NAGS-HALL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Tandridge, 1 mile E. from Godstone-green, on the road to Limpsfield.

NALDERS-WOOD, a handsome house, near Stumble-hole-common, in the parish of Leigh, 4 miles S.W. from Reigate.

NALDERS-WOOD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 4 miles S.W. from Reigate.

NASHES-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Godstone.

NEELS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horne, 9 miles S. E. from Reigate.

NELSON-HOUSE, situated in the pleasant village of Wimbledon, 9 miles S.W. from London-bridge; an extensive ancient mansion (said to be the most ancient erection existing in that parish); the property of — Lancaster, Esq.; now a respectable academy for gentlemen, by *Mr. Isaac Hillier*.

NETHERN-COURT-LODGE, an extensive farm in the parish of Woldingham, 7 miles S. from Croydon.

NETLEY-PLACE, situated in the parish of Shere, on the north side of the road from Guildford to Dorking, 5½ miles E. from Guildford, and 6½ W. from Dorking, on a commanding eminence on the north side of a beau-

tiful valley, in which are Albury and Albury-park; a spacious and elegant mansion, with a park and extensive plantations, very conspicuous and highly ornamental to the picturesque neighbourhood which they are situated in, and form part of. The seat of *Edmund Shallet Lomax, Esq.*

NEW-BARN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Mitcham, on the north-east side of Mitcham-common, 2¼ miles N.W. from Croydon.

NEW-BARNS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, near Starborough-castle, on the borders of Kent.

NEW-BARNS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Merton, 3 miles E. from Kingston.

NEWBORN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Albury, near Albury-down, 3½ miles E. from Guildford.

NEW-CHAPEL-FARM, an extensive farm in the southerly part of the parish of Godstone, 4 miles N. from East-Grinstead.

NEWDIGATE, a parish in the hundred of Copthorne, 5 miles S. from Dorking, and 28 S.S.W. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 63 houses, and 445 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 447; and of 1821, 579 inhabitants. In the eastern part of the parish is a medicinal spring. The living is a rectory; value, 8*l.* 18*s.* 4*d.*; in the patronage of the King; incumbent, the Rev. Henry John Ridley. This parish is situate on the southerly border of the county, adjoining to Sussex, being part of the wealds of Surrey; the parish is wholly

agricultural: a clayey soil, very hard in dry seasons; and here are extensive woodlands for fuel, &c.

NEW-HOUSE, a farm in the parish of Horley, 4 miles S. S. E. from Reigate.

NEWINGTON, a parish in the hundred of Brixton, commonly called Newington-Butts, 1 mile from London; joined to the Borough of Southwark by a row of houses called Newington-causeway. Containing, by the census of 1801, 2865 houses, and 14,847 inhabitants, viz. 6450 males, and 8397 females, of whom 1965 were employed in trade; including the populous hamlet of Walworth: and containing in 1811, 23,853; and in 1821, 33,047 inhabitants; herein also including the hamlet of Walworth. It extends about a mile in length from Southwark to Kennington-common; towards which are many well-built houses, the residences of opulent merchants and tradesmen in the metropolis. Although the church has been enlarged of late years, it is by far too small for its present population; and is inconveniently situated, the chancel projecting into the narrowest part of the road. Near it are some very handsome and commodious almshouses, belonging to the Fishmongers' Company, with a chapel annexed. The Company of Drapers have also almshouses here. The name of the place is supposed to have been derived from the practice of shooting at butts, as practised here in the reign of Henry VIII. The living is a rectory; value, 16*l.*; in the patronage of the Bishop of Worcester; incumbent, Rev. A. C. Onslow.

NEW-INN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Worplesdon, 2 miles N. E. from Guildford.

NEWLAND-FARM, a farm in the parish of St. Martha, adjoining to Merrow-downs, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Guildford.

NEW-PARK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Cranley, $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Cranley.

NEW-PLACE, a farm, rather extensive, situate in the parish of Lingfield, near the church, 5 miles S. from East-Grinstead.

NEW-POND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Reigate, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. E. from the town; near Earlswood-common.

NEW-WOOD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Stoke-Dabernon, 6 miles S. from Kingston.

NIGHTINGALE-LANE, adjoining to a part of Clapham-common, in the parish of Streatham.—See **STREATHAM**.

NIP-HILL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Cobham, 8 miles S. S. W. from Guildford.

NOBLE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from East-Grinstead.

NOBRIGHT-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Godstone, on the west side of the London and Brighton road, 7 miles E. from Reigate.

NODDINGS, a farm in the parish of Chiddingfold, 5 miles S. from Godalming.

NOKE, an ancient beautiful residence of — *Porter, Esq.* in the parish of Chipsted; now pulled down.

NONSUCH-PARK, in the parish of Cuddington, 1 mile S. S. E. from Ewell, and 13 S. from London, on the left of the road from London, through Ewell and Epsom, to Dorking; an elegant spacious mansion, and an extensive park, with fine trees, chief ornaments to the elegant neighbourhood of Ewell and Epsom; the seat of *Samuel Farmer, Esq.* Here formerly stood the palace of *Nonsuch*, erected by Henry VIII. in great grandeur and magnificence; but Charles II. gave it his favourite mistress, the Duchess of Cleveland, who pulled it down, and sold the materials.

Here is also a handsome house, the property of Mr. Farmer, and the present residence of — *Lamprier, Esq.*

NORBITON-FARM, a farm in the parish, 1½ miles S. E. from the town, of Kingston.

NORBITON-HALL, a handsome mansion, near Norbiton-house, adjoining to the easterly side of the town of Kingston; the seat of *C. B. M. Johnson, Esq.*

NORBITON-HOUSE, situate on the easterly side of the road, and of the town of Kingston (at the entrance to it, from London); a spacious elegant mansion, with most beautiful lawn, shrubberies, &c. one side of which extends to the road, with a gate, on each side of which is a large sphinx; the seat of *C. N. Palmer, Esq.* a magistrate, and the liberal founder of the National School at Kingston, which was built at his sole expense.

NORBURY-FARM, a farm in the northerly part of the parish of Croydon, near Norbury-house, 1½ miles S. from Streatham.

