SUTTON-HOUSE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Woking, 3 miles N. from Guildford.

SUTTON-LODGE, in the parish of Sutton, on the road from London through that place to Brighton, 11 miles S.S.W. from London; a handsome mansion, in an elegant neighbourhood; the seat of *Thomas Frogget, Esq.*

SUTTON-MANOR-HOUSE, in the parish of Sutton, 11 miles S.S.W. from London, on the road to Brighton; the seat of *Lady Manners*.

SUTTON-PLACE, in the parish of Woking, 2½ miles N.E. from Guildford, and 28 S.W. from London; a spacious and very ancient handsome mansion, beautifully situated on the west bank of the river Wey, in a very extensive park of highly-cultivated grounds, containing abundance of stately trees, and forming a gentle declivity, to an extensive flat of fine meadows, through which flows the river; the seat of *John Webbe Weston, Esq.*

SWAINS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 3½ miles S.W. from Reigate.

TADWORTH, in the parish of Banstead, 3½ miles S. S. E. from Epsom, and 17½ S. S. W. from London; a spacious and elegant mansion, with a spacious lawn and pleasure-grounds, fronting to the road from London, through Sutton and Banstead, to Reigate and Dorking, near Banstead-downs; the seat of *Robert Hudson, Esq.* lord of the manor of Tadworth.

TALWORTH-COURT, a tithe-farm in the parish of Long-Ditton, 3 miles S. S. E. from Kingston.—Persons walking the boundaries of the parish of Kingston, dine here every nine years.

TAMWORTH - BIGGIN, in the parish of Mitcham, 1½ miles N. from the village, 3½ N. N. W. from Croydon, and 7 S. S. W. from London; an elegant ancient mansion, with extensive and beautiful grounds and plantations; the seat of *the Right Honourable Lord Redesdale*.

TAMWORTH-LODGE, in the parish of Mitcham, 1½ miles N. from the village, 3½ N. N. W. from Croydon, and 7 S. S. W. from London; a handsome mansion; the property of *Daniel Watney, Esq.* and the present residence of *John Hayes, Esq.*

TANDRIDGE, a parish, giving name to the hundred of Tandridge, in which it is situate, 2 miles E. from Godstone, and 21 S. S. E. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 64 houses, and 381 inhabitants; by the

census of 1811, 390; and of 1821, 421 inhabitants.—The living is a perpetual curacy, not in charge; patron, Sir William Clayton, Bart.; incumbent, Rev. John Waters.—This parish is narrow from east to west, but in length, from north to south, extends a distance averaging about 11 miles (parallel to Godstone); the valley of Holmesdale, and the ridge of hills northward from that, crossing this parish near its northerly side, the southerly being part of the extensive plain forming the wealds of Surrey.—In this neighbourhood are some elegant seats, mentioned under their respective names. Here is a neat school (thatched) newly-erected, for the education of boys of this and the adjoining parishes of Godstone and Oxted, on the Lancasterian plan.

TANDRIDGE, the name of a hundred, being the south-eastern extremity of the county, adjoining to the borders of Kent, east; the hundreds of Reigate and Wallington, west; Wallington, north; and the borders of Sussex, south.—For the parishes contained in this hundred, see the general description of the county, preceding the alphabetical.

TANDRIDGE-COURT, in the parish of Tandridge, 1 mile E. from Godstone, and 21 S.S.E. from London, on the left of the road to Brighton; an extensive dwelling-house and estate; the property and residence of *Matthias Wilks, Esq.*

TANDRIDGE-HALL, in the parish of Tandridge, 1 mile E. from Godstone, and 21 miles S.S.E. from London, on the east of the road from thence to Brighton; a handsome mansion, with many extensive estates adjoining, the seat and property of *Joseph Wilks, Esq.*

TANHURST, in the parish of Wooton, 5½ miles S.W. from Dorking, and 28 S.S.W. from London; beautifully situated on a commanding eminence on the south-west side of Leith-hill (which see); having most extensive views over the south wealds of Surrey, and also of Sussex; an ancient spacious mansion; the residence of *J. Alexander Ogilvie, Esq.*

TANNERS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Newdigate, 8 miles S.S.W. from Reigate.

TAN-YARD, a farm in the parish of Horley, 4 miles S.S.E. from Reigate.

TAPNERS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Leigh, 3 miles W.S.W. from Reigate.

TATSFIELD, a parish in the hundred of Tandridge, on the eastern borders of this county, 2 miles W. from Weatherham, Kent, and 20 S.S.E. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 18 houses, and 153 inhabitants; and in 1821, 174 inhabitants.—The living is a rectory; value, *5l. Os. 5d.*—This parish is in a situation somewhat elevated, on a ridge of chalk hills.

TATSFIELD - COURT - FARM, an extensive farm, in the parish of Tatsfield, 10 miles S.S.E. from Croydon.

TATSFIELD - PARK - FARM (or, **BUCKLAND-FARM**), an extensive farm in the parish of Tatsfield, 10 miles S.S.E. from Croydon; the property and residence of *Mr. Loutit.*

TAUNTON-FARM, a farm in the parish of Coulsdon, 5 miles S. from Croydon.

TAYLOR'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Capel, 7 miles S. from Dorking.

TEDDY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horne, 7 miles S. E. from Reigate.

TEMPLE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Newdigate, 9 miles S. W. from Reigate.

TENSLEY-FARM, an extensive farm, part of the ancient mansion and park (a part of the ancient mansion being a part of the farm-house), in the parish of Limpsfield, 9½ miles E. from Reigate.

TENSLEY-PARK, in the parish of Limpsfield, on the borders of Kent, 9½ miles E. from Reigate; formerly a park of considerable extent, where stood an extensive mansion called Tensley-house, now in ruins; and the park may now be considered merely a wood. A farm-house is now the only remains of the ancient house.

TESSIER-INN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Burstow, 7 miles S. S. E. from Reigate.

THAMES-DITTON.—See DITTON—THAMES.

THATCHED-LODGE, in Richmond-park. See RICHMOND.

THOMSON'S VILLA, in Kew-foot-lane, in the parish

of and nearly adjoining to the northerly side of Richmond, for some time a residence of the poet Thomson, pleasantly situate on the banks of the Thames, now an elegant mansion, with extensive pleasure-grounds, the seat of *Lady Shaftesbury*. See RICHMOND-HILL, where the beautiful scenery in this vicinity is poetically described in Thomson's words.

THORNCROFT, in the parish of Letherhead, a quarter of a mile S. S. W. from the village, and 18½ S. W. from London, a handsome mansion and grounds, in an elegant vicinity of picturesque scenery, the seat of *General Brown*.

THORNSCOMB-STREET, detached houses in the parish of Bramley, 5 miles S. from Guildford.

THORNTON-HEATH, detached houses, in the parish of Croydon, on a small heath, 1½ miles N. from Croydon, on the road to London.

THORNTON-HOUSE, in the parish of Croydon, 1½ miles N. from the town, and 8 miles S. from London, a handsome mansion, the residence of *Jos. Reid, Esq.*

THORNTON-LODGE, in the parish of Croydon, 1½ miles N. from Croydon, and 8¼ S. from London, an elegant small house, the residence of *Thomas Cole, Esq.* a magistrate of the county.

THORPE, a parish in the hundred of Godley and Chertsey, 2 miles S. S. E. from Egham, and 22 miles W. S. W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 93 houses and 485 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 523;

land of 1821, 509 inhabitants. The living is a vicarage, value *5l. 13s. 4d.* in the patronage of the King; incumbent Rev. J. L. Bennett. Fair 9th of June. This is a pleasant village, on the banks of the Thames, below Stains, Middlesex, and contains several handsome seats mentioned under their respective names.

THORPE-HOUSE, an elegant mansion, with beautiful lawn, pleasure-grounds, and plantations, in the parish of Thorpe, near to Egham, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. S. E. from Windsor, and 22 W. S. W. from London; lately the seat of Sir William Blacket, Bart. and now of his widow.

THORPE-LEE-HOUSE, in the parish of Thorpe, half-a-mile S. from Egham, and $21\frac{1}{2}$ W. S. W. from London; an elegant mansion, with lawn, plantations, &c.; the seat of Colonel Stapleton.

