of the Earl of Radnor; incumbent, the Rev. Robert Ekins. In this neighbourhood are many elegant seats, mentioned under their respective names. In the town are many respectable residents.

GODLEY and CHERTSEY, the name of a hundred, being the north-western point of the county, divided on

the N. from Berks, Bucks, and Middlesex, by the Thames, and bounded on the west and south by the hundred of Woking, and on the east by Elmbridge. [For the parishes contained in this hundred, see the general description of the county, preceding the alphabetical.]

GODSTONE, a parish in the hundred of Tandridge, 61 miles E. from Reigate, and 19 S. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 183 houses, and 1081 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 1156; and of 1821, 1210 inhabitants. The church is on an eminence, at a distance from the principal part of the village. The living is a vicarage, value $9l. 11s. 5\frac{1}{2}d.$; patrons, Thomas Boone, Esq. and Son. The road from London, through Croydon, to Brighton, divides into two branches at Smitham-Bottom, near Croydon; and one passes through this place, and the other through Reigate. The Green. which is surrounded by neat houses, being the principal part of the village, is pleasantly situated in Holmesdale. having the chain of hills bounding it and that valley, on the north, under which stands the Rookery, one of the principal seats here (which see.) The parish is narrow. but extends parallel with Tandridge parish, north and south, about 12 miles, having the elegant seats of Marden-park at its northerly extremity, and of Felbridgepark for its southerly; containing many extensive farms: and in the parish and neighbourhood there are many elegant seats, mentioned under their respective names. In the village, not so mentioned, are handsome houses, the residences of Charles Newberry, Esq., D. Maile Getting, Esq., and others.

- GOSDEN-HOUSE, in the parish of Shalford, 2½ miles S. from Guildford; a handsome house and grounds, the property of —— Sparkes, Esq., and the present residence of —— Farmer, Esq.
- GRAFFHAM-FARM, an extensive farm, with a very good house, in the parish of Dunsfold, near which passes the road from Guildford to Brighton, and the Junction Canal, 5 miles S. from Guildford; the residence of Mr. Agar.
- GRANGE, a handsome ancient house, and an extensive farm, on the north-west side of the Castle, near Farnham, a quarter of a mile from the town.
- GRANTS'-FARM, in the parish of Limpsfield, 4 miles E. from Godstone.
- GRAVEL'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ewhurst, 7½ miles S.W. from Dorking.

- GRAY'S-WOOD, and GRAY'S-WOOD-COMMON, adjoining to each other, at the junction of the parish of Witley, with those of Haslemere and Chiddingfold, on the road from Godalming to Haslemere, three quarters of a mile N. from Haslemere, near which are good houses of Miss Perry, Mr. Mellish, and Mr. Bishop, the last having very handsome pleasure-grounds, &c.
- GREAT-BOOKHAM .- See BOOKHAM.
- GREAT-FOSTER-HOUSE, in the parish of Egham, 1 mile south from Egham, and 19 W. S.W. from London, a long-established large house for the reception of lunatics, under the joint care of eminent surgeons, viz. Mr. Chapman, of Windsor; Mr. Furnawell, of Egham; Mr. Somers, of Chertsey; and another.
- GREAT-LODGE, in Richmond-park. See RICHMOND and RICHMOND-PARK.
- GREAT-MANOR-HILL, a farm in the parish of Cranley, 7 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.
- GREAT-MINTERS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 4 miles S.W. from Reigate.
- GREAT-ROKE, a farm in the parish of Coulsdon, 3½ miles S. from Croydon.
- GREAT-SOMERSBURY, a farm in the parish of Ewhurst, 9½ miles S.W. from Dorking.
- GREAT-TANGLEY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Shalford, 3 miles S. E. from Guildford.

- GREAT-WIGGY, a farm in the parish of Reigate, 2 miles S. E. from the town.
- GREAT-WILDWOOD, a farm in the parish of Alfold, 10 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.
- GREAT-WOODCOT-FARM. See WOODCOT-FARM (GREAT.)
- GREENIN'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Charlwood, 7 miles S.W. from Reigate.
- GREENLANDS, in the parish of Caterham, 8 miles south from Croydon, and 18 south from London, the residence of *Mr. Buxton*.
- GREEN'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Frensham, adjoining Frensham Upper Common, 5 miles N.W. from Haslemere.
- GREENWOOD-LODGE, in the parish of Putney, 8 miles S.W. from London-bridge, on a pleasing eminence, near to the elegant villages of Roehampton and Wimbledon, and to Richmond-park, a spacious elegant mansion, with beautiful pleasure-grounds, plantations, &c. the seat of Sir Thomas Harvie Farquhar, Bart.
- GROVE, (The) in the parish of Dorking, three-quarters of a mile north from the town, towards Mickleham, and 22 miles S. S.W. from London, in the valley at the foot of Box-hill, adjoining to the river Mole; on the left of the road from London to Dorking; a thatched cottage, almost hidden from view in beautiful gardens, built by a Mr. Reeves, some time since the residence of the