NORBURY-GROVE.—See GROVE-HOUSE, Croydon.

NORBURY-HOUSE, situated on the easterly side of the road from London to Croydon, in the northerly part of the parish of Croydon, 2½ miles N. from the town, and 7½ S. from London-bridge; a superb mansion, with beautiful pleasure-grounds tastefully laid out, containing a fine sheet of water; the seat of *Richard Sanderson, Esq.*

NORBURY-PARK, a magnificent modern mansion, and a very extensive park, ornamented with fine timber, most delightfully situated in the parish of Mickleham, between Dorking and Letherhead, on a projection in the breast or slope of a hill on the south-easterly side of Ranmore-common, a commanding eminence, on or near which are the elegant seats of Polsden and Denbighs; that eminence and its adjacent high grounds for some distance forming the western boundary of Holmesdale (which winds to the north near its termination here): those on the west, and Juniper-hill and Box-hill, more romantic hills on the east, being the sides of that valley, in the centre of which (valley) and by the side of this park flows the river Mole, between the park and the grounds on the opposite bank, which form a beautiful grove. The situation of this mansion in the slope of the hill, is so much elevated, that from its southerly front are views of Dorking and its vicinity, at the distance of three miles along the side of the sloping grounds on which Denbighs stands. From the road from Dorking to London, on the left or westerly side of which this mansion is situate (20 miles W. S. W. from the latter), it is seen; and, with the scenery here enumerated, presents a picturesque view not exceeded in this county. The seat of *F. Maitland, Esq.*

NORCOTE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Shalford, 4 miles S. E. from Guildford.

NORK-HOUSE, an elegant mansion, with beautiful and extensive grounds, delightfully situated in the parish of Banstead, between Epsom-downs and Banstead-downs, on an eminence gently sloping towards Ewell and Epsom, and commanding views of those towns, their elegant vicinity, and a considerable extent of the country circumjacent, interspersed with elegant seats; $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles S. E. from Epsom, and 15 S. S. W. from London, on the right of the road from London, through Sutton and Reigate, to Brighton. The seat of the Right Hon. *Lord Arden*.

NORRELLS-FARM, a farm in the parish of East-Horsley, $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. N. E. from Guildford.

NORTH-BRIDGE, scattered houses in the parish of Chiddingfold, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Godalming.

NORTH-BROOK, in the parish of Godalming, 1 mile N. from that town, and $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. W. from Guildford; a handsome house and grounds; the property of *W. Keene, Esq.* and the present residence of *Mr. Hudson*.

NORTH-LOO-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ewell, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. E. from that town.

NORTH-PARK, a farm in the parish of Bletchingley, 1 mile N. E. from that borough, and 6 miles E. from Reigate, on the right of the road from London, through Croydon, to Brighton; with a handsome house, the residence of *Mr. Thomas Lee*.

NORWOOD, a hamlet to the parish of Lambeth, on the easterly borders of the county, adjoining to Kent, near Sydenham, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from London-bridge. Population included in Lambeth. A new church is begun to be erected here. The Horns Inn here is said to have been kept by the father of *Miss Catley*, a celebrated singer. Near this place there was a considerable extent of common, and a noted horde of gipsies; but so much of the common as lay in Norwood hath been enclosed and cultivated, and the neighbourhood hath been chosen as desirable for the erection of villa residences, of which there are now many handsome ones, principally modern. Here is a pleasing variety of hill and dale; the former affording beautiful, and towards the southerly part of the parish extensive, prospects over a country on all sides abounding with elegant villas, numerously dispersed throughout it. By a perambulation through this hamlet, may be seen the variegated scenery of the metropolis and its south-eastern vicinity; the villas in and near Dulwich, Peckham, and Camberwell, including Hernehill, &c. with the beautiful little eminences of Tulse-hill and Knights-hill, on the latter of which stands Brockwell-hall; and Westhoe-hill, and other high grounds, adjoining to the parish of Croydon; from the last of which is seen a great extent of country, beautifully interspersed with modern villas, southerly and south-westerly, in the vicinity of Croydon and Carshalton, and other elegant villages, at further distances. Amongst the handsome residences in this hamlet, there are, besides some mentioned under their respective names, the following, viz. near the site of the new church, *Miss Burgess* (see Knight's-hill-cottage); — *White, Esq.*; — *Mills, Esq.*; — *Tompkins, Esq.*; *George Bacchus, Esq.* a spacious handsome mansion; — *Artingstall, Esq.*;

— *Gardner, Esq.*; Bloomfield-lodge, a handsome mansion of — *Hambleton, Esq.*; *Mrs. Salter* (see Holly-cottage, Gipse-house, and Elder-hold-cottage); — *Schofield, Esq.*, a handsome mansion (and see Kingswood-house).

NORWOOD-FARM, a farm adjoining to Effingham-lower-common, in the parish of Effingham, 5 miles W. from Letherhead.

NORWOOD-FARM, a very extensive farm, in the northerly side of the parish of Cobham, 7 miles S.W. from Kingston.

NORWOOD-HILL, detached houses and farms in the parish of Charlwood, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.S.W. from Reigate.

NORWOOD-PLACE, an extensive farm and good house, in the parish of Horley, at the joining of the parishes of Horley, Leigh, and Charlwood, 4 miles S.W. from Reigate.

NUN-GREEN, detached houses, in the hamlet of Peckham, which see.

NUNNERY-HOUSE, in the hamlet of Peckham, in the parish of Camberwell, adjoining to the principal part of the village of Peckham, 4 miles S.E. from London-bridge, on the borders of Kent; in a neighbourhood abounding with neat villas; the handsome residence of *John Dalton, Esq.*

NUTFIELD, a parish in the hundred of Reigate, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Reigate, and 20 S. from London; con-

taining, by the census of 1801, 80 houses, and 524 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 631 inhabitants; and by the census of 1821, 707 inhabitants; it is a rectory, value 14*l.* 14*s.* 7*d.* in the patronage of Jesus College, Oxon; incumbent, Rev. Edward Sandford. This parish is situated in Holmesdale, having a chain of hills on the north, and the village is on a gentle eminence, rising gradually from the valley southwardly, from which still more southerly lies a part of the wealds of Surrey. The eminence on which the village is situated, and indeed most of the lands in the parish, seem of better quality than other parts of the southerly-side of Holmesdale. It is principally cultivated in large farms, many of them by their owners.