THORPE-PLACE, an extensive handsome mansion, in the village of Thorpe, near St. Ann's hill (which see); 2 miles S. from Egham; the residence of *the Rev. John Bennett*, rector.

THREE-CROSS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Godstone, $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Reigate.

THROTCHWORTH-FARM, a farm situate $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles S. from Egham, in that parish.

THURLOW-COTTAGE, in the hamlet of Dulwich, and parish of Camberwell, 1 mile south from Dulwich, and 6 S. from London-bridge, a cottage residence (formerly) of Lord Thurlow.

THURSLEY, a parish in the hundred of Godalming, 4 miles S. W. from Godalming, and 38 S. S. W. from London (with Witley united); containing, by the census of 1801, 83 houses and 584 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 564; and of 1821, 608 inhabitants. The living is a curacy, not in charge; incumbent, vicar of Witley. This is a farming district, and here are some sandy soil, heaths and wood lands. See **HINDHEAD**.

THURST-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chipsted, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles north from Reigate.

TICKBURN, a farm in the parish of Chiddingfold, 4 miles S. from Godalming.

TILBERSTRAW-LODGE, in the parish of Godstone, 7 miles E. from Reigate, and $21\frac{1}{2}$ S. from London, a handsome mansion and grounds, the residence of — *M^r Ley*, Esq. lessee from Alexander Rose Farmer, Esq.

TILE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Worplesdon, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. W. from Guildford.

TILFORD, a clump of houses, in the parish of Farnham, 3 miles S. E. from that town.

TILLING-DOWN, an extensive farm, in the parish of Tandridge, near Marden-park, 8 miles E. N. E. from Reigate.

TILLSEY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Wonersh, 5 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.

TIMBERDEN, (or **TIMBERHILL**) **COTTAGE**, in the

parish of Mickleham, adjoining to Camilla-Lacy, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. from Dorking; a neat villa residence of *Mrs. Bolton*.

TIMBERHAM-LODGE. See **KIMBERHAM-LODGE.**

TIMBERHAM (or KIMBERHAM) PARK. See **KIMBERHAM-PARK.**

TINSLEY-GREEN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Charlwood, $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Reigate.

TIPHAM-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ockley, near the borders of Sussex, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Dorking.

TITSEY, a parish in the hundred of Tandridge, on the south-east border of the county, 2 miles W. from Westerham, $8\frac{1}{2}$ S.E. from Croydon, and $18\frac{1}{2}$ S.S.E. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 18 houses, and 108 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 144; and of 1821, 167 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 7l. 17s. 3d.; patron, W. L. Gower, Esq.; incumbent, Rev. G. L. Gower. This parish is situate on a ridge of chalk hill, bordering on Kent.

TITSEY-PLACE, a superb mansion, with an extensive park, in the parish of Titsey, which adjoins to the parishes of Tatsey and Limsfield, 9 miles S.S.E. from Croydon, and 19 S.S.E. from London, near the borders of Kent; the seat of *the Honourable Leveson Gower*, the owner of the greatest part of those parishes.

TOLLWORTH-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chaldon, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles N.E. from Reigate.

TONGHAM, a hamlet in the parish of Seal, in the hundred of Farnham, 4 miles E. N.E. from Farnham. Population included with Seal.

TOOTING, a parish in the hundred of Brixton, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.S.W. from London bridge; containing, by the census of 1801, 163 houses, and 1189 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 1626; and of 1821, 1863 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 8l. 8s. $6\frac{1}{2}d.$; patron, Peter Broadley, Esq.; incumbent, Rev. J. Ravenhill, D.D. This is a neat village, on the road from London, through Sutton and Reigate, to Brighton, having a very easy descent to the south, and consists chiefly of one street. Here are a great number of genteel residences, some handsome detached houses on each side of the street, many smaller neat ones, and several elegant ones in the vicinity, some with extensive and beautiful grounds. Besides what are mentioned under their respective names, and under the title of *Tooting-Common*, here are residences of *Thomas Bridges, Esq.*; *Mrs. Moore*; *Walter Lord, Esq.* (academy); *John Cricket, Esq.*; *Robert Clarke, Esq.*; *Lady Welsh*, lady in waiting to late Queen Charlotte; *Robert Hoggart, Esq.*; *William East, Esq.*; *William Dowling, Esq.*; *Mrs. Strachan*; *M. M. Chapman, Esq.* (academy); *G. Cricket, Esq.*; *John Evans, Esq.*; *John Weddell, Esq.*; *William Holmes, Esq.*; — *Keen, Esq.*; *Ebenezer Briggs, Esq.*; *Joseph Davis, Esq.*; *N. B. Engleheart, Esq.*; — *Lord, jun. Esq.*; — *Brown, Esq.*; *Thomas Blake, Esq.*; *Matthew Slater, Esq.*; *Mrs. Hookham*; *Mrs. Griller*; *Mrs. Costica*; and *Mrs. Baker*.

TOOTING-COMMON, in the parish of Tooting, adjoin-

ing to Streatham-common, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. W. from London; a gentle eminence, commanding pleasant prospects southwardly, having on all sides elegant residences: the principal ones, on the adjoining common of Streatham, are in the parish of Streatham, and mentioned there, or under their respective names; but in the parish of Tooting are those of *William Dawes, Esq.*; *Robert Elliott, Esq.*; *Captain Wilson* (the property of Mr. Elliott); *Mrs. Thomas*; and *Philip Chapman, Esq.*

TOOTING-HOUSE, a large house in Tooting, 6 miles S. S. W. from London, for the reception of lunatics, under the care of *Mr. Moyes*.

TOOTING-LODGE, in the parish of Tooting, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from London; a handsome mansion, &c. the residence of *Mrs. Thomas*, widow of the late Reece Goring Thomas, Esq. lord of the manor of Tooting.

TOOTING—UPPER, a hamlet in the parish of Streatham, population included in Streatham, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from London, extending from Clapham, including Balham and Balham-hill, to Tooting, on the road from London to Reigate, which has become a genteel neighbourhood, abounding with country houses of persons connected principally with business in London; so numerous near Clapham-common, as almost to form a regular continuation of building. Amongst the numerous residences here may be mentioned those of *Jacob Goodheart, Esq.*; *William Fuller, Esq.* banker, an elegant modern mansion, with walled grounds; *James Pope, Esq.*; *Mr. H. H. Warren Mortimer*; — *Pieschell, Esq.*; *L. W. Catley, Esq.*; *Mrs. Brown*; *John Bailey, Esq.*; *John Lucas, Esq.*; *Henry Wilson, Esq.*; *Adam Oldham,*

TOWER-HOUSE, in the parish of Shere, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Guildford; the manor-house (of the manor of Shere-Boreham), the property of *W. Bray, Esq.*

TOWN-GREEN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Egham, near Windsor Great-park, distant from the village $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles west.

TREVEREUX-FARM, a handsome house, and extensive farm, in the parish of Limpsfield, on the borders of Kent, $10\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Reigate; the property and residence of *Henry Cox, Esq.*

TROUTS-FARM, a farm on the northerly-side of the parish of Ockley, 4 miles S. from Dorking.

TULSE-HILL, a pleasant eminence in the parish of Lambeth, 4 miles S. from London-bridge, between Brixton-hill and Knight's-hill, adjoining westerly to the

former, and being separated from the latter by a valley, through which passes the road from Camberwell to the hamlet of Norwood and to Sydenham. This vicinity, within a short distance, is adorned with numbers of elegant villas, by which, and its hills and valleys, it is rendered exceedingly beautiful; but on this eminence there are a few handsome modern mansions, having (of the others in the vicinity which are become crowded) the advantage of more extended open grounds; amongst which is a principal modern gothic mansion, with beautiful grounds, erected on an estate here; a very desirable situation for buildings; both the mansion and the estate being the property, and the former the residence of *Dr. Edwards*.