- Marquis of Wellesley, and now the residence of Miss Singer.
- GROVE-COTTAGE, in the parish of Walton-on-Thames, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles west from Kingston, and $16\frac{1}{2}$ W. S.W. from London, a handsome modern villa residence, with neat pleasure-grounds and plantations, of *Thomas Blair*, Esq.
- GROVE-COTTAGE, in the parish of Woking, 5 miles north from Guildford, a neat residence of Mr. Sparks.
- GROVE-FARM, a farm in Smitham-bottom, in the parish of Coulsdon, 3½ miles S. S.W. from Croydon.
- GROVE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chertsey Beomond, three-quarters of a mile west from the town.
- GROVE-HOUSE (in Ewell.) See EWELL-GROVE.
- GROVE-HOUSE (in Epsom.) See Epsom Grove House.
- GROVE-HOUSE, in the parish, and near to the town, of Kingston, a quarter of a mile south from Kingston, and 12½ miles W.S.W. from London-bridge, the residence of Mr. Fasset.
- GROVE-HOUSE, in the hamlet of Frimley, 10 miles N. from Fareham, and 30 W. S.W. from London, the property of Knight, Esq. near Windsor, and the present residence of Mr. Wm. Russell.
- GROVE-HOUSE, in the parish of Croydon, 4 miles north from that town, and 6 miles south from London-bridge,

a handsome dwelling-house, the residence of Mr. Nicholas Palmer.

GROVE-HOUSE, a handsome house, in the hamlet of Lower Tooting, 6½ miles S. S.W. from London, the residence of — Freeman, Esq.

GROVE-HOUSE, in the parish of Clapham, between St. Paul's church and Clapham-common, 4½ miles W. S.W. from London-bridge, a spacious mansion, the residence of Charles Elliott, Esq.

GROVE-HOUSE, in the parish of Mitcham, a quarter of a mile south from the village, and $8\frac{1}{4}$ S. S. W. from London, an elegant mansion, formerly the residence of Lord Clive, and now the seat of *Henry Hoare*, Esq. Banker.

GUILDFORD, a borough and market-town, consisting of 3 parishes, in the hundred of Woking, 30 miles S.W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 464 houses and 2634 inhabitants, viz. 1242 males and 1392 females, of whom 495 families were returned as being employed in various trades, &c. Population in 1811, 2984; and, in 1821, 3161. It is pleasantly situated on the side of a chalk hill, on the banks of the river Wey; was anciently a royal town, and has often been the residence of our monarchs. Part of the remains of its castle are still visible, especially the square tower or keep, which has been a place of great strength, though history does not inform us by whom it was built. The tower fell down in 1700. Here are also some remains of a palace of great extent, and from the various ruins of foundations that have been dug up, the greater part of the declivity of the hill on the east side of the Wey, appears to have been once occupied by buildings. Trinity church, which

fell down in 1740, has been since rebuilt of brick. Here were formerly two monasteries, the remains of one of which became the property of Lord Onslow, and is still inhabited, part of it affording accommodation for the Judges during the assizes, and part of it is converted into a boarding-school. The structure is gothic. Here is an elegant town-hall and council-chamber. The town was first incorporated by Henry I. The corporation consists of a mayor, 7 magistrates, and about 20 bailiffs, who hold a court every three weeks, and the mayor, recorder, and two of the bailiffs, are justices of the peace for the corporation and liberties of Stoke above Bar; the mayor also continues in his commission for a year after his mayoralty expires. It sends two members to parliament, and the mayor is the returning officer. Guildford gives title of Earl to the family of North. The grammarschool is an elegant gothic structure, and is handsomely endowed. In 1789, a county hall was built in this parish, together with suitable offices, at the expense of Lords Onslow and Grantley, adjoining to which was also built, in the same year, a very commodious playhouse. The clothing-trade, which was once very considerable here, has declined. On the Merrow downs, near the town, is a circular race-course, where a plate of 100 guineas value, left by King William III. is annually run for in the Whitsunweek, at which time there are also three subscription plates run for, exclusive of private matches. In a spacious cockpit near this spot, the diversion of cock-fighting is pursued every forenoon on the racing days. These diversions are often brilliantly attended, and the town is crowded with numerous visitants. The river Wey was made navigable to Guildford about the year 1656, by which the parish and town carry on a considerable trade in corn, malt, beer. &c. to the metropolis. In the neighbourhood of Guildford the country is pleasantly varied by hills and valleys.

The valley through which the river Wey flows, is a fine valley; and the part of it extending from Pepper Harrow, where is the seat of Lord Middleton, upwards of 5 miles S.W. from Guildford, to the commencement of the parish of Woking, about 4 miles N.W. from Guildford, contains a number of seats and beautiful grounds, and between Godalming and Guildford is of considerable breadth, having on each side high hills and hanging woods; and on the north-east side of Guildford are the fine grounds of Stoke-park and Sutton-place, and others. There is also a beautiful valley on the right of the road to Dorking, particularly near the village of Albury. The road from Guildford to Farnham is very picturesque, running along a ridge of high chalky hills, not much wider than the road itself, from which are very extensive prospects. The market is on Saturday, and is well supplied. The fairs are on the 4th of May, 2d of October, and the 22d of November. The churches of St. Mary and St. Trinity are rectories, united, in the patronage of the crown, the former valued at 121. 5s. 5d., the latter at 111. 11s. Incumbent for both, Rev. James Weller, D.D. St. Nicholas is a rectory, value 211.0s. 10d. in the patronage of the Dean of Sarum. Incumbent the Rev. Edward Fulham.