NUTFIELD-COURT-LODGE, an extensive farm, in the parish of Nutfield; the property and residence of *Mr. William Burt.*

NUT-HOUSE, a farm in the parish of Horley, 4 miles S. from Reigate.

NUTLEY-LANE-FARM, a farm in the parish, half-a mile N.W. from the town, of Reigate.

NUTLEY-LANE-HOUSE, a handsome house, on the north-west side of the town of Reigate; the property of *Mr. Paley*; the present residence of *Richard Pooler, Esq.*

NUTWOOD, near Reigate. — See **KEW-LODGE** and **GATTON-PARK.**

OAK-FIELD-HOUSE, a handsome mansion, in the parish of Croydon, half a mile N. from the town, and 9½ S. from London-bridge; the residence of *Mrs. H. Minier*.

OAK-HILL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Stoke-Dabernon, on the road from Letherhead to Esher, 3 miles from the latter.

OAKLANDS, a farm in the parish of Chiddingfold, 6½ miles S. from Guildford.

OAKS, (The) in the parish of Woodmanstern, about a mile-and-a-half eastward from the road from London, through Sutton and Reigate, to Brighton, 5 miles E. from Epsom, 4½ miles W.S.W. from Croydon, and 13 S.S.W. from London; a capacious villa of the Right Honourable *the Earl of Derby*, originally built by a society of gentlemen, called *The Hunter's Club*, and intended as a place of festivity during the hunting season. For the diversion of the sportsmen of the neighbourhood, there are now kept by the earl a pack of staghounds. After an improvement by General Burgoyne, the present Earl of Derby gave this magnificent mansion an elegant gothic appearance, with several additions; and in the hunting season can accommodate his guests with upwards of fifty bed-chambers. The Banstead-downs, and the elegant village of Banstead, are in this immediate neighbourhood; the former commands beautiful prospects, as more particularly mentioned under the head of Banstead. The towns of Ewell and

Epsom, with the elegant seats in their vicinities, are, as well as Croydon, within the distance of less than half a dozen miles. The country is inclined naturally to bleakness, from the extensive downs or plains of which it principally consists, with a number of gentle eminences and descents; but it is so much beautified by the numerous elegant seats, and highly ornamental grounds near the towns above mentioned, and variously interspersed throughout, that the variety is pleasing, and the appearance elegant. To this villa is annexed an extensive park, well stocked with deer. In 1773 Lord Derby gave an elegant *fête champêtre*, which gave rise to the musical entertainment of "*The Maid of the Oaks*," written by the late General Burgoyne, and acted at Drury Lane in 1774.

OAKS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Woking, 6 miles N.W. from Guildford.

OAKSHADE, detached houses in the parish of Stoke-Dabernon, 3 miles S. from Esher.

OATLANDS, in the parish of Weybridge, between Weybridge and Walton-on-Thames, about a mile from each, rather more from the latter, 9 miles W.S.W. from Kingston, through Walton and the Moulseys, &c. and 21 W.S.W. from London-bridge; an elegant mansion, pleasantly situated on the banks of the Thames, on a commanding terrace, overlooking the Thames, the adjacent country, and a serpentine river formed between the Thames and the mansion, extending from near Weybridge to Walton-bridge, having the appearance of two streams or rivers. The mansion stands near the centre of a large park, extending from Weybridge to

Walton. In the park are delightful walks, a grotto and bath, and some fine oaks, and other trees, and at a distance excellent stables. This was lately the seat of his Royal Highness the Duke of York, where died the late Duchess of York; in commemoration of whose charities the column is erected in the centre of the village of Weybridge, as mentioned under the name of Weybridge. Here was formerly a magnificent palace, belonging to the Earl of Lincoln, destroyed during the civil wars.

OATRIDE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Send, 5 miles N. E. from Guildford.

OCKHAM, a parish in the hundred of Woking, on the road and near the line of telegraphic communication between London and Portsmouth, 6 miles N. E. from Guildford, and 24 S. S. W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 92 houses, and 473 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 494 inhabitants; and of 1821, 565 inhabitants. This is supposed to have been the native place of William Ockham, a celebrated philosopher and scholar of Duns Scotus, whose principles he controverted; he pleading for the poverty of the clergy, and obtained from the Pope the title of the Invincible Doctor: he died in Germany about the year 1347. The living is a rectory, value 11*l.* 2*s.* 1*d.*; patron, Lord King; incumbent, Rev. Charles Henry Weston.

OCKHAM-PARK, a magnificent ancient mansion, situate in an extensive and beautiful park, containing a fine sheet of water, in the parish of Ockham, on the left of the road from London to Portsmouth, between Kingston and Guildford, 12 miles S. W. from Kingston, 6 N. E.

from Guildford, and 24 S. S. W. from London; the seat of the *Right Honourable Lord King*.

OCKLEY, a parish in the hundred of Wootton, 6 miles S. from Dorking, on the road from thence to Horsham, Sussex, and 29 S. W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 76 houses, and 592 inhabitants; and of 1821, 642 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 16*l.* 5*s.* 2*d.* in the patronage of Clare-hall, Cambridge; incumbent, Rev. J. Cook. This parish is situate on the south-side of Leith-hill, forming a part of the great plain there mentioned. It is wholly agricultural; the land a clayey soil, very hard and arid, in droughts, and contains a great extent of woodlands, which are cut for fuel, &c. In and near this parish are some handsome seats, mentioned under their names, and Ockley-street.

OCKLEY-COURT, in the parish of Ockley, 6 miles S. from Dorking, and 29 S. W. from London; a handsome house, and a great extent of land, the seat of — *Barclay, Esq.*

OCKLEY'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Newdigate, 6 miles S. E. from Dorking, and about the like distance S. W. from Reigate.