TURNER'S-FARM, in the parish of Maldon, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Kingston; a handsome house, &c. the property and residence of *Francis Bowry, Esq.*

TURRET-HOUSE, in the parish of Clapham (in the village), $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. W. from London-bridge; an ancient mansion, formerly a residence of Oliver Cromwell, now an eminent academy, by the *Rev. William Foster*.

TURRET-HOUSE, Lambeth. See **LAMBETH**.

VALE-LODGE, in the parish, and near to the town, of Letherhead, 4 miles S. W. from Epsom, and 19 S. S. W. from London; a handsome mansion; the seat of *Thomas Diggins, Esq.*

VAUXHALL, a hamlet to the parish of Lambeth, in the hundred of Brixton, on the south-west side of the metropolis, from which it is separated by the river Thames, over which is here a modern handsome bridge to Pimlico.—The inhabitants of the metropolis, in immense numbers, for amusement, during the summer season, resort to that well-known place of attraction, *Vauxhall-Gardens*; which are open three times a week to the public, from June to August; and various new devices are continually introduced for their diversion, amongst which are the new entertainments of Cupid and Psyche, Fantoccini, &c. with Harlequin in the Shades. The usual hours of closing the amusements being too late, certain evenings, with appropriate devices, have been set apart for the exclusive entertainment of the juvenile part of the community, to whom an introduction here must be truly gratifying; and the innocent amusements highly conducive to their pleasure. Not only to those, but to others more advanced in years and knowledge, the grounds, and their various walks and avenues, the orchestra, the rotunda, the spacious rooms, brilliantly illuminated with tens of thousands of variegated lamps, and decorated with paintings, transparencies, panoramic views; the vocal and instrumental music; the fire and water works, scientifically conducted; and the accommodation with refreshments—are equally gratifying, and attract immense groups of the fashion and gaiety of the metropolis. On the road to Wandsworth is an alms-house, founded in 1612 by Sir Noel Caron, for seven poor female parishioners of Lambeth, upwards of 60 years of age.—Near here was formerly erected a fort, as one of the fortifications of the suburbs of London. In the old part of the hamlet are a number of small houses and narrow

streets; and near the river are many extensive manufactories.—This, like most of the villages on this side of the metropolis, has latterly rapidly increased, particularly towards the south and south-west sides of it; an observation confirmed by the different returns of population made to Parliament (for which see Lambeth, &c.)—Here are many elegant mansions, too numerous to be inserted or distinguished.—At South-Lambeth there is a handsome chapel of ease.

VICARAGE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chobham, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.W. from Chertsey-Beomond.

VIGO-FARM, a handsome house, with plantations, &c. and a farm, in the parish of Capel (near its north boundary), adjoining to Holm-wood-common; 3 miles S. from Dorking, on the west side of the road from thence to Brighton.

VINTERS, a farm in the parish of Nutfield, 4 miles E. from Reigate.

VIRGINIA-WATER.—See WINDSOR GREAT-PARK.

UNSTEAD-WOOD-HOUSE, in the hamlet of Bramley, and parish of Shalford, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Guildford, and 13 W.S.W. from Dorking, on the left of the London road to Portsmouth; a very extensive modern mansion, pleasantly situated, as its name implies, in Unsted-wood, on the side of an eminence, having an opening westerly, commanding views, (from the mansion and the pleasant grounds in front of it) over the valley between Godalming and Guildford; that valley being wide and flat, in the centre of which flows the river Wey and a navigable

canal, and having on its sides hills and hanging woods; adding greatly to the beautiful scenery of the neighbourhood; the seat of *Hutchis Strovers, Esq.*

UNSTROOD-BROOK, scattered houses, in the parish of Chiddingfold, 2 miles E. from Haslemere.

UPPER-DUNSTABLE-HOUSE, in the parish of Richmond, near to Marsh-gate, 4 miles N. from Kingston; an elegant modern mansion, with beautiful pleasure-grounds; a delightful seat of *Sir Robert Baker, Bart.*

UPPER-GATTON, in the parish of Gatton, 3 miles N.N.E. from Reigate, and $17\frac{1}{2}$ S.S.W. from London; an elegant and extensive mansion, delightfully situated near to Gatton-park, in an elevated situation, with beautiful prospects, on a chain of lofty chalk-hills, bounding Holmesdale on the north; the grounds on this eminence being here of beautiful verdure, ornamented with an extensive park and plantations, sloping southerly and south-eastwardly to the valley of Holmesdale, and the London and Brighton road, to the latter of which this mansion and high grounds are very conspicuous, presenting a most agreeable view to the traveller. The property of Sir Mark Wood, Bart. and the present residence of *the Duke of St. Albans.*

UPPER-HOUSE, in the parish of Addington, 3 miles S.E. from Croydon, and 13 S. from London; a neat house, adjoining to Addington-park, near the village; the property of His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the present residence of *William White, Esq.*

UPPER-PILFOLD.—See PILFOLD.

UPPER-PINKHURST, a farm in the detached part of the parish of Abinger, on the borders of Sussex, 9 miles S. S. W. from Dorking.

UPPER-SPROUT-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ewhurst, 10½ miles S. S. E. from Guildford.

UPPER-STONE-HURST, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, 5 miles N. E. from East-Grinsted in Sussex; the property and residence of *Mr. Isaac Leney*.

UPPER-TOOTING.—*See* TOOTING—UPPER.

UPPER-VAN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Hambleton, 4 miles S. from Godalming.

UPPER-WHIPLEY, a farm in the parish of Shalford.—*See* WHIPLEY.

UPPER-YARD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ewhurst, 9½ miles S. E. from Guildford.

WALLINGTON, a hundred on the eastern side of the county round Croydon, adjoining to Kent, east; to the hundreds of Kingston, and Copthorne and Effingham, west; Brixton, north; and Tandridge, south.

WALLINGTON, a hamlet, in the parish of Beddington, 2½ miles S. W. from Croydon. Population included in

Beddington. Pleasantly situated between the beautiful villages of Carshalton and Beddington, on the river Wandle.

Amongst the elegant seats in this neighbourhood, there are in this hamlet the residences of—*George Francis Gregg, Esq.* (a neat mansion); the late *William Bridges, Esq.* now the *Rev. — Cunningham*; *George Drudge, Esq.*; the *Rev. — King*, an academy, the property of — *Fry, Esq.*; and *Mr. George Loraine*.

WALWORTH, a very extensive hamlet, in the parish of St. Mary Newington, on the south side of the metropolis, stretching as far as Camberwell; in which there has been lately a great increase of buildings, and which is still in continuance.—Population included in Newington (which see).

WALNUT - TREE - HOUSE (or **KINGSTON - ACADEMY**), near the town of Kingston; a respectable boarding-school for gentlemen, by *Dr. Harcourt*.

WALTON-COTTAGE, in the parish of Walton-on-Thames, pleasantly situated near the river, 5½ miles S. W. from Kingston; a handsome house and residence of *William Parker, Esq.*

WALTON-HURST-FARM, a farm in the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, 3½ miles S. from Epsom.

WALTON-LODGE-PARK, an extensive ancient mansion, with a park, situate in the parish and near to Walton-on-Thames, 5¼ miles W. S. W. from Kingston, and 17½ S. W. from London; the property and late the

residence of *Edward Pepyn, Esq.* a magistrate of the county.

WALTON-ON-THAMES, a parish in the hundred of Elmbridge, on the banks of the Thames, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles W.S.W. from Kingston, and $17\frac{1}{2}$ S.W. from London. Containig, by the census of 1801, 267 houses, and 1467 inhabitants; total population in 1811, 1804; and in 1821, 1891; including the hamlets of Hershams and Burnwood, common-side and town divisions.—A bridge was erected in 1750, of wood, having three arches; but here is now a stone bridge, consisting of four principal arches, and several smaller ones on the sides, which are of great use in the time of floods. A serpentine river in front of the terrace of Oatlands, though artificial, gives the appearance of the Thames being here divided into two streams. The living is a rectory, value 12*l.* 12*s.* 4*d.*; patron, the King; incumbent, Rev. T. Hatch.