In this parish and neighbourhood there are many elegant seats, mentioned under their respective names, and in the town are handsome residences, too numerous for insertion here. Amongst which are those of J. B. Shrubb, Esq.; Caleb Woodyer, Esq.; and Francis Skurrey, Esq.

GUILHAM'S-LODGE, in the parish of Cuddington, 2 miles S.E. from Ewell, and 15½ S. from London, the property of William Northey, Esq. of Woodcotepark, let along with the manor farm to, and the latter being the residence of Mr. Robert Lewin.

- HALE, in the parish of Farnham, 1 mile N.E. from that town; a small neat villa residence of James Smithers, Esq.
- HALE, a hamlet or tything to the parish of Farnham, 1 mile N. E. from the town.
- HALE-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Nutfield, 3 miles E. S. E. from Reigate; the property of the Devisees of the late Mr. Russell of Reigate, and the present residence of Mr. Dives, owner and occupier of King's-mill and Barnets-farms, in the same parish.

- HALFPENNY-FARM, a farm in the parish of St. Martha, 2½ miles S. E. from Guildford.
- HALING-GROVE, in the parish of Croydon, 1½ miles S. from that town; between that and the Woodcotdowns; pleasantly situated near the beautiful grounds of Haling-park; a very handsome modern villa residence of Mr. Charles Bleaden, of the City of London Tavern.
- HALING-PARK, 1 mile S. from the town of Croydon, and 11 S. from London-bridge; a spacious and elegant mansion, and a park, the latter containing within its pales about 100 acres of rich land, beautifully situated in the westerly side of the road from London through Croydon to Brighton, ornamented with fine trees, and gently sloping to that road, at the commencement of the valley, which stretches along the side of the Woodcot-downs,

having the high grounds of Coombe-house and Sanderstead on the east; being one of the many elegant seats in the neighbourhood of Croydon; the property of—— Hammond, Esq., and the present residence of *Charles Burnet*, *Esq*.

HALL-FARM, in the parish of Oxted, a rather extensive farm, 9 miles E. from Reigate.

HALL-GROVE, in the parish of Windlesham, on the left of the road from London to Portsmouth, 1 mile from Bagshot; a handsome mansion, with extensive plantation; the residence of *Mrs. Birt*.

HALLOO-FARM, a farm in the parish of Woldingham, 6 miles S. S. E. from Croydon.

HALL-PLACE, in the parish of Merrow, near the church, 2 miles E. N. E. from Guildford, on the left of the road from thence through Epsom to London; a handsome modern residence of —— Tinker, Esq.

HAM, a hamlet to the parish of Kingston, in the hundred of Kingston, between Richmond and Kingston, 2 miles S. from the former, and 1½ N. from the latter, and 11 W.S.W. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 105 houses, and 557 inhabitants; and by the census of 1821, 157 houses, and 961 inhabitants. It is beautifully situated on the banks of the Thames, the country on the sides of that river here being ornamented with extensive parks, woods, and groves, adjoining to the elegant village of Petersham, and the unequalled grounds of Ham-house. Here are many handsome seats. Besides those mentioned under their respective names; the fol-

lowing, viz.: on and near to Ham-common, a mansion of Admiral Sir John Sutton; the Rev. — Hoare; Mrs. Cotton; Captain Pownall; a handsome house, the property of General Eden, and the present residence of Mrs. Barrett; Samuel Nicholson, Esq.; a mansion, which was the residence of the late Lord Torrington; General Forbes; Capt. Halliday; Fitzwilliam Henry Barnard, Esq.; Major Hooks; Sir Everard Holme; Rev. Joseph France; Mrs. M. Grove; John Charles Girardot, Esq.; General Blatchford; Mrs. Goolding, &c.

HAMBLEDON, a parish in the hundred of Godalming, 3½ miles S. from Godalming, and 37 S.S.W. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 53 houses, and 459 inhabitants; and by the census of 1811, 384; and of 1821, 381 inhabitants. The church is a very ancient small building. The living is a vicarage; value, 6l. 7s. 11d.; patron, Earl of Radnor; incumbent, Hon. J. P. Bouverie; and is discharged from the payment of first-fruits and tenths. This is a parish wholly agricultural, and has a considerable quantity of wood-lands, which are cut for fuel, and some barren heaths and hills.

HAMBLEDON - HURST, a common, with scattered houses, in the parish of Hambledon.

HAMBLEY-HOUSE, in the parish of Streatham, 6½ miles S. from London-bridge; an extensive and respectable academy for gentlemen, by Mr. Wilson.

HAM-FARM, a farm in the parish of Croydon, near the borders of Kent, 3 miles E. from Croydon.