OCKLEY-STREET, in the parish of Ockley, where passed the old Roman causeway, called *Stone-street*, on the road from Dorking to Horsham, on the south-side of Leith-hill, 6 miles S. from Dorking; a number of houses, of which several are detached and neat, with shrubberies, gardens, &c. (and the principal one, Eldersley-Lodge) extending a considerable distance on the

east-side of the road, having in front a Green, of equal extent, and the handsome mansion and grounds of Jays; the grounds, though in the parish of Wootton, extending to the side of Ockley-green.

OCTAGON, (The) in the parish of Wimbledon, adjoining to Wimbledon-heath, 9 miles S.W. from London-bridge, an elegant mansion, having the advantages of elevation and prospect, in a vicinity in which are many elegant houses; the residence of *Thomas Tooke, Esq.*

OLD-HALL, a handsome ancient house and a farm, in the parish of Burstow, adjoining to Horne parish, 6 miles S. E. from Reigate; the property and residence of *Mr. Edward Scott.*

OLD-HALL, a farm in the parish of Tandridge, on the east of the Brighton road, 3 miles S. from Godstone-Green.

OLD-HOUSE, a farm in the parish of Crowhurst, near the church, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Bletchingley.

OLD-HOUSE-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Horley, 6 miles S. S. E. from Reigate.

OLD-HOUSE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Letherhead, three-quarters of a mile S. from Letherhead, near the grounds of Givon's-grove.

OLD-LODGE, in the parish of Lingfield, 8 miles S. S. E. from Godstone, and 27 S. S. E. from London, near the borders of Kent; the residence of *Mr. Richard Chalker.*

OLD-PARK, now a farm, in the parish of Farnham, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. W. from the town of Farnham.

OLD-WARREN, in Kingwood liberty, in the detached part of the parish of Ewell, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from the town; a handsome house, the residence of — *Alcock, Esq.*

ONGAR-HILL, in the parish of Chertsey-Beomond, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from the town, and 22 W. S. W. from London; a handsome ancient mansion, the seat of *Robert Kirkpatrick Escott, Esq.*

ONGAR-HILL-COTTAGE, in the parish of Chertsey, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from the town, and 22 W. S. W. from London; a neat villa residence of *William Porter, Esq.*

ONGAR-HILL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chertsey-Beomond, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from the town.

ORCHARD-HOUSE, a handsome house, near the banks of the Thames, in the pleasant village of Walton-on-Thames, 5 miles W. S. W. from Kingston, and 17 miles W. S. W. from London; the residence of *Mrs. Barton.*

ORMLEY-LODGE, an extensive modern mansion, with pleasure-grounds and plantations, situate near the banks of the Thames, on the north-side of Ham-common, in the hamlet of Ham and parish of Kingston, between Richmond-park and the beautiful village of Petersham, 2 miles S. from Kingston, and 11 W. S. W. from London; lately the residence of Sir John Sinclair, bart. and now of *Mrs. Palmer.*

OTTERS^HAW-PARK, in the parish of Chertsey, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.S.W. of the town, and $24\frac{1}{2}$ W.S.W. from London; an elegant and very extensive modern mansion, and a large park paled, and containing deer, the seat of *Edward Boehm, Esq.*

OXTED, a parish in the hundred of Tandridge, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Godstone, and 26 S.S.E. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 92 houses, and 644 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 754; and of 1821, 777 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 24*l.* Os. 6*d.*; patron, Thomas Duke, Esq. &c.; incumbent, Rev. J. Thorp. This parish is situate on the south-side of Holmesdale, and joins to, or forms part of, the wealds of Surrey. There are some handsome seats in this vicinity, mentioned under their respective names. The land is agricultural, chiefly for corn, of a middle quality generally; but the northerly part of the parish, lying in Holmesdale, with hills on the north, is somewhat fertile, and with other parts of that valley is interspersed with seats. From Oxted-hill, in this parish, to the south, is a pleasant descent; and here are some neat houses, especially Stone-hall, in a pleasant valley, on its south-easterly side.

OXTED-COTTAGE, a neat villa, in the cottage style, in the parish of Oxted, on the road from Oxted to Limpsfield and Westerham, on the borders of Kent, 9 miles E. from Reigate, and $11\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.E. from Croydon; the residence of *Colonel Belhouse.*

OXTED-COURT, the court farm of considerable extent, in the parish of Oxted, near the church, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Reigate.

OXTED-HILL, in the parish of Oxted, $11\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.E. from Croydon, by the south-side of the road to Limpsfield, and Westerham Kent; a neat house, situated on a small eminence, fronting eastwardly to pleasant grounds, sloping in that direction to a valley, through which runs a brook to Stone-hall; the residence of — *Hawkins, Esq.*

OXTED-MILL, in the parish of Oxted, with a farm, 4 miles E. from Bletchingley.

PAGE-WOOD, an extensive farm, in the parish of Charlwood, 8 miles S.S.W. from Reigate.

PAINS-HILL, in the Parish of Walton-on-Thames, at the eastern extremity of the parish, on the east side of the road from London to Guildford and Portsmouth, near Cobham, 8 miles S.W. from Kingston, a beautiful modern mansion, pleasantly situated in a fine valley, with an extensive park, watered by the river Mole, in which are extensive plantations, stretching along the road for a considerable distance, a beautiful grotto and a handsome tower, the seat of the late *Earl* and present *Countess Dowager of Carhampton.*

PANNELS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chertsey Bemond, a quarter of a mile S. from the town.

PARADISE-COTTAGE, in the parish of Egham, near

to Windsor Great Park, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. S. W. from the village of Egham, a neat villa residence of *Brombridge Burton, Esq.*

PARK-FARM, in the parish of Addington, at the extremity of the county eastwardly, bordering on Kent, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Croydon, and $13\frac{1}{2}$ S. S. E. from London, on which there is now in the course of erection, a mansion on an extensive scale, intended for the residence of *Paul Le-Coint, Esq.*

PARK-FARM, Upper Tooting, (west side of) $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. E. from London-bridge, the residence of *J. S. Winstanley, Esq.*

PARK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Alfold, 10 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.