This is a very pleasant village; and in and around it are many elegant seats, mentioned under their respective names, some of persons of the first respectability, including *Oatlands*. Amongst those not so named, are—a seat of *Countess Tankerville*, and the residences following, viz.: *the Honourable Grey Bennett*; — *Abbot, Esq.* son of the lord-chief-justice; *Major Robson*; *Mrs. Bell*; *Mrs. Afleck*; *Mrs. Taylor*; *Mr. Newton*; *Brown Young, Esq.*; and *Thomas Young, Esq.*

See **HERSHAM**.

WALTON-ON-THE-HILL, a parish in the hundred of Cophthorne, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Epsom, and 17 S.S.W. from London; in a high situation, near an extensive heath, called Walton-heath, on the chain of hills on the south side of, and parallel to, Holmesdale; extending

from near Dorking to the borders of Kent.—Containing, by the census of 1801, 41 houses, and 204 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 263; and of 1821, 314 inhabitants. The living is a rectory; value, 12*l.* 6*s.* 5*d.*; patron, Richard Carew, Esq.; incumbent, Rev. Wm. Pritchard. In this parish are contained the residences of *James Stead, Esq.*; — *Clare, Esq.*; besides the **HERMITAGE** (which see).

WANBOROUGH, extra-parochial, hundred of Woking, on the right of the road from Guildford to Farnham, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles N.W. from Godalming; containing, by the census of 1821, 21 houses, and 107 inhabitants. Consisting principally of one house, with a farm containing about 1700 acres of land, chiefly arable, the property of Lord Onslow, which was for upwards of 20 years occupied by, and the residence of, Mr. Birkbeck, of the Society of Friends; who emigrated from hence about six years ago to, and has since published a history of, America; and this is now the residence of *Mr. Martin*, who succeeded Mr. Birkbeck.—In the farm-yard here is an ancient church, now in a ruinous state; and this is supposed to have been a chapel of ease to Waverley, but is now understood to be extra-parochial.

WANDLE, a river, its source being several springs rising at Croydon and Carshalton, forming a junction near the S.W. side of Beddington-park, the water of which is transparent, and from its perfect purity and softness is found exquisitely adapted for bleaching and print-works, which, as also other works in paper, snuff, gunpowder, and copper manufactories, and the grinding of corn, &c. are most extensively carried on at numerous mills on this river, in its course past Mitcham,

Morden, Merton, and Wimbledon, to Wandsworth, where it flows into the river Thames. Formerly it abounded with trout; was a great resort of, and still affords diversion to, the London anglers.

WANDLE-GROVE, in the parish of Mitcham, 8 miles S.S.W. from London; a spacious mansion; the property of Henry Hoare, Esq. banker, temporarily occupied by branches of Mr. Hoare's family.

WANDSWORTH (or WANDLESWORTH), a parish in the hundred of Brixton, near the mouth of the Wandle and the banks of the Thames, 6½ miles S.W. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 720 houses, and 4446 inhabitants, of whom 818 were returned as employed in trade, &c. particularly in those of calico-printing, manufacturing bolting-cloths, hats, distilleries, oil-mills, bleach-grounds, &c. Total population in 1811, 5644; and in 1821, 6702 inhabitants.—The church is a modern edifice, but the tower is of ancient structure. The living is a vicarage; value, 15*l.* 5*s.* 2*d.*; patron, T. A. Ackworth, Esq. The Rev. Robert Holt Butcher, LL. B. was vicar here, highly respected, for 44 years. Here are also a new church, erected by Government, adequate to the accommodation of 1300 persons; a neat Quakers' meeting-house, erected in 1787; two schools for the children of that persuasion; and an ancient chapel, built by French refugees; at the last of which burials from eminent French families are still continued; and other chapels of Dissenters.—The parish has received considerable benefactions from Henry Smith, Esq. who was buried here in 1627: he was a silversmith and alderman of London. Several estates having been purchased by his trustees for charitable purposes, and

50*l.* per annum settled on every market town in the county; and on every parish, with a few exceptions, an annual revenue of 6*l.* or 8*l.*—Garret-lane, between this village and Tooting, was the scene of the mock election of the Mayor of Garret, held for a number of years at every general election, among the mobility, to the great emolument of the publicans of Wandsworth. The practice is now discontinued, to the great satisfaction of the lovers of order and moderation; but a fair is still holden on the first Monday in July, the resort of the lowest classes of the metropolis.

There are many handsome residences in this parish: several on the East-hill, the entrance from London and Clapham, and on West-hill, the extremity towards Wimbledon and Kingston; both pleasing eminences, commanding views of the metropolis, the Thames, and the adjacent country; and others mentioned by their respective names. Amongst the principal ones are the following, viz.; On East-hill, handsome mansions, with gardens and pleasure-grounds, of *J. Morris, Esq.*; *J. W. Rundell, Esq.*; *Mrs. Barchard*; *J. Platt, Esq.* On the road from Vauxhall to Wandsworth, an extensive mansion, the seat of *Christopher Magney, Esq.* alderman and late lord-mayor of London; and an excellent house, with pleasant views of the Thames, &c. of *Robert Fauntleroy, Esq.* On the road from Wandsworth to Tooting, over Wandsworth-common, a neat mansion and grounds, of *Henry Waymouth, Esq.*; and near Garret, the residence and works of *Mr. Thomas Bush*, an extensive oil-manufactory; and *Daniel Bell, Esq.*; and towards Battersea, (besides Jews-house mentioned under that name), an extensive distillery and residence of *Mr. T. Williams*. On West-hill (besides those mentioned under their respective names), an elegant seat of *Sir Charles*

Colnbrook. Between West-hill and Wandsworth, an elegant house, with handsome pleasure-grounds, the residence of *George Tritton, Esq.*; and a neat house of *Thomas Rooke, Esq.*; and those of *J. Sparrow, Esq.*; *William Newton, Esq.*; *Mrs. Mersey*; *Sigismund Rucker, Esq.*; and *Samuel Kingsford, Esq.* At a distance from that road, pleasantly situated, and fronting the Thames, an elegant mansion, with extensive and beautiful grounds and plantations, the seat of *George Henry Hahn, Esq.*; another of *J. Gatty, Esq.*; at the vicarage, *Mrs. Butcher.*

WANDSWORTH-LODGE, in the parish of Wandsworth, on the west side of the Common, near Tooting, 6 miles W. S. W. from London-bridge; an elegant modern mansion, with pleasure-grounds and plantations; the seat of *Frederick Bowman, Esq.*

WARE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Wonersh, 4 miles S. E. from Guildford.

WARE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, 3½ miles N. W. from East-Grinsted.

WARGARS, a farm in the parish of Horne, 8 miles S. E. from Reigate.

WARLINGHAM, a parish in the hundred of Tandridge, 5 miles S. S. E. from Croydon, and 15 S. S. E. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 52 houses, and 187 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 317; and of 1821, 421 inhabitants. The living is a vicarage; value, 117. 12s. 11d. with Chelsham chapel annexed; patron and incumbent, Rev. James Hamilton.—Here are alms-

houses for four widows, to whom are paid, from Sanderstead-court estate, 2s. per week each; and a school for 20 poor children, supported by voluntary subscription.

WARREN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Banstead, with a handsome house and plantations.—*See OLD-WARREN.*

WARREN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Cobham.—*See FAIRMILE-FARM.*

WARREN-FARM, a farm in the parish of Wimbledon, 3 miles N. E. from Kingston.

WASTE-FARM (The), a farm in the parish of Crowhurst, near the borders of Kent.

WATER-FARM, an extensive farm, in the parish of Bletchingley, 5 miles E. from Reigate.

WATER-FARM, in the parish of Godstone, 8 miles E. from Reigate; an extensive farm; the property of the Honourable — Jenkinson, and at present a villa residence of *William Cowdrey, Esq.* of London.

WATER-HOUSE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ashstead, 3 miles S. S. W. from Epsom.

WATER-HOUSE-FARM, a farm, with a very good house, 2 miles E. from Reigate, on the new road from Merstham to Brighton, through Horley; lately the residence of Mr. Bell, at present unoccupied.

WATER-SIDE, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, 5½ miles N. from East-Grinsted.