HAM-HOUSE, a very spacious ancient mansion, with deep areas and extensive terraces, and ascents by steps; built in the year 1610, for the residence of Henry, then Prince of Wales; pleasantly situated on the Thames, in Petersham, 11 miles S.S.W. from Richmond, and 111 W.S.W. from London; having extensive walled gardens and grounds, the latter being rich and of exquisite verdure, close by the side of the river, with most beautiful and extensive walks and drives in extended shaded avenues of lofty trees. This was the place of retirement of James II., when the Prince of Orange came to England; and from which he escaped to France: and here are portraits of him and of Charles I. and II., and a great number of paintings by Vandyke and other eminent masters; and some very ancient furniture, said to be preserved from the time of James the Second's residence here. It is the seat of the Dowager Countess of Dysart. On the roof of the house was a barrack for 300 soldiers, converted by the late Earl of Dysart into rooms for the domestics of his guests.

HAM-LODGE, a villa residence of Captain Halliday, nephew of Lady Dysart, and brother to Admiral Talmash; adjoining to the beautiful grounds of Ham-house.

HAMPTON-LODGE, in the parish of Seal, 4½ miles E. from Farnham, and 6½ W. from Guildford, on the north side of the road between those towns; a handsome mansion with pleasure plantations, &c.; the seat of Long, Esq.

HARBROOK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Thames-Ditton, 5 miles S.S.W. from Kingston. HARDEN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Merstham, 6 miles S.S.W. from Croydon.

HARDWICK-COTTAGE, on Wimbledon-heath, in the parish of Wimbledon, 8 miles S.W. from London-bridge, near the elegant villages of Roehampton, Putney, &c., and near Richmond-park; small and handsome; the property of Mr. Handford, and the present residence of William Cole, Esq.

HARDWICK-COURT, an ancient farm, in the parish of Chertsey-Beomond, 1 mile S.W. from that town, at which place the courts are holden, and tenants attend who perform suit and service, &c.

HARE-STEWS, a farm in the parish of Caterham, 8 miles S. from Croydon.

HARRISON'S-FARM, and LOWER-HARRISON'S-FARM, extensive farms in the parish of Nutfield, 5 miles S.S.E. from Reigate.

HARROWSLEY-GREEN, a farm in the detached part of the parish of Horne, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.S.E. from Reigate.

HARTLEY-FARM, in the parish of Coulsdon, a very good house, with plantations, &c., $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Croydon, and $14\frac{1}{2}$ S. from London, the residence of Mr. Crow.

HARTSWOOD, a handsome house, with plantations and an extensive farm, in the detached part of the parish of Buckland, 1½ miles S. from Reigate, on the right of the of William Clutton, Esq.

HARTWOOD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Newdigate, 6½ miles S.E. from Dorking, and 7 S.W. from Reigate.

HASCOMB, a parish in the hundred of Blackheath, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Godalming, $36\frac{1}{2}$ S.W. from London, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ W. of the road from Guildford to Brighton and the Junction-canal. Containing, in 1801, 34 houses, and 225 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 264 inhabitants; and by the census of 1821, 253 inhabitants. It is situated at the bottom of a valley, under a hill which commands a very extensive prospect, and on the top of which are the vestiges of a square Roman encampment. The living is a rectory; value, 6l. 9s. 9d.; patron, Sir J. Morshead, Bart.; incumbent, Rev. E. Morshead. This parish is chiefly agricultural, and contains a good deal of wood-lands, from which are obtained considerable quantities of brushwood for fuel.

HASCOMB-PLACE, in the parish of Hascomb; an extensive ancient mansion, out of repair; the property of —— Godman, Esq., or of —— Austin, Esq., of Shalford, in the care of a servant.

HASLEMERE, a borough and market town in the parish of Chiddingfold, in the hundred of Godalming, 9 miles S.S.W. from Godalming, and 43 S.S.W. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 132 houses, and 642 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 756 inhabitants; and by the census of 1821, 887 inhabitants. It is a very ancient borough by prescription, and has sent members to

Parliament ever since the reign of Edward IV., who are chosen by a bailiff and the holders of burgage tenures: the bailiff is the returning officer, and the voters are about 60, who are under the influence of the Earl of Lonsdale. This borough is said to have been purchased by the late Earl of Lonsdale, for 24,000l., of Messrs. Leach and Chandler, an apothecary and lawyer in the neighbourhood, who bought it on speculation, and cleared about 6000l. by it. It is said formerly to have had five parish churches, although it is now only a chapel to the mother church of Chiddingfold; incumbent, the rector of Chiddingfold. Its market is on Tuesday, and its fairs 13th May and 26th September.

This town is situated at the extremity of the county, bordering on Sussex and a part of Hants, on the line of telegraphs between London and Portsmouth. The neighbourhood is chiefly agricultural and on the easterly side, contains a considerable quantity of wood-lands and wastes; towards Farnham are great tracts of unenclosed common, with large sheets of water, in which are stored fish, and in the neighbourhood is a quantity of game. The seats here are not numerous. In the town is a handsome residence of Barrington Price, Esq.