PARK-FARM, a farm in the hamlet of Chessington, in the parish of Ewell, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. S. W. from that town.

PARK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Kingston, 1 mile N. E. from that town, near the south-west corner of Richmond-park.

PARK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Wootton, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. from Dorking.

PARK-GATE, in the hamlet of Ham and parish of Kingston, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. from Kingston, and 11 W. S. W. from London-bridge, adjoining to Richmond-park and Ham-common, in a vicinity round which are numerous elegant seats and ornamented grounds, beautiful small hills, and

the river Thames; a spacious mansion, with extensive grounds, the seat of *Benjamin Bernard, Esq.* banker.

PARK-HATCH, in the parish of Dunsfold, 5 miles S. S. E. from Godalming, a handsome mansion, with plantations, &c. the seat of — *Godbolt, Esq.*

PARK-HILL, in the hamlet of Upper Tooting and parish of Streatham, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. W. from London-bridge, a house, the residence of *William Pearson, Esq.*

PARK-HOUSE, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 5 miles S. W. from Reigate, and about the like distance S. E. from Dorking.

PARK-HOUSE, a handsome ancient mansion, very extensive, at the foot of Brixton-hill, between that and Stockwell, $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles S. from London-bridge, now a respectable academy for gentlemen, by *Mr. Ford.*

PARK-HURST, in the parish of Abinger, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Dorking, on the west side of Leith-hill (which see) a handsome mansion, on an elevated situation, commanding most extensive prospects, particularly over the wealds of Surrey and Sussex, with very extensive grounds, pales, plantations, &c. the seat of *Edmund Lomax, Esq.*

PARK-LANE-HOUSE (adjoining to Oatlands-park) in the parish of Walton-on-Thames, $17\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. S. W. from London, a handsome house, with gardens, lawn, &c. late the property of Sir Henry Fletcher, and the present residence of *Mrs. Middleton.*

PARK-PLACE, in the parish of Egham, 2 miles west from the village, near the entrance from thence to Windsor Great Park, a beautiful gothic mansion and pleasure-grounds, &c. (partly situate in Berkshire,) with delightful views from the windows of the mansion, of Windsor Castle; a seat of *Charles Shackley, Esq.*

PARK-PLACE, a farm in the parish of Charlwood, on the borders of Sussex, 7½ miles S. from Reigate.

PARSONAGE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Capel, on the borders of Sussex, 5½ miles S. from Dorking.

- **PARSON'S-MEAD**, in the parish, and half a mile N. from the town, of Croydon, and 9½ S. from London-bridge, an elegant mansion, the seat of — *Caldeclugh, Esq.* lord of the manor of Bermondsey.

PASTE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Cranley, 7 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.

PEAR-TREE-HOUSE, an extensive farm house, with a farm, in the parish of Horley, 3½ miles S. S. E. from Reigate.

PECKHAM, a hamlet in the parish of Camberwell, in the hundred of Brixton, on the banks of the Thames, near to Deptford and Greenwich, in Kent, and adjoining to Dulwich, 4 miles S. S. E. from London. A fair on the 22d of August for three days. Here is a Protestant chapel, a neat modern gothic building, erected by subscription, and another called Hanover Chapel, and a workhouse belonging to the parish of St Mary-le Strand,

London. This is a neat village, and may be said to join the metropolis. In the vicinity, particularly towards Dulwich and Brixton-hill, there is a pleasing variety of hill and dale, interspersed with numerous villas of the tradesmen of the metropolis, and of those who have retired, forming collectively a great population, dispersed in a variety of detached situations, so as to ornament a great extent of the neighbouring country. Though magnificence is not aimed at here, neatness and variety, and an approach to elegance, are conspicuous—and opportunities are afforded for elevation or sequestration (or of being seen or unseen) according to the taste of the possessor.

The villas and residences are too numerous for insertion; and to distinguish the different varieties of taste displayed in architecture, or in choice of situation, is an impossibility. They are adapted to every taste. Amongst some of the numerous may be mentioned the following, viz. on the road from Peckham towards Peckham Rye and Dulwich, those of *T. B. Oldfield, Esq.*; *Richard Heale, Esq.*; the Rev. *Dr. Collyer*, minister of Hanover Chapel. From Peckham towards Camberwell, *Bartholomew Jeffery, Esq.* Nun-green, *Thomas Bond, Esq.*; *J. W. Gascoyne, Esq.*; near Nun-green, *William Jones, Esq.*; on the Kent-road, *Mrs. Newbold*; *Thomas Chapman, Esq.*; and *Mr. John Wood*. Several residences are mentioned under their respective names.

PECKHAM-ACADEMY, in the hamlet of Peckham and parish of Camberwell, 4 miles S. S. E. from London, in a pleasant neighbourhood, numerously interspersed with handsome villas, a respectable academy, by *Mr. Thomas Ready*.

PECKHAM-HOUSE, in the hamlet of, and near to Peckham, on the south side of the road to London, distant 4 miles S. S. E. from London-bridge, an elegant mansion, the seat of *Henry Smith, Esq.* late Colonel in a volunteer regiment, and a Director of the Honourable East India Company.

PECKHAM-LODGE, in the hamlet of Peckham, and parish of Camberwell, on the south side of Peckham, towards Dulwich, 4 miles S. S. E. from London-bridge, an elegant mansion, with handsome pleasure-grounds, the seat of *George Choumert, Esq.*

PENDHILL, situate in the parish of Bletchingley, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. W. from that town, on its south side in Holmesdale, a space of ground rising gently near the foot of the ridge of hills bounding that dale on the north, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. N. E. from Reigate, where there are several handsome houses, lately the residences of Seymour Briscoe, Esq. and Henry Seawell, Esq. and a great extent of land, the property of John Perkins, Esq. and where is also,

PENDHILL-COURT, an ancient mansion and manor, pleasantly situate on the eminence of Pendhill above described, the seat of *John Perkins, Esq.*

PENGE-COMMON, a common in the detached part of the parish of Battersea, between the parishes of Croydon and Lambeth, adjoining to those and the borders of Kent, on which are a handsome mansion, called Penge-place; the residence of *John Scott, Esq.*; Grotto-house, and several other handsome houses.