WATTLE-HURST-FARM, a farm in the parish of Capel, 8 miles S. from Dorking.

WATTS'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horley, 8 miles S. from Reigate.

WAVERLEY, a village, extra-parochial, in the hundred of Farnham, 2 miles S.E. from the town of Farnham; containing in 1821, 9 houses, and 58 inhabitants.

WAVERLEY-ABBEY, in the village of Waverley, 2 miles S.E. from the town of Farnham, and 40 W.S.W. from London; an elegant modern mansion, near the site of the ancient Abbey, which is sheltered and ornamented with extensive plantations; the seat of — *Thompson, Esq.*—Near this place, in More-park, is a cave called Mother Ludlam's Hole, through which runs a stream of fine water, that fell through marble steps, and the grotto was paved with Mosaic tile. These springs were collected for the use of the monastery here, of which now only the ruins remain.

WEAR-FARM, an extensive farm in the parish of Lingfield, 4 miles N.N.W. from Westerham, Kent.

WELL-FIELD-HOUSE, in the parish of Streatham, half-a-mile S. from the village, near the Lower-common; the residence of *Robert Brown, Esq.*

WELL-HOUSE, in the parish of Streatham, half-a-mile S. of the village, near the Lower-common; the residence of *William Wilkinson, Esq.*

WELLOWES-FARM, a farm in the parish of Coulsdon, 5 miles S. from Croydon.

WENTWORTHS, near the south-east corner of Windsor Great-park, in the parish of Egham, 4 miles S.W. from that village, on the left of the road from thence to Bagshot; an extensive beautiful mansion, with handsome grounds and plantations; the seat of *Charles Cullin Smith, Esq.*

WENTWORTHS-FARM, a farm near Wentworths, in the parish of Egham, 3 miles S.S.W. from the village.

WERKS, a farm in the parish of Nutfield, 4½ miles E. from Reigate.

WEST-BARNS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Merton, 3 miles E. from Kingston.

WESTBROOK-PLACE, on the west side of the town of Godalming, near to the church; an elegant mansion, with extensive grounds, very ornamental, on an eminence, contributing to the beauties of the scenery of the neighbourhood; formerly the residence of the respectable General Oglethorp, since of *J. Anstey, Esq.* and now of — *Godbolt, Esq.*

WESTBURY, in the parish of Compton, near the church, 2½ miles N.N.W. from Godalming; a handsome house, and farm; the manor of Westbury and part of the Lozely-park estate; the residence of *Mr. Richard Hammond.*

WESTBY-THAMES, a mansion, pleasantly situated on the bank of the Thames, nearly opposite to Hampton-court-palace, on the southerly approach to the town of Kingston, 12½ miles W.S.W. from London-bridge; the seat of *Francis Robertson, Esq.*

WEST-CLANDON, a parish in the hundred of Woking, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Guildford, on the road from thence, through Letherhead and Epsom, to London, 26 miles S.W. from London. Containing, by the census of 1801, 39 houses, and 234 inhabitants; of 1811, 324; and of 1821, 361 inhabitants. The living is a rectory; value, 13*l.* 10*s.* 0*d.*; patron, Earl Onslow; incumbent, Rev. T. Russell.—Besides West-Clandon-park (which see), there is in this village an elegant modern mansion, the seat of *Lord Cranley*; and a handsome ancient house, lately the residence of *Lord Cranley*, and now of — *Guldstone, Esq.*

WEST-CLANDON-PARK, in the parish of West-Clandon, 3 miles E. N. E. from Guildford, and $26\frac{1}{2}$ S.W. from London; a superb mansion, in a most beautiful and extensive park (with fine rows of stately trees, and a handsome sheet of water), joining on the south to the road from Guildford, through Letherhead and Epsom, to London, and the Merrow-downs; and being distant about 2 miles E. from the road from Guildford, through Kingston to London; having a private carriage-way extending from the mansion to a porter's-lodge on that road, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Guildford; the seat of *the Right Honourable the Earl of Onslow*.

WESTCOT-HILL, in the parish of Dorking, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. from the town; a handsome villa residence of *Mrs. Hibbert*.

WESTCOT-HILL-FARM, an extensive farm, in the parish of Dorking, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. from the town.

WESTCOT-STREET, detached houses, in the parish of Dorking, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. from the town.

WEST-CROFT, in the parish of Chobham, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. S. W. from Chertsey, and 22 S. W. from London; a handsome villa; the property of — *Bradburn, Esq.* of Woodlands, in Windlesham, and the present residence of *William Haydon, Esq.* a banker at Guildford.

WEST-END, a farm in the parish of Witley, adjoining to Chiddingfold, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. W. from Godalming.

WEST-END-LODGE, in the parish of Esher, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. from Kingston; a modern mansion, with neat gardens and pleasure-grounds; the seat of *Thomas Roberts, Esq.*

WEST-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ashstead, 3 miles S. S. W. from Epsom.

WEST-FARM, a farm in the parish of Burstow, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Reigate.

WEST-HALL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Warlingham, 5 miles S. S. E. from Croydon.

WESTHAMBLE, in the parish of Mickleham, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. from Dorking; three villa residences, one of *Mr. George Daniels*, and the others mentioned under their respective names.

WEST-HAXTED.—See **HAXTED, WEST**.

WEST-HORSLEY, a parish in the hundred of Woking, on the road from London, through Epsom and Letherhead, to Guildford, 5 miles E. N. E. from Guildford, and $24\frac{1}{2}$ S. W. from London. Containing, by the census of

1801, 98 houses, and 495 inhabitants; total population by the census of 1811, 474; and of 1821, 611.—The living is a rectory; value, 22*l.* 17*s.* 1*d.*; patron, H. P. Weston, Esq. The parsonage is a handsome house, with plantations and pleasure-grounds, the Rev. H. S. Weston, incumbent.

WEST-HORSLEY-PLACE, in the parish of West-Horsley, 5 miles E. N. E. from Guildford, and 24½ S. W. from London, on the north side of the road from Guildford, through Epsom, to London; an extensive ancient handsome mansion, in an extensive park, with a double row of fine trees in front, towards the road, the park including many acres of excellent land, on the south side of the road called Sheep-leas, and bounded on the south by very fine and extensive plantations; the seat of *Henry Perkin Weston, Esq.*

WEST-LAND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Bramley, 4 miles S. from Guildford.

WEST-LANDS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Wonersh, 4 miles S. S. E. from Guildford.

WEST-LODGE, in the parish of Byfleet, near the river Wey, 3½ miles S. S. W. from Weybridge, 8 N. N. E. from Guildford, and 22 S. W. from London; a neat mansion, with handsome pleasure-grounds, plantations, &c. the seat of *James Sparks, Esq.* a magistrate of the county.

WESTON-GREEN, in the parish of Thames-Ditton, on the banks of the Thames, 2½ miles S. S. W. from Kingston, and 14½ S. W. from London; an elegant mansion, the seat of *Admiral Lambert.*

WESTON-GREEN, in the parish of Thames-Ditton, 2½ miles S. W. from Kingston, round which are many handsome villas. *See also THAMES-DITTON.*

WESTON-HOUSE, in the parish of Albury, 3¼ miles E. from Guildford; a handsome mansion, adjoining to Albury-park, and partaking of the beautiful scenery of the neighbourhood, described under the title of Albury; the residence of — *Perceval, Esq.*

WESTON-HOUSE, an extensive ancient mansion, situate near the church of Chertsey, now unoccupied; the property of Mr. Wilton.

WESTON-STREET, a number of houses in the parish of Albury, 3 miles E. from Guildford.

WEST-PARK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horne, 8½ miles S. E. from Reigate.

WEST-WOOD, in the parish of Worplesdon, 2½ miles W. from Guildford, the residence of *Mr. Whitburn.*

WETMOOR-POND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Woking, 3½ miles N. from Guildford.

WEY, a river which rises in Hampshire, and entering this county near Farnham, passes that town, and Godalming and Guildford, and falls into the Thames at Weybridge. A canal, navigable from Godalming and Guildford, to Weybridge, and the Wey and Arun canal are principally supplied with water by this river, being joined by the Basingstoke canal, in the parish of Chertsey. Numerous rivulets from the west and south join the Wey. In this

river there are some fish, especially towards Cobham, principally pike and roach, and some trout; the two former species are tolerably plentiful about Godalming.