HATCHAM, in the hundred of Brixton, at the south-eastern extremity of the county, on the banks of the Thames, 5 miles E.S.E. from London-bridge, between Peckham, the extremity of the parish of Camberwell, and Deptford; is a hamlet of, and adjoins to, the latter. Population included in Deptford. Here is a busy scene of road, this being a great thoroughfare, and in the immediate neighbourhood are an immense number of elegant little villas. From hence to London, upwards of 4 miles, is an almost regular continuation of building by the side

of the roads; and towards the south, on the little elevations and descents of green hills and pleasant vales, is displayed a variety of taste and elegance in the selection of situation and the architectural construction of the villas, which reminds the traveller of the approach to, and of the commercial extent of, the great Metropolis; whilst, with a pleasing view to the eve, he contemplates the number of these total retirements or occasional rural retreats for relaxation from its bustle. This hamlet contains many such villas too numerous for insertion here, or for being separately distingused, though it is only the commencement of a neighbourhood still more full of them. Here are residences of Timothy Stanfield, Esq., an elegant house, tastefully ornamented with pleasure-grounds, shrubberies, &c.; William Holcomb, Esq., the like; also of Richard Edmunds, Esq.; of the late John Varnham, Esq.; and some others mentioned under their respective names.

HATCHAM-HOUSE, in the hamlet of Hatcham, near Deptford and Greenwich, Kent; 5 miles E. S. E. from London-bridge; an extensive mansion; the residence of Mrs. Hardcastle.

HATCH-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chertsey-Beomond, three-quarters of a mile S.E. from the town.

HATCHFORD, in the parish of Cobham, 9 miles S.W. from Kingston, and 21 S.W. from London, on the left of the road from London to Guildford, and in the line of telegraphs between London and Portsmouth; a handsome mansion and lawn, &c.; the seat of Miss Saltenstall.

HATCH-GATE, a farm in the parish of Horley, 5½ miles S. from Reigate. HATCHLAND, in the parish of East-Clandon, on the north side of the road from Guildford through Epsom to London, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. N. E. from Guildford, and $25\frac{1}{2}$ S.S.W. from London; a handsome mansion, with an extensive park, finely ornamented with trees; the seat of George Holme Sumner, Esq.

HATTON-HILL-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Windlesham, 6½ miles S.W. from Egham.

HAXTED—EAST, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, 7½ miles N. E. from East-Grinsted, Sussex.

HAXTED-MILL, and FARM, in the parish of Lingfield, 7 miles N. E. from East-Grinsted.

HAXTED—WEST, a farm in the parish of Lingfied, 7½ miles N.E. from East-Grinsted.

HAYWOOD-LODGE, in Cobham.—See MILLFIELD-COTTAGE.

HAZLE-HALL, an ancient house and farm, in the parish of Ewhurst, near Hurtwood-common, 7 miles E.S.E. from Guildford.

HAZLEWOOD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chipsted, 5 miles S.S.W. from Croydon.

HEADLEY, a parish in the hundred of Copthorne, 4 miles S. from Epsom, and 18 S.S.W. from London; situated on an eminence on the southerly side of the chain of hills, commencing with Box-hill, near Dorking, and extending eastwardly to the borders of Kent, bound-

ing Holmesdale southwardly; commanding views of the pleasant country near Epsom and Ewell, &c. Containing, by the census of 1801, 33 houses, and 217 inhabitants; and by the census of 1811, 220; and of 1821, 184 inhabitants. On the borders of this parish, near Letherhead-downs, hath been traced the Roman highway from London to Dorking. The living is a rectory; value, 8l. 7s. 6d.; in the patronage of the Honourable G. Howard; incumbent, Rev. Lewis Sneyd.

HEADLEY-COURT, a farm in the parish of Headley, 4 miles S.S.W. from Epsom.

HEADLEY-HOUSE, in the parish of Headley, an elegant and extensive mansion, with pleasure-grounds, plantations, &c.; pleasantly situated on an eminence, commanding fine prospects, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Epsom, and 18 S.S.W. from London; the seat of *Phænix Ladbroke*, *Esq.*

HENER-FARM, a farm of which the house is in the parish of Nutfield, and the land principally in the parish of Burstow, 5 miles E.S.E. from Reigate.

HENFOLD, in the parish of Capel, 6 miles S. from Dorking; a handsome house and a farm, the property of his Grace the Duke of Norfolk, and the present residence of —— Enwyl, Esq.

HENFOLD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Capel, on the boundaries of that parish and Newdigate, 4½ miles S. from Dorking.

Swain, Esq.; another, Mr. Fox; another, Mr. Emmersley; an excellent house, Mr. Prior; Mr. Curtis, Mr. Chappel, David Gordon, Esq. an elegant mansion and grounds; another, — Fisher, Esq.; Mr. Coles, Mr. Brownhill, Mr. Hoffman, and others.

HERNS-HEAD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 4½ miles S.W. from Reigate.

HERSHAM, a hamlet to the parish of Walton-on-Thames, 17 miles S.W. from London-bridge, through Kingston. Population included in Walton. This place is lately much improved by the erection of many handsome villas, and is now a genteel retirement; and here are the residences of Captain Warner, Mr. Dowling, Mr. Whitaker, Mr. Holme, Mr. Wilson, Mr. Thrapp, Mr. Stanley. HERSHAM-GREEN, round which are many neat houses, is part of this hamlet.

HERSHAM-FARM, a farm in the parish, 3 miles W.S.W. from the town, of Chertsey-Beomond.

HEWITT'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horley, 5 miles S.S.E. from Reigate.