PEPPER-HARROW, a parish in the hundred of Godalming, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. from Godalming, and 36 S. S. W. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 22 houses, and 111 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 133; and of 1821, 130 inhabitants. The living is a rectory; value, 6*l.* 7*s.* 6*d.*; patron, Lord Middleton; incumbent, Rev. E. W. Eliot.

On the north side of this parish stretches the ridge of chalk-hills, called Hogs-back, extending from Guildford towards Farnham, mentioned under the title of Guildford. On the south and south-west, are the more lofty hills of Hindhead and Grays-wood, &c.; and here is a most beautiful and magnificent mansion and extensive park, called **PEPPER-HARROW-PARK**, with the river Wey flowing through it, in a fine valley extending from thence, by the river side, towards Godalming and Guildford, having highly-cultivated grounds in the middle, and gentle hills and hanging woods on its sides. This mansion is the seat of *the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Middleton*.

PERBRIGHT, a parish in the hundred of Woking, having the Basingstoke-canal passing its northern boundary, 5 miles N. W. from Guildford, and 34 S. W. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 58 houses, and 409 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 421; and of 1821, 472 inhabitants. The living is a perpetual curacy, not in charge; patron, Dean and Chapter of Hereford; incumbent, Rev. T. Townsend. In this neighbourhood is a considerable extent of common and barren land.

PERBRIGHT-LODGE, in the parish of Perbright; a handsome mansion, with plantations, &c.; the seat of *Admiral Stirling*.

PERROT'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Banstead, $4\frac{3}{4}$ miles S. E. from Epsom.

PERRYLANDS, a farm in a detached part of the parish of Horne, between Burstow and Horley, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. S. E. from Reigate.

PERRYS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Oxted, $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Reigate.

PETERIDGE-FARM, an extensive farm, in the parish of Horley, 6 miles S. E. from Reigate.

PETERS-FARM, a farm in the northerly part of the parish of Capel, near Holm-wood-common, 3 miles S. S. E. from Dorking.

PETERSHAM, a parish in the hundred of Kingston, near Richmond, being 1 mile S. from that place, and $11\frac{1}{2}$ W. S. W. from London-bridge. Containing, by the census of 1801, 59 houses, and 422 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 406; and of 1821, 516 inhabitants. The church was formerly a chapel of ease to Kingston. By an act of Parliament passed in 1769, Kew and this parish were united in one vicarage. The living not in charge; patronage, the same as Kew. This is a beautiful village, delightfully situated near the banks of the Thames, amid grotesque scenery, being surrounded by Richmond-park and hill, and the Thames, and the ornamental grounds of elegant seats. Amongst those elegant seats in this parish (there being also some mentioned under their respective titles), are the following, viz.: an elegant mansion, pleasantly situated, with beautiful pleasure-grounds, the seat of the *Dowager Marchioness of*

Bute; an elegant mansion, in the avenue near Ham-house (a description of which, with its beautiful grounds, is given under its name), the seat of *Captain George Scott*, who married Lady Jane Scott, daughter of Lord Douglas, whose residence it was; an elegant house, formerly the residence of Admiral Sir Joshua Rowley, and now of *David Erskine, Esq.*; an elegant house, near the river Thames, formerly the residence of the Duke of Montrose, and now of *Robert Thorley, Esq.*; and another beautiful residence of *William Hunt, Esq.*

PETERSHAM-HOUSE, a very extensive mansion, with beautiful pleasure-grounds, situated in the parish of Petersham, near Richmond-hill and Park, between those and the Thames; in a very elegant neighbourhood, 1 mile N. from Richmond, and $11\frac{3}{4}$ miles W. S. W. from London-bridge. This mansion was erected for the first Earl of Harrington, and became the residences successively of Mr. Pitt, Lord Camelford, and the Duke of Clarence: it next belonged to the Earl of Dysart, and is now the property of Sir William Manners, the present Lord Huntingtown; at present unoccupied.

PHENICE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Great-Bookham, 3 miles S. W. from Letherhead.

PICCARD-FARM, a handsome house and farm, near Guildford; the residence of *Mr. Thomas Drewitt*.

PICKETS-FARM, an extensive farm, in the parish of Horley, 4 miles S. E. from Reigate.

PICKFIELD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Capel, on the borders of Sussex, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Dorking.

PIGEON-HOUSE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chipsted, 9 miles S.W. from Croydon.

PILFOLD, UPPER, MIDDLE, and LOWER, three farms in the southerly part of the parish of Frensham, on the borders of Hants.

PIRBRIGHT.—See **PERBRIGHT**.

PIRFORD.—See **PYRFORD**.

PISLEY-FARM, a farm in the detached part of the parish of Ockley, 7½ miles S.S.W. from Dorking.

PITCH-PLACE, in the parish of Worplesdon, 2¼ miles N.N.W. from Guildford.

PITHOUSE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Albury, 6 miles S.E. from Guildford.

PITT-PLACE, a handsome modern mansion, with beautiful pleasure-grounds, situate on the north-east side of, and almost adjoining to, the town of Dorking, at the entrance to it from London (near to Deepdene, and Shrubs-hill), 22½ miles S.S.W. from London; the residence of *W. R. Crawford, Esq.* a magistrate of the county.

PLAISTOW-FARM, a farm in the parish of Capel, on the borders of Sussex, 6½ miles S. from Dorking.

PLANKS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Wonersh, 5 miles S.E. from Guildford.

PLATT-HOUSE, a house in the parish of Putney, on the lower road from Putney to Sheen, near the river Thames, 7½ miles W.S.W. from London-bridge; the residence of *Benjamin Bovill, Esq.*

POINTERS, a handsome mansion, with beautiful grounds, pleasantly situated on the river Mole, in a pleasant valley, in the parish of Cobham, near the seats called Hatchland and Pains-hill, 5½ miles W.S.W. from Letherhead, and 9½ S.W. from Kingston, on the left of the road from the latter to Guildford and Portsmouth; the residence of *Thomas Page, Esq.*

POLLINGFOLD, a farm in the detached part of the parish of Abinger, partly in Wootton, near the borders of Sussex, 12½ miles S.S.E. from Guildford.