WEYBOURN, in the parish of Farnham, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N.N.E. from the town; a small handsome residence of the *Rev.* — *West.*

WEYBRIDGE, a parish in the hundred of Elmbridge, situated near the conflux of the river Wey, with the river Thames, near Walton, 20 miles W.S.W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 143 houses, and 747 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 918 inhabitants; and, by the census of 1821, 897 inhabitants. A large printing-office, and extensive iron-works, which were established at Weybridge in 1811, no longer exist there, to which is attributed the decrease of population. The living is a rectory, value 17*l.* 0*s.* 5*d.*; in the patronage of the King; the *Rev.* F. Haultayne, D.D. has been rector here for 40 years. Here is an ancient mansion, and an extensive park, the property of Lord Portmore, which have been wholly unoccupied for 36 years, and the house become quite ruinous.

This village is pleasantly situated near to Otlands; and in the neighbourhood are several other elegant seats. A column is erected in the centre of the village, at the expense of the inhabitants, with a poetic inscription, commemorative of the virtues and charity of the late Dutchess of York. Amongst the residences here, besides those mentioned under their respective names, are those of — *Worthington, Esq.*; *Mrs. Waldo*; *Mr. Kendal*, land-steward to the Duke of York; *Mr. Harris*; *Mrs. Gibson*; *Mr. John Welsh*; *Mr. John Welch, jun.*; *Mr. Chorlton*. Out of the village, towards Byfleet, a

handsome house, with pleasure-grounds and fine prospects, the *Misses Walker*; *Robert Bartop, Esq.*; a handsome house and grounds, *William James, Esq.*; and *Captain Hardy*.

WHADDON-COURT-FARM, a farm near to Whaddon, in the parish of Croydon, $\frac{2}{3}$ of a mile W. from the town; the residence of *Mr. Landfear*, an extensive agriculturist.

WHADDON-HOUSE (or **WHADDON**), a spacious mansion, with a considerable extent of ground whereon are erected several handsome dwelling-houses, in the parish of Croydon, half-a-mile W. from the church, and $10\frac{1}{2}$ S. from London, adjoining to Beddington; the residence, and with the other houses, the property of, *R. D. Warrington, Esq.* a magistrate for the county.

WHADDON-LODGE, adjoining to Whaddon, in the parish of Croydon; the property of *Mr. Warrington*, and the present residence of *Alfred Fawkes, Esq.*

WHADDON-MARSH-FARM, a farm in the parish of Croydon, 1 mile N.N.W. from Croydon.

WHEELER'S-GREEN, detached houses, in the parish of Chertsey-Beomond, near Botley's-park, 2 miles S. from that town.

WHIPLEY (UPPER and LOWER), in the parish of Wonersh, near the river and the junction canal there, 6 miles S.S.E. from Guildford; the residence of *Mr. William Eager* and *Mr. John Ironside*.

WHITE-CROSS, a farm in the parish of Lingfield, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. from East-Grinsted.

WHITE-HALL, a farm in the parish of Reigate, 1 mile S. from the town.

WHITE-HORSE-FARM, a very extensive farm, with a good house, &c. in the parish of Croydon, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. N. E. from the town; the residence of *Mr. Meager*.

WHITE-HOUSE, in the parish of Mitcham, 8 miles S. S. W. from London; a handsome house, the residence of *John Foakes, Esq.*

WHITE-HOUSE, in the parish of Charlwood, 6 miles S. from Reigate; a handsome house, with plantations and pleasure-grounds, the residence of *Charles Middleton, Esq.*

WHITE-HOUSE, in the parish of Windlesham, on the side of the road from London to Bagshot, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the latter; a neat villa residence of *Captain Magedy*.

WHITE-HOUSE-FARM, in the parish of Tatsfield, 8 miles S. S. E. from Croydon.

WHITE-HOUSE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Crowhurst, near the borders of Kent.

WHITE-HOUSE-FARM, a farm in the southerly part of the parish of Lingfield, on the borders of Sussex.

WHITE-LANE-FARM, a farm in the parish of Seal, on the north-side of the Hogsback, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Farnham.

WHITE-LODGE, in Richmond-park. *See RICHMOND.*

WHITES, a farm in the parish of Chiddingfold, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Godalming.

WHITES-FARM, a farm in the parish of Alfold, 7 miles S. E. from Godalming.

WHITWOOD-GREEN, detached houses in the parish of Horne, 7 miles S. E. from Reigate.

WICKS-FARM, a farm in the parish of West-Horsley, 5 miles E. N. E. from Guildford.

WIGGY, a farm in the parish of Reigate, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. N. E. from the town.

See also GREAT-WIGGY.

WILDERNESS, a handsome mansion, with beautiful pleasure-grounds, very ornamental, agreeing in situation with its name, situate at the east-side of the town of Reigate, $20\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from London, near the church; the seat of *Ynyr Burgess, Esq.*, a magistrate of the county.

WILDERNESS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ockham, 7 miles N. E. from Guildford.

WILDERWICK-HOUSE, in the parish of Lingfield, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. from East-Grinsted, Sussex, and 27 S. S. E. from London; a handsome modern mansion, with lawns and pleasure-grounds, and very extensive farm lands; the seat and property of *John Tabor, Esq.* banker, London.

WILLEY, scattered houses in the parish of Farnham, on the borders of Hampshire, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. from Farnham. Here is a handsome mansion, the seat of *George Coldham Knight, Esq.* and the house of *Mrs. Grant*.

WILLEY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chaldon, 5 miles N.E. from Reigate.

WILLINGHURST-FARM, a farm in the parish of Wonersh, 5 miles S. E. from Guildford.

WILMOT'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horne, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. from Reigate.

WIMBLEDON, a parish in the hundred of Brixton, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. from Kingston, and 9 S.W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 250 houses, and 1591 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 1914; and of 1821, 2195 inhabitants. Its church is a modern building, in the Grecian style, erected at the sole expense of the inhabitants, except the chancel, in 1788. The living is a rectory, value 35*l.* 2*s.* 11*d.*; in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Worcester; incumbent, Rev. Henry Lindsay. At one corner of the churchyard is a sepulchre of brick and stone, for the family of the noted Benjamin Bond Hopkins, Esq. Wimbledon-common, which joins to that of Putney, is about a mile square, and was formerly noted for robberies. Here were frequently reviews, which are now transferred to Hounslow. It has now many elegant seats around it. Here is a fair on the first Monday after Lady-day, for pedlery. At a distance from Merton-grove, in the easterly part of this parish, on the river Wandle, is a modern mansion, the residence of *Benjamin Paterson*,

Esq.; and near to the village of Merton, a neat house, the property of *Mrs. Phillips*, the present residence of *Mr. Daniel Towers*; and another, the property of *Mr. Penny*, and the present residence of *Mr. Frederick Hewitt*. Many other principal elegant seats, in this parish, will be found under their respective names, and that of Wimbledon-heath, and in the list of owners and residents at the end of this work.