- HIDE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Frensham, 6 miles S.W. from Godalming, and 6 S. from Farnham.
- HIDE-STILE-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Hambledon, 2 miles S. from Godalming.
- HIGHAMS, in the parish of Chobham, 3½ miles E. from Bagshot, on the east of the road from London, through Bagshot, to Portsmouth; a neat villa residence of —— Terry, Esq.
- HIGHFIELD-PLACE, in the parish of Frensham, on the borders of Sussex and Hants, 3½ miles S.S.E. from Farnham; a handsome mansion, with plantations, &c. the property of —— Davison, Esq. and the residence of himself and —— Wood, Esq.
- HIGH-HOUSE, in the parish of Thames-Ditton, on the banks of the Thames, 2½ miles S.W. from Kingston, and 14½ W.S.W. from London; an excellent mansion, the seat of Lieutenant-General Stephenson.
- HIGH-HUFFLES, a farm in the parish of Cranley, 7 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.
- HIGHLAND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Letherhead, near Headley, 4 miles S. S.W. from Epsom.
- HIGH-LOXLEY, a farm in the parish of Dunsfold, 8 miles S. from Guildford.
- HIGH-TREES, a farm in the parish, and 11 miles E.S.E. from the town of Reigate.

- HILL-BOTTOM, a farm in the parish, and near to the town of Reigate.
- HILL-FARM, (The) a farm in the parish of Betchworth, 4 miles E. N. E. from Dorking.
- HILL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Effingham, 4 miles W. N.W. from Dorking.
- HILL-HOUSE, situate in the parish of, and near to, Tooting, 6 miles S.W. from London-bridge; a handsome house, the residence of William Hobson, Esq.
- HILL-HOUSE, a handsome house, in the northerly part of the parish of Great Bookham, on the south-side of the River Mole, 7 miles W. from Epsom, and 22 S. S.W. from London-bridge; the property of Sir James Langham, in the care of *Mr. Dawes*, his land-steward.
- HILL-HOUSE, in the parish of Effingham, 1½ miles S. from the village, and from the road from Epsom to Guildford (near Polsdon), 3½ miles S.S.W. from Dorking, and 23 S.S.W. from London; an extensive handsome modern mansion, on an elevated situation, well sheltered by trees, with a handsome approach by a road, which, for the main distance from Effingham, is enclosed by tall hedges and trees, the seat of Miles Stringer, Esq.
- HILL-LANE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Charlwood, 7 miles S.S.W. from Reigate.

HOGS-BACK, a beautiful long ridge of chalk hill, nearly 6 miles in length, commencing about half-a-mile from the town of Guildford, and extending westwardly in a straight line towards Farnham, over which a fine road between those towns passes, having a gentle ascent at each end, by which is easily attained the summit of this gentle eminence; and the road being then for the whole of its length quite flat, and of nearly equal breadth with

the summit, affords views southwardly of a fine country, extending from Guildford, past the town of Godalming, to the pleasant villages of Compton and Pepperharrow, and also Puttenham and other villages, including the valley there, through which flows the River Wey, and northwardly views of the villages of Wanborough, Ash, &c. and a considerable extent of country, and being also very airy, affords a beautiful ride during the summer months.

HOLDEN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Stoke, nigh Guildford, 1½ miles N. N. E. from Guildford.

HOLE-FARM, (The) an extensive farm in the parish of Reigate, 1½ miles E. from the town.

HOLIDAY'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horley, 4 miles S. S.W. from Reigate.

HOLLAND-HOUSE, in the parish of Nutfield, near its northern extremity towards Merstham, 3½ miles E.N.E. from Reigate, and 20 S. from London; a good house, with pleasure grounds and plantations, the property of the Devisees of the late Mr. Russell, who was an eminent auctioneer at Reigate, and the present residence of Richard Bush, Esq.

HOLLOWAY-HILL-COTTAGE, in the parish, and 1½ miles S. from the town, of Chertsey, pleasantly situated on Holloway-hill, near Botley-park; a handsome villa residence of Richard Griffith, Esq.

HOLLY-COTTAGE, in the hamlet of Norwood, and

parish of Camberwell, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.S.E. from London-bridge; a neat villa residence of Mr. Benjamin Glover.

HOLME-CASTLE, a mansion beautifully situated on Richmond-hill, 10 miles W.S.W. from London, possessing every advantage of situation and beautiful scenery, for which this place is celebrated; the residence of William Pearce, Esq. (See the poetical description given of it by Thomson, title, Richmond-Hill.)

HOLMESDALE-HOUSE, in the parish of, and adjoining to the village of Nutfield, on a gentle eminence, on the south-side of Holmesdale, and the chain of hills by which that valley is bounded on the north, 3½ miles E. from Reigate, and 21 S. from London; a handsome modern mansion, with extensive grounds and plantations, &c. the seat of Thomas Budgen, Esq.

HOLM-WOOD, in the parish of Dorking, 21 miles S. from the town, on the east-side of Leith-hill; a number of detached houses, amongst which is a handsome one of William Willet, Esq.

HONIES-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chobham, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.W. from Chertsey-Beomond.