POLSDON, situated on the high grounds in the southerly side of the parish of Great-Bookham, 3½ miles S.W. from Letherhead, 3½ N.W. from Dorking, and 22 S.S.W. from London, near Ranmore-common, an eminence which, for its beautiful prospects, is described under the title of Denbighs (being nearer that seat than this, between the two); a beautiful mansion, with extensive pleasure-grounds and plantations, and a noble terrace; formerly the residence of Admiral Sir Francis Geary, and Sir William Geary, his son; afterwards of *R. B. Sheridan, Esq.* the great statesman and poet; and now the seat of *Joseph Bonsor, Esq.*

POND-LAKE, a farm in the parish of Horne, 9 miles S.E. from Reigate.

POPE'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 3 miles S.W. from Reigate.

POPLAR-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ewell, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. from that town.

POPLAR-LODGE, situate on the south-side of Englefield-green, in the parish of Egham, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. from the village, amongst the numerous seats of that neighbourhood; an elegant villa residence of *Miss Buckworth*.

PORCH-HOUSE, in Chertsey.—*See COWLEY-HOUSE.*

PORTER'S-LANE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Cobham, 8 miles N. E. from Guildford.

PORTLEY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Caterham, $5\frac{3}{4}$ miles S. from Croydon.

PORTNAL-PARK, in the parish of Egham, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Egham, on the left side of the road to Bagshot, near the south-east corner of Windsor Great-park; a handsome modern mansion, with a pale park, being one of the numerous ornaments of this elegant neighbourhood; the seat of the *Rev. — Biss.*

POSTERN-GATE-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Godstone, $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Reigate.

POSTFORD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Albury, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. S. E. from Guildford.

POUND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Crowhurst, $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. S. E. from Reigate.

POUND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Thames-Ditton, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Kingston.

POUND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Long-Ditton, $1\frac{3}{4}$ miles S. from Kingston.

POUND-FARM, a farm in the detached part of the parish of Wootton, adjoining to Sussex, 9 miles S. S. W. from Dorking.

POYLE-HOUSE, in the parish of Seal, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. N. E. from Farnham, and 7 W. from Guildford, on the north side of the range of chalk hill called *Hogsback*, over which is a pleasant road from Guildford to Farnham, commanding extensive views north and south, this being a handsome mansion, pleasantly seen at half-a-mile distance north, through a long avenue of trees, in a declivity of beautiful grounds; the property of — *Woodruff, Esq.* of London (not occupied.)

PRESTON-FARM, a farm in the parish of Banstead, $3\frac{1}{4}$ miles S. S. E. from Epsom.

PRESTWICK, a farm, and a good house, in the parish of Chiddingfold, near Gray's-wood, 2 miles N. E. from Haslemere; the residence of *Mr. Mellish.*

PRESTWOOD, a farm in the parish of Charlwood, on the borders of Sussex, 8 miles S. S. W. from Reigate.

PRESWICK, a small farm, in the parish of Chiddingfold, near Oaklands, 5 miles E. N. E. from Haslemere.

PRICKLERS, a farm in the parish of Bletchingley, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Reigate.

PRINKHAM-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Lingfield, on the borders of Kent.

PRIORY, (The) in the parish of Kew, near to Kew-green and the Thames, on the right of the entrance to Kew, from Mortlake or Richmond, 2 miles N.N.E. from Richmond; the summer residence of *Miss Doughty*. It contains a chapel and library, and is a neat small retired residence, to which some additions are now making.

PRIORY, (The) an extensive handsome mansion, on the site of its ancient friary, erected by the Earl of Warren and Surrey, in the reign of King John, situated in a valley on the right of the road from London, through Reigate, to Brighton, nearly adjoining to the south-side of the town of Reigate, 21½ miles S. from London, embosomed amongst trees and shrubberies, in part secluding it from the road, having an extensive park, ornamented with fine trees and water, which, from the low situation in which the mansion is situate, gradually ascends in a southerly direction to high grounds: these have a commanding prospect of a great extent of plain to the south, and by the side of which high grounds are many handsome modern houses; the property of Earl Somers, and the present residence of his son, *Lord Eastnor*, a magistrate of the county.

PRIORY, (The) in Puttenham. — See **PUTTENHAM-PRIORY**.

PRIORY, a spacious mansion, in the elegant hamlet of Roehampton, and parish of Putney, 8 miles S.W. from London-bridge; the seat of — *Holland, Esq.*

PRIORY-HOUSE, (The) an elegant modern mansion, pleasantly situated in the south-easterly part of the parish of Tandridge, 12 miles S. from Croydon, having on the north the chain of hills extending from near Dorking to the borders of Kent, being on the south-side, ornamented by plantations, on round hills or projections, the surface of which has the verdure of highly-cultivated or fertile grounds, and sloping beautifully from the ridge, or summit of the hills, southwardly to the commencement of an extensive plain of corn and wood lands, forming a part of the wealds or wilds of Surrey and Sussex; coming from which, and from Brighton towards London, these beautiful high grounds are seen for a considerable distance; the seat of — *Walbank, Esq.* a magistrate of the county.

PROSPECT-HOUSE, in the hamlet of, and near to, Peckham, in the parish of Camberwell, on the borders of Kent, 4 miles S.S.E. from London; an elegant residence of *Pike Channell, Esq.*

PURBRIGHT-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chipsted, 8 miles S.S.W. from Croydon.

PURLEY-HOUSE, in the parish of Sanderstead; a neat house, in a low situation, surrounded with trees, in a valley called Smitham-Bottom, along which passes the road from London to Brighton, having the high grounds of Sanderstead and Coulsdon on the east, and Woodcot-downs on the west, 2 miles S. from Croydon, and 12 S. from London; the property of the infant son of the late Rev. Atwood Wigsell, rector of Sanderstead, and the present residence of — *Harrington, Esq.* Purley was the seat of Bradshaw, president at the trial of

Charles I. and late the residence of J. H. Tooke, where he wrote his philological work, called "*The Diversions of Purley*".