WIMBLEDON-HEATH, in the parish of, and adjoining to, Wimbledon and to Wimbledon-park, and Putney-heath (the latter adjoining to Roehampton and Putney) is an extent of common about a mile square, pleasantly situated, and rendered highly ornamental by the great number of elegant seats of nobility, &c. which on all sides surround it; there being many such near to the village of Wimbledon, and also on the Roehampton and Putney side of it; amongst the elegant seats adjoining it, which are in the parish of Wimbledon, are those of *Mrs. Phillips*; *George Brown, Esq.*; *Lady Ashburnham*; *Arthur Tyton, Esq.*; *Lord Churchill*; *Mrs. Elizabeth Wilcock*; *Mrs. Fennell* (an extensive and respectable academy for gentlemen, the property of *Mrs. Macevoy*); *Sir John Richardson, knight*, one of the justices of his Majesty's Court of Common Pleas; *Joseph Marriott, jun. Esq.* (the property of *Mrs. Phillips*); *Robert Wright, Esq.* (the property of *Mrs. Lawson*); *John Murray, Esq.* (the property of *Mrs. Lawson*); *Miss M'Laran* (the property of *Mr. Lawson*); *John Sedgwick, Esq.* (the property of *Mrs. Lawson*); *Mrs. Meyrick*; the *Rev. Thomas Linwood Strong* (the late residence of Lord Viscount Melville, the property of *Sir Richard Eale Drax*); *Count Antonio*; *Mrs. Rud-*

dock (the property of Mr. Batson); *Christopher Macevoy, Esq.*; and *Miss Burdett* (the property of Sir Mark Singleton). At Cannon-hill, *Thomas Sherwood, Esq.*

WIMBLEDON-HOUSE, adjoining to Wimbledon, on the west side of Wimbledon-park, $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles S.W. from London; a modern elegant mansion and park, beautifully ornamented with trees and water, the seat of *Joseph Marriott, Esq. M. P.*

WIMBLEDON-HOUSE, situate near to Wimbledon, on the south side of Wimbledon-park, 9 miles S.W. from London; an extensive and elegant modern mansion, most delightfully situated on an eminence, commanding extensive views to the south, the seat of *Sir William Beaumarice Rush*. Near to this house is a handsome mansion, the residence of *James Augustus Knipe, Esq.*; and a house, the residence of *Lady Ellenor Hopkins* (both the property of Sir W. B. Rush.)

WIMBLEDON-PARK, in the parish of Wimbledon, extending to that village from near Wandsworth, adjoining to Wimbledon-heath westerly, and sloping easterly to a valley and the river Wandle, and southerly to a very extensive plain; containing an area of 1200 acres, laid out in great taste, and most beautifully ornamented with trees and water. In it is an elegant and spacious mansion, from which are extensive prospects to the south, in a vicinity abounding with elegant seats of the nobility; from which, and its proximity to the great metropolis, it is scarcely, if possible, to be equalled; the seat of the *Right Honourable Earl Spencer*.

WINDLESHAM, a parish in the hundred of Woking,

1 mile E. from Bagshot, and 26 S.W. from London; containing, in 1811, 1148 inhabitants; and in 1821, 315 houses and 1590 inhabitants, exclusive of Bagshot, which is a tything to this parish, and for which no population appears to have been returned for 1821. Here the abbot of Chertsey, in the reign of Edward III. erected Hook-mill, which pays an annual donation of 8*l.* to the poor of the parish for ever; the living is a rectory of the value of 10*l.* 9*s.* 7*d.* in the patronage of the King; incumbent the Rev. Thomas Snell. Here are some seats and good houses, mentioned under their respective names.

WINDLESHAM-HOUSE, in the parish of Windlesham, $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile E. from Bagshot, a handsome ancient house, the residence of *Mrs. Snell*.

WINDSOR-GREAT-PARK, a royal park, about 14 miles in circumference, principally situated in the county of Berks, but partly in the parish of Egham, in this county, in which are beautiful and extensive walks and rides, open for the use of the neighbouring nobility and gentry. In the part of the park which is situate in this county, are the Virginia water, an extensive and beautiful lake, stocked plentifully with fish, (consisting of carp, and very large pike), wild fowl, (as ducks, widgeons, &c.), and on which is a pleasure-boat; the obelisk, a handsome tower; and Belvidere, another handsome tower. A tower, called the Duke of Gloucester's tower, is also near the park.

WINKFORD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Witley, 3 miles S. S.W. from Godalming.

WINTER-FARM, a farm in the parish of Esher, 4 miles S. S.W. from Kingston.

WINTERSALL-FARM, a farm in the easterly side of the parish of Crowhurst, rather extensive, on the borders of Kent.

WINTERSHALL-FARM, a farm in the parish of Bramley, 5½ miles S. from Guildford.

WIPLEY, a good house and farm, in the parish of Worpleston, 6 miles north from Godalming.

WISLEY (or **WISTLEY**) a parish united with Pyrford, in the hundred of Woking, 7 miles N. E. from Guildford, and 22 S.W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 16 houses and 101 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 97; and of 1821, 141 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 40*l.* 19*s.* in the patronage of the Earl of Onslow; incumbent Rev. G. W. Onslow.

WISTLEY-FARM, a farm in the parish of Wistley, 4 miles south from Chertsey-Beomond.

WITLEY, a parish in the hundred of Godalming, 4 miles S. S.W. from Godalming, and 38½ S.W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 163 houses and 1039 inhabitants; total population in 1811, 1187; by the census of 1821, 1264. A spring in this parish at Bonfield, is reckoned efficacious for sore eyes. This place retains an ancient privilege of exemption from serving on juries. The living is a vicarage, value 17*l.* 15*s.* 10*d.* united with Thursley; patron and incumbant Rev. J. F. Chandler.

The turnpike road from Guildford to Portsmouth, and one to Chichester, pass through here. On the east side of the road, opposite to the church (in addition to the vicarage house) is a handsome modern mansion with beautiful gardens and pleasure-grounds, containing a large

pond, the residence of the *Rev. John Chandler*, vicar. The other seats in this parish are mentioned under their respective names.

Hindhead and Grays wood in this neighbourhood, are hills, from the former of which more particularly are extensive prospects. See **HINDHEAD**.

WITLEY-PARK-FARM, in the parish of Witley, 6 miles S.W. from Godalming.

WODYER'S-FARM, a farm in the northerly part of the parish of Ockley, 4½ miles S. from Dorking.

WOKING, a hundred on the western side of the county, divided from Hants by the river Blackwater on the west, and adjoining to the hundreds of Cophthorne and Effingham east; Godley and Chertsey north, and Faruham, Godalming, and Blackheath south. For the parishes contained in this hundred see the general description of the county, preceding the alphabetical.

WOKING, a parish in the hundred of the same name, situated on the river Wey, 5 miles N. from Guildford, and 25 S.W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 276 houses and 1340 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 1878; and of 1821, 1810 inhabitants. This was formerly a good market town, and the town-hall, or market-house still remains. The church is a handsome ancient structure. The living is a vicarage, value 11*l.* 5*s.* in the patronage of Lord Onslow; incumbent Rev. James Waller. Fair 12th September. Near this place are the river Wey, and the Wey-and-Arun canal, which frequently overflow the flat grounds in a valley near which this village is situate.—See **HOE-PLACE**.

WOLDINGHAM, a parish in the hundred of Tandridge, 2 miles W. from Godstone; containing in 1801, 6 houses and 33 inhabitants; in 1811, 58, and in 1821, 47 inhabitants. The living is a perpetual curacy, not in charge; patron Mr. Parsons; incumbent Rev. R. Smith. This parish is situate in a high ridge of chalk hills, being the easterly end of the range of hills extending from Dorking south of Holmesdale.

WOLVER'S-FARM, a farm in the parish of Horley, 3½ miles S. from Reigate.

WOMAN'S-FARM, in the parish of Godstone, 7½ miles E. from Reigate.

WONERSH, a parish in the hundred of Blackheath, 3 miles S. E. from Guildford, and 33 S.W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 147 houses and 770 inhabitants. Total population in 1811, 814; and in 1821, 918. The living is a vicarage, value 15*l.* 1*s.* 3*d.*; patron Lord Grantley; incumbent, lately, Rev. William Hodgson, now Rev. W. H. Cole. This is a neat village, containing several handsome houses.

WONERSH-PARK, an extensive ancient mansion, in the parish of and adjoining to Wonersh, with a large park, between Wonersh and Bramley, the principal part in the former, and a small part in the latter intersected by the river, and the Wey-and-Arun canal (in which are many fish,) and from which are formed lakes or sheets of water; a seat of the *Right Honourable Lord Grantley*.

WONHAM-HOUSE, an elegant mansion, in the delightful village of Betchworth, in Holmesdale, on the south-

side of Box-hill, 3½ miles E. from Dorking, and 21 miles S. S.W. from London-bridge, with an extensive park of most excellent land, watered by the river Mole, in the neighbourhood of other elegant seats, and partaking of all the variety of beautiful scenery with which this genteel neighbourhood abounds, consisting of hill, dale, river, parks, woods, &c.; the seat of the *Right Honourable Lord Viscount Templetown*.