HOOKED-COMMON, a small common in the parish of Charlwood, 4 miles S. from Reigate, over which passes the road from Reigate to Brighton, and round which are several detached, and some neat houses.

HOOKED-HOUSE, in the parish of Charlwood, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Reigate, on the road from thence to

Brighton; a good house, with pleasure-grounds, &c. the residence of John Sanders, Esq.

HOOKER'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 3 miles S.W. from Reigate.

HOOK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Windlesham, 8 miles S.W. from Chertsey-Beomond.

HOOK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 3½ miles S.W. from Reigate.

HOOK-HOUSE, a farm in the parish of Burstow, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Reigate.

HOOK-STILE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Godstone, 3½ miles S. from Godstone-green.

HOOK-WOOD, in the parish of Limpsfield, 3 miles W. from Westerham, in Kent, and 19 S.S.E. from London; a handsome mansion and grounds, the seat of Vincent Hilton Briscoe, Esq.

HOOLEY-COTTAGE, a neat modern dwelling-house, in the parish of Chipsted, 6½ miles S.S.W. from Croydon, on the west-side of the road from London, through Croydon and Reigate, to Brighton; the property of Hylton Jolliffe, Esq. M.P. at present unoccupied.

HOOLEY-HOUSE, in the parish of Coulsdon, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.S.W. from Croydon, and $15\frac{1}{2}$ S. from London, on the east side of the road from London, through Croydon and Reigate to Brighton; a handsome house, with pleasure-grounds, shrubberies, gardens, &c., in a low situation, shaded by

large trees, the residence of W. S. Robinson, Esq. In HOOLY-LANE, is also the residence of William Waddilove, Esq.

- HOOPER'S-FARM, a farm, in the parish of Lingfield, adjoining to Kent, 7 miles N.E. from East-Grinsted.
- HOPPING'S-WOOD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Kingston, 2½ miles E. from the town.
- HORLEY, a parish in the hundred of Reigate, 6 miles S. from Reigate, and 27 S. from London, through which passes the road from London, through Reigate, to Brighton; containing, by the census of 1801, 140 houses, and 871 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 742; and, by the census of 1821, 1063 inhabitants, chiefly occupied in agriculture. The living is a vicarage, value 141. 1s. O_2^1d . in the patronage of Christ's-hospital; incumbent, Rev. W. F. Franklyn, D. D.
- HORLEY-COURT-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Horley, belonging to Christ's-hospital, 5 miles S. from Reigate.
- HORLEY-LAND, a good house, and extensive farm, in the parish of Horley, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.S.E. from Reigate; the property and residence of Mr. Guyes.
- HORLEY-LODGE, in the parish of Horley, 3½ miles S.S.E. from Reigate; a handsome house and grounds, the residence of *George Adams*, *Esq.*
- HORLEY-ROW, detached houses and a farm, in the parish of Horley, 4½ miles S. from Reigate.

HORNE, a parish in the hundred of Tandridge, on the borders of Sussex, about 2 miles west of the road from London, through Croydon and Godstone, to Brighton, $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles east from Reigate, and 24 south from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 86 houses and 476 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 521 inhabitants; and in 1821, 585 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 4l.7s. 11d.; patron Thomas Poynder, Esq.; incumbent Rev. Henry Poynder. This parish is chiefly agricultural, and the land is let at low rents. The soil is a stiff clay of difficult tillage, and unproductive in dry seasons, and the roads are bad.

- HORNE-CASTLE, a farm in a detached part of the parish of Horne, between Burstow and Horley, 6 miles S. S. E. from Reigate.
- HORNE COURT, an extensive farm in the parish of Horne, the property of the trustees of a charity at Guildford, 7 miles S. E. from Reigate.
- HORNE-HOUSE, a good farm-house, with a farm, in the parish of Horne, 7½ miles S. E. from Reigate.

HORSELL. See Horsehill.

HORSEHILL, a parish in the hundred of Godley and Chertsey, near which passes the Basingstoke canal, 6½ miles north from Guildford, and 26 W. S.W. from London; containing, in 1821, 90 houses and 617 inhabitants. It is a perpetual curacy; patron Earl of Onslow; incumbent Rev. H. Hammond. In this parish is a considerable extent of common and barren land. The inhabitants are chiefly occupied in agriculture.

HORSEHILLS, a good house and farm, on the west side of the Brighton road, in the parish of Horley, 4 miles south from Reigate, the property of Dr. Wise, and the present residence of the Rev. James Hodson.

HORSLEY. See EAST HORSLEY. WEST-HORSLEY.

HORSLEY-PARK, in the parish of East-Horsley, an extensive and beautiful modern mansion, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. N. HULL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Shalford, 4½ miles S. E. from Guildford.

HULMNERSBURNT-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chertsey-Beomond, 1½ miles west from that town.

HUNGERBELL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 4 miles S.W. from Reigate.

HUNGERFORD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Nutfield, 3 miles east from Reigate.

HUNGRY-HILL, scattered houses, on a hill adjoining to Hampshire, in the parish of Farnham, 12 miles N. N. E. from that town.

HUNTINGDON-LODGE, in the hamlet of Peckham, in the parish of Camberwell, on the north side of the road from thence to London, distant 5 miles E.S.E. from London-bridge, a handsome mansion, the residence of Thomas Lund, Esq.