PURLEY-LODGE, in the parish of Coulsdon, 2 miles S. from Croydon, and 12 S. from London, at the entrance of a valley at Smitham-Bottom, on the road to Brighton, near Purley-lodge, having the high grounds there mentioned stretching along its sides; a handsome modern dwelling-house, the property of — Smith, Esq. and the present residence of *Benjamin Cohen, Esq.*

PUTNEY, a parish situate in the hundred of Brixton (including the pleasant hamlet or village of Roehampton, mentioned under its name), 7 miles S.W. from London, the upper or southerly part of which adjoins to Wimbledon, near Wimbledon-heath and Richmond-park, having a gradual descent from thence to the banks of the Thames, over which is a bridge to Fulham; containing, by the census of 1801, 626 houses, and 2428 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 2881; and of 1821, 3394 inhabitants. The church is an old gothic structure. The living a perpetual curacy, in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Worcester; incumbent, Rev. Henry St. John. At the east-end of the south aisle is a chapel, built by Bishop West, the roof of which is adorned with rich gothic tracery: it has a square tower, and six bells. In the road from Wandsworth to Richmond is a new cemetery, the ground of which was given to the parish in 1763, by Dr. Pettward. This place gave birth to the unfortunate Thomas Cromwell, Earl of Essex, whose father was a blacksmith here; and also to Dr. West, Bishop of Ely, an eminent statesman of the same reign, whose father was a baker. In 1647 Putney was Oliver

Cromwell's head-quarters; and his military councils are said to have been held in the church, round the communion table. One of the Roman military roads may be traced between this place and Richmond. The beautiful descent from Wimbledon-heath towards the Thames, is covered with elegant mansions, and their beautiful grounds, most pleasantly situated, with commanding views, and highly ornamental to the vicinity. Amongst the elegant seats in Putney and Roehampton, besides those mentioned under their several names, are the following; viz. in and near to Roehampton, a neat gothic house (on Putney-heath), fronting towards Wimbledon, — *Rice, Esq.*; nearly adjoining, *Mr. Barber*; also a very extensive mansion, with beautiful pleasure-grounds, the seat of *the Earl of Bristol*; *Mrs. Ardeen*; *Mr. Nutton*; *Mr. Bignal*; an elegant mansion, with extensive grounds, the seat of *Lord Clifden*; a neat villa, — *Alcock, Esq.*; an elegant rural villa, the seat of *the Marchioness of Exeter*; — *Jones, Esq.* marshal of the King's Bench; an extensive mansion, with handsome pleasure-grounds, fish-pond and gardens, the seat of *Lady Grantham*; an elegant villa, the seat of *the Countess De Grey*; an elegant and spacious mansion, with extensive and beautiful grounds, ornamented with statues, having extensive views into Richmond-park, the seat of *the Earl of Besborough*; an elegant mansion, with extensive pleasure-grounds, plantations, and views into Richmond-park, the seat of *the Marchioness of Downshire*; an extensive mansion and grounds, the property of — *Thompson, Esq.* and the residence of *Mrs. Hankey*; a handsome villa, the property of *Mr. Gosling*, and the residence of *R. Price, Esq.*; a handsome house and grounds, the seat of *R. G. Temple, Esq.*; a mansion and extensive grounds, the seat of *the*

Countess Guilford; an elegant mansion, the seat of *William Leader, Esq. M.P.* In and near the village of Putney, an extensive mansion, the residence of *Lady Chambers*; *William Jones, Esq.*; *Mrs. Blandy*; *Mrs. Longley*; *G. De Hochepeid Larpent, Esq.*; *Mr. Feetham*; *John Turner, Esq.*; *George Lewis, Esq.*; *Miss Chapman*; an extensive house, with pleasure-grounds and plantations, *Heneage Legge, Esq.*; *William Williams, Esq.*; *Rev. William Carmalt*, an extensive academy; and *John Leighton, Esq.*

PUTNEY-PARK-HOUSE, a very ancient and extensive mansion, in the parish of Putney, near to Roehampton, 8 miles from London-bridge; the property of Earl Spencer, at present unoccupied, and wanting repairs.

PUTTENDEN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, near the borders of Sussex and Kent.

PUTTENHAM, a parish in the hundred of Godalming, 4 miles W. from Guildford, on the left of the road from thence, over Hog's-back, to Farnham, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from the latter, and 34 S. S. W. from London, situated in a valley, the neighbourhood round which is bleak, except the south-easterly side, towards Pepper-harrow, Godalming, &c. Containing, by the census of 1801, 67 houses, and 367 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 339; and of 1821, 389 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 11*l.* 17*s.* 11*d.* in the patronage of the King; incumbent, the Rev. J. Hemus.

PUTTENHAM-PRIORY, situate near the church, in Puttenham; a spacious elegant mansion, of modern appearance, with extensive grounds, on the south-easterly

side of the village, extending towards Pepper-harrow, being sheltered and ornamented with beautiful trees and shrubberies; the seat of *Richard Sumner, Esq.*

PYRFORD, a parish in the hundred of Godley and Chertsey, 7 miles N. N. E. from Guildford, and 25 S. W. from London, between the Wey and Arun, and the Basingstoke canals, near their junction; containing, by the census of 1801, 33 houses, and 230 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 264; and of 1821, 294 inhabitants. The living is a curacy with Wisley.

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QUARRY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chaldon, 4 miles N. E. from Reigate.

QUARRY-HOUSE, a handsome house, and an extensive farm, in the southerly part of the parish of Godstone, 9 miles S. from Croydon, adjoining on the east to the road from London, through Croydon and Godstone, to Brighton; the property of Sir William Clayton, and the present residence of *Mr. William Hall*.

QUEEN-WOOD-HILL, in the parish of Chertsey, 3 miles S. W. from that town, adjoining to Ottershaw-park; a neat villa, the property of the Lady of the Manor of Chertsey (late Miss Sewell, married), and the present residence of *Mrs. Christie*.