WOOBURN-HILL-HOUSE, in the parish, 1 mile S. E. from the town of Chertsey, on the road to Weybridge, 1 mile W. from the latter; a handsome house, the residence of *Thomas Wadmore, Esq.*

WOOBURN-LODGE, in the parish of Chertsey, 1½ miles S. E. from the town, 1 mile E. from Weybridge, and 21 W. S.W. from London, an extensive ancient mansion, with park and walled gardens, pleasantly situated on the banks of the rivers Thames and Wey, formerly the seat of *Lady Heathcote*, and now of *Admiral Stirling*.

WOODBRIDGE, in the parish of Stoke, nigh Guildford, 1 mile N. from Guildford, a handsome modern mansion, pleasantly situated near the river Wey, the seat of *J. Mangles, Esq.*; also a handsome mansion, near the above, the seat of — *Creuze, Esq.*

WOODCOTE-PARK, in the parish of Epsom, half a mile S. of the town, and 15½ S. S.W. from London, an extensive park and elegant mansion, the seat of *William Northey, Esq.*

WOODCOTE-GREEN, detached houses, in the parish of Epsom, half a mile S. of that town, where is an

elegant house, adjoining to Woodcote-park, the seat of
— *Harvey, Esq.*

WOODCOT-FARM (Great) in the parish of Beddington, 3 miles S.W. from Croydon, a very extensive farm, the property of Mrs. Gee, and the residence of *Mr. Thomas Weall*, the occupier of this and Caterham Court-farm, &c.

WOODCOT-FARM (Little) in the parish of Carshalton, 3½ miles S.W. from Croydon, a good house, with a farm, the property of Captain Durand, and the residence of *Mr. John Grey*.

WOODCOT-LODGE (or **LITTLE WOODCOT-LODGE**) in the parish of Beddington, 2 miles W.S.W. from Croydon, a handsome house, &c. the residence of *William Turner, Esq.*

WOODEND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Warlingham, 4 miles S.S.E. from Croydon.

WOOD-FARM, a farm in the parish of West Horsley, 5½ miles E. from Guildford.

WOODFIELD-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ashstead, 2 miles S.W. from Epsom.

WOODFIELD-HOUSE, in the parish, 1 mile N. from the village of Streatham, and 5 S. from London Bridge, an elegant mansion, with pleasure-grounds, &c. the residence of *Henry John Rucker, Esq.*

WOODGATE-GREEN (or **MILK-HOUSE-FARM**) an extensive farm in the parish of Lingfield, 4½ miles N. from East Grinstead.

WOOD-GREEN-HALL, in the parish of Croydon, 3 miles N. E. from the town, and 7½ S. S. E. from London, the property of Mr. Francis Meager, and the present residence of *Captain Wood*.

WOODHAM-FARM, a farm in the parish of Chertsey-Beomond, 2½ miles S. from the town.

WOOD-HATCH, 1 mile south from Reigate, on an ascent on the east side of the road to Brighton, a number of beautiful houses, with plantations, &c. See **REIGATE**.

WOODHILL, in the parish of Send, 4 miles N. from Guildford, on the west of the road from London to Guildford; a handsome mansion, with beautiful grounds, pleasantly situated on an eminence, the seat of *Anthony Brough, Esq.*

WOODHURST, in the parish of Oxted, 8 miles E. N. E. from Reigate, on the road to Limpsfield; a neat villa residence of *R. M. Leake, Esq.*

WOODLAND-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ewhurst, 10 miles S. E. from Reigate.

WOODLANDS, in the parish of Windlesham, 3 miles E. from Bagshot, and 7 W.S.W. from Chertsey-Beomond; a handsome mansion and grounds, the seat of
— *Bradbin, Esq.*

WOODMANSTERN (or **WOODMANSTONE**), a parish in the hundred of Wallington, 5 miles S.S.W. from Croydon, and 15 S. S. W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 24 houses, and 151 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 147; and of 1821,

171 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 11*l.* 7*s.*; in the patronage of the King; incumbent, Rev. G. Buchanan, LL. D.

In this parish are seats of *the Earl of Derby* (the Oaks); *the Honourable Thomas Walpole* (Stagbury-hall); *the Rev. — Buchanan*, LL. D. a magistrate (the Parsonage); *Mrs. Wyndham* (Manor-house, which see); also houses of *Thomas Reid, Esq.* of Reigate, a magistrate; and of *William Lambert, Esq.*

WOODMANSTERN-MANOR-HOUSE, in the parish of Woodmanstern, 4 miles S.W. from Croydon; the seat of *Mrs. Wyndham*.

WOODMANSTONE. See WOODMANSTERN.

WOOD-PLACE, a farm in the parish of Coulsdon, 5½ miles N. from Reigate.

WOOD-SIDE, in the parish of Croydon, 1½ miles E.N.E. from that town; a handsome mansion, the residence of *Miss Humphries*.

WOOD-SIDE-GREEN, in the parish of Croydon; a Green surrounded by a number of detached houses, 2 miles N. E. from that town.

WOOLBOROUGH-FARM, a farm in the parish of Nutfield. See LITTLE-WOOLBOROUGH.

WOOLPITS, in the parish of Nutfield, 3½ miles E. from Reigate; a neat villa residence of *George Peters, Esq.*

WOOTTON, a hundred on the southern-side of the county, adjoining to Sussex, south; to the hundred of Reigate,

east; Blackheath, west; and Woking, and Copthorn and Effingham, north. [For the parishes contained in this hundred, see the general description of the county, preceding the alphabetical.]

WOOTTON, a parish in the hundred of the same name, in a pleasant valley, between Leith-hill, Ranmore-common, and Nettley Heath, 2½ miles W. S. W. from Dorking, and 25 S. S. W. from London; containing, by the census of 1801, 73 houses, and 441 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 488 inhabitants; and of 1821, 589 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value 12*l.* 18*s.* 9*d.*; patron, John Evelyn, Esq.; incumbent, Honourable and Rev. J. E. Boscowen.

WOOTTON-HOUSE, in the parish of Wootton, situated in a fertile vale, on the south-side of the road from Dorking to Guildford, (between the high grounds mentioned under the title of Wootton), from whence to Leith-hill, a distance of nearly three miles, is a continuation of plantations, and woods of forest trees, some remarkably tall, and of large dimensions; an ancient handsome mansion, which has been for centuries, and is now, the seat of the ancient family of the *Evelyns*.

WORCESTER-PARK, in the parish of Long-Ditton, 3½ miles S. E. from Kingston, and 12 S. W. from London-bridge; an elegant mansion, and extensive park, ornamented with trees, the seat of *William Taylor, Esq.*

WORCESTER-PARK-FARM, a farm in the parish of Cuddington, adjoining to Worcester-park, 2 miles N. from Ewell.

WORPLESDON, a parish in the hundred of Woking,

$2\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. N. W. from Guildford, and 30 S. W. from London, near a branch of the river Wey; containing, by the census of 1801, 151 houses, and 945 inhabitants; by the census of 1811, 1013 inhabitants; and, by the census of 1821, 1276 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, value $24l. 13s. 9d.$; in the patronage of Eton College; incumbent, Rev. W. Roberts.

WRAY-COMMON-FARM, a farm in the parish, 1 mile N. E. from the town, of Reigate.

WRUCKLESHAM, a hamlet, or tything, in the parish of Farnham, 1 mile S. of that town.

YORK-HOUSE, in the parish of Battersea, on the road from thence to Wandsworth, on the banks of the Thames, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. S. W. from London-bridge; an ancient handsome house; a seat of the Archbishops of York from 1480 to its alienation; the property of Joseph Benwell, Esq. and the present residence of *James Surrey, Esq.*

YORK-HOUSE, an ancient extensive house, at the entrance of the town of Chertsey from Egham; the residence of *Mr. Walthew*, a solicitor.

YOUNGS-FARM, a farm in the parish of Ockley, $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. from Dorking.

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