HUNTS-GREEN, detached houses in the parish of Charlwood, 6½ miles south from Reigate.

HUNT'S-GREEN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Charlwood, 6 miles south from Reigate.

- HURST-FARM, a good house and a farm, in the parish of Worplesdon, 2½ miles north from Guildford, the residence of Mr. James Smallpiece.
- HURST-GREEN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Oxted, 9½ miles east from Reigate, the property and residence of Mr. Robert Sale.
- HURST-HOUSE, in the parish of Moulsey (West,) a handsome mansion, with beautiful pleasure-grounds and plantations, &c. situate on the banks of the Thames, 15 miles W.S.W. from London, lately the seat of Sir Thomas Sutton, Bart., and now that of Sir George Berkley.
- HURTS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ockley, 7 miles S. S.W. from Dorking.

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- JARDEN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Newdigate, adjoining to Sussex, 7² miles S. S.W. from Reigate, and the like distance S.S. E. from Dorking.
- JARVIS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horne, 7½ miles S. E. from Reigate.
- JAYS, in the parish of Ockley, 6½ miles south from Dorking, on the west side of the road from Dorking to Horsham and Brighton, near Leith-hill, an elegant modern mansion, with a park, handsome gardens and pleasure-grounds, the seat of Lee Steer, Esq.

- JENKIN'S-LANDS, an extensive farm, in the parish of Godstone, 7½ miles S.E. from Reigate.
- JEWS-HOUSE, in the parish of Wandsworth, on the road from Wandsworth to Battersea, near the river Thames, 5½ miles S.W. from London-bridge, the résidence of William Bebee, Esq.
- JINCOOKS, a farm in the parish of Oxted, 11 miles east from Reigate.
- INBOMBS-FARM, an extensive farm in the hamlet of Haslemere, 12 miles east from the town.
- INGHAM-FARM, in Bletchingley. See CHIVINGTON.
- INGHAMS, a farm in the parish of Horley, 6 miles south from Reigate.
- JOHNSON'S-COMMON, a small common, with 2 farms adjoining, in the parish of Charlwood, 5½ miles south from Reigate.
- JOHNSON'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Abinger, near Leith-hill, 6 miles S.S.W. from Dorking.
- JOLDING'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ewhurst, 7 miles S.W. from Dorking.
- IRON-PEAR-TREE, in the parish of Godstone, on the road this way to Brighton, a neat cottage, the property of a Mr. Cowdry, of London, and the present residence of Mr. Waldegrave. The medicinal wells here were formerly much resorted to.

ITCHENDER-FARM, a farm in the parish of Thames Ditton, 3 miles S.S.W. from Kingston.

IVELL-FARM, a farm in the southerly part of the parish of Cranley, on the borders of Sussex, 10 miles S.S.E. from Guildford.

JUNIPER-HALL, in the parish of Mickleham, on the road from London, through Epsom and Letherhead, to Dorking, distant 1\(^2\) miles north from the last, and 2\(^2\) S. S.W. from London, an elegant modern mansion, and a paled park stocked with deer (the park containing also a tower, from which are delightful views), pleasantly situated on the west side of Juniper-hill, adjoining to Box-hill, and on the right bank of the river Mole, which here flows through a fine valley, having on each side elegant seats, with extensive parks and hanging woods, a variety of scenery, for beauty combined with sublimity, not excelled in the county; the seat of Thomas Broadwood, Esq.

JUNIPER-HOUSE, an elegant mansion, with pleasure-grounds and plantations, pleasantly situated by the side of Juniper-hill, adjoining to Box-hill, in the parish of Mickleham, 1½ miles north from Dorking, and 22 S.S.W. from London, contributing to the beautiful scenery of the neighbourhood, which consists of the commanding eminences of Juniper and Box hills, a fine valley, through which flows the river Mole, a number of elegant seats, parks and hanging woods, the seat of Sir Lucas Pepys, Bart. late physician to his Majesty.

JURY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Send, 6 miles E. N. E. from Guildford.

IVY-FARM, a farm in the detached part of the parish of Worplesdon, 5½ miles W. S.W. from Guildford.

IVY-HOUSE and FARM, in the parish of Bletchingley, 4½ miles east from Reigate.

IZEMONGERS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ewhurst, 8 miles S.W. from Dorking.

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KEMP'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Buckland, 22 miles W. N.W. from Reigate.

KENLEY, in the parish of Coulsdon, between the roads from London, through Reigate and Godstone, to Brighton, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Croydon, and $14\frac{1}{2}$ S. from London; a handsome house and farm, the residence of John Petter, Esq.

KENNET-COURT-FARM, an extensive farm by the side of the river Mole, in the parish of Fetcham, 4½ miles S.W. from Epsom.

KENNINGTON, a hamlet to the parish of Lambeth, in the hundred of Brixton, 1½ miles S. from London-bridge; by increase of building now joined to, and a part of, the metropolis. The manor belonged to the Duchy of Cornwall, and formerly had a royal palace, the residence of Edward the Black Prince: this was also occasionally the residence of Henry IV., VI., and VII.; after which the manor was farmed out by Henry VIII. The palace was
